Why are we Moral?

The science of morality is often thought of as some dry and musty set of Victorian rules and restrictions. In our era it is more like an operating manual for human relationships. But morality is just as amenable to scientific understating as any other aspect of social relations. We can live our lives more

effectively and with more personal satisfaction if we take the time to grasp what it is. In all the universe we are the only known life form that has a culture and civilization built upon a system of morally defined relationships. Because morality is an artifact of human culture, it is continuously modified by the internal and external experiences of the society that shaped it. Did it arise on anything other than human history, such as divine intervention as the religions would have it? Can it ever be said to be endowed with any purpose not wholly defined by the particular culture that created it? Can there ever be such a thing as a scientifically described, completely objective basis for morality?







Here's News: We're All going to Die!

The CO₂ concentrations that scientists had previously modeled would bring a 3 degree Celsius increase in average global temperature will actually raise temperatures by 4 or 5 degrees. This is due to a new understanding in how warming will shift cloud cover, and how these changes will actually exacerbate, not inhibit, warming. (Specifically more "high clouds" will form in the bottom layer of Earth's atmosphere, holding more of the sun's heat; and fewer stratocumulus clouds will form on the west coasts of continents reflecting less of the sun's rays and thus allowing more heat in.) This, according to lead author, Mark Zelinka, will make the Paris Agreement targets "harder to achieve" (which in scientistese is like saying "we're all gonna die!"). But let's strip off the exclamation point—and the panic—in this statement.

Even before we unleashed the looming climate catastrophe, our lives were going to end in exactly the same way. Blood would stop reaching our brains and we'd be dead (as this funny animation makes clear). Our species, too, would eventually die out, probably after human civilization did the same. Yes, of course, we're accelerating the latter two and probably the first as well. That is, perhaps, where the fear really resides. That we have no control over reining in the climate crisis, which could shorten our lives, the lives of our loved ones, and even strangers, none of whom deserve any of this.

But every time I cross a street or get into a car, I worry about the same thing. A few days ago, as I drove 65 miles/hour on the highway to my mom's house I watched a big SUV in front of me creep into the right shoulder only to lurch back suddenly when it hit the rumble strip. After the third time I witnessed this I had the chance to pass (on the left of course!) and saw—no surprise—a driver with the phone on the steering wheel, head down (gender pronouns intentionally omitted as this has nothing to do with gender). Later that same day, which was very windy, an 80-foot tree fell just a few hundred feet from a group of seven of us

including my son and me.

Every day, the odds of dying are higher than we might think. That's not a statement to generate hysteria or anxiety, but to relieve some when thinking about the far off threat of climate catastrophe. Obviously, I'm not suggesting we therefore not worry about it. Just the opposite. I drive extremely defensively because I know people drive distracted (which could kill me). While driving, I also heard on the radio that there would be high winds that day, so that afternoon when the tree fell, I was actively keeping my head up and searching for deadfall (admittedly probably giving myself more a feeling of control than true safety but some protection nonetheless).

And with climate change, perhaps this new study can take away some of our false hope and replace it with true acceptance. The Paris Agreement was magical thinking even before this research came out—dependent on political will we don't have and technologies that don't exist that could sequester more carbon in the future (since we don't have the political will now). Especially as an increasing share of resources go to disaster management (how much will dealing with the Australian fires cost?), where will we find the resources (or, again, the will) needed to shift consumer societies into ones that are centered on sustainability?

So instead, when it comes to climate change, we need to learn to drive defensively.

First that means not driving 20 miles over the speed limit, the climate equivalent of burning fossil fuels recklessly. Every fraction of a degree matters. A 3-degree world will be more livable than a 3.5-degree world. So don't speed. The time you save speeding is certainly not worth the significantly heightened risk of injury or death. You can apply that to anything climate-wise: line drying clothes vs. in a dryer; commuting by bike vs. car or train vs. plane (when realistic); cooking vs. prepackaged meals, etc. Yes, you save some time with the latter options, but are they really worth it? (And I recognize sometimes the answer is yes—the same way we drive 8 or 9 miles/hour over the speed limit when we can get away with it—but especially if you can answer 'no' to the question, then shouldn't you pick the slower, more sustainable option?)





Get Your Shingle Shots Now!

The Food and Drug admin-istration in 2017 approved the much more effective, Shingrix as the preferred alternative to Zostavax, which was approved in 2006.

Both vaccines are approved for adults age 50 and older for the prevention of shingles and related complications, whether they've already had shingles or not. If you have already had the first vaccine, get the second.

Letter to the Editor,

A religious group has issued a list of books in public school libraries they consider to be pornographic. They have begun an effort to get these books removed from the school system in Florida. They are encouraging people to contact their representatives to request their removal and a strengthening of anti-pornographic laws. While we personally may not like the content of some of these books, should they be banned for everyone? Because they are objected to on religious grounds, should they be banned for all?

Here is what they say in their "review":

"Almost all of these pre K-12 novels violate Florida statutes with sexually explicit content or undermine the Florida Constitution that marriage is between and man and a woman. And they certainly violate common decency for age-appropriate material and undermine Judeo-Christian and traditional family values."

It is important to remember that almost every book of any significance that has won a world audience of appreciative readers and influenced generations of thinkers, has been banned.

No one wants to ban books (TV and films) that don't matter. Sexuality and gender have become volatile issues, but without the kind of discussion that can be creatively provoked by books, nothing will change. Perhaps it is not pornography but change that is truly feared by these people.

Inaugural CFI Lecture Series in Brandon


We had an engrossing presentation from "Doc" Dockery on the state and future of technology, and what it portends for us. My take away is that, while we derive many benefits from the phenomenal advances in our machines, we might become unwitting tools as they increasingly run our lives. Example: you receive a text at work from your refrigerator. It says, "You are out of milk and bread, so stop at Sprouts on your way home. Oh, and get some chicken broth for the soup you can make from ingredients I've got. And your laundry is done, so pick that up too. Thelma says hi."

Do we fret over enough problems? Don't we already have more than enough to cope with in our daily lives? Sure, there are the usual, and the extraordinary complex political insults to the majority of our citizens, illness, poverty, hunger, homelessness, the daily commute, pollution, our kids and their kids, poor schools It seems endless.

Then there is the looming extinction emergency we all know about, Global Warming/Climate Change. Does it seem to you that human-caused destruction of the normal balance is already beyond repair? Politicians will choose getting reelected over forcing necessary and too-late changes in industry and society. "We can't disrupt peoples lives or our monied backers. People won't stand for that, so we'll just do our usual and let people suffer."

But what about the other elephant in the room—overpopulation? At the rate we industrialized folks use up rare resources and waste so much, there won't be enough to supply future generations. Never mind some miracle food production to supply everyone with delicious junk food, there won't be enough of many luxuries (what we consumers like to think as fun gadgets) to go around.

More than a hundred years ago, most Americans, the great majority of whom before WWI were dirt poor, could afford a home and could put food on the table. Nowadays? What of the future?

Corrupt politicians owned by quick-buck business people, devastating weather, too many people ... what will we do about it? "Send thoughts and prayers."

Have conservative Christians begun to change their battle plans?

I'm seeing more "sound the alarm" writings in conservative publications (http://bit.ly/37jU24r is one such). Recognizing that organized humanism is fading away because of the rise of nons (let alone nones) who are disinterested in organizing, there has been chosen a new enemy—Islam.

"As in 650, so today." Islam is seen as insidiously worming its way into society, just as conservative evangelicals have done for the last 70 years, with obvious success in local, state, and federal governments. Can you spell "displacement"?

Origin and meaning of the term humanism

The ideal of humanitas

The history of the term *humanism* is complex but enlightening. It was first employed (as humanismus) by 19thcentury German scholars to designate the Renaissance emphasis on Classical studies in education. These studies were pursued and endorsed by educators known, as early as the late 15th century, as umanisti—that is, professors or students of Classical literature. The word umanisti derives from the studia humanitatis, a course of Classical studies that, in the early 15th century, consisted of grammar, poetry, rhetoric, history, and moral philosophy. The studia humanitatis were held to be the equivalent of the Greek *paideia*. Their name was itself based on the Roman statesman Marcus Tullius Cicero's concept of humanitas, an educational and political ideal that was the intellectual basis of the entire movement. Renaissance humanism in all its forms defined itself in its straining toward this ideal. No discussion of humanism, therefore, can have validity without an understanding of humanitas.

Humanitas meant the development of human virtue, in all its forms, to its fullest extent. The term thus implied not only such qualities as are associated with the modern word humanity— understanding, benevolence, compassion, mercy—but also such more assertive characteristics as fortitude, judgment, prudence, eloquence, and even love of honour. Consequently, the possessor of humanitas could not be merely a sedentary and isolated philosopher or man of letters but was of necessity a participant in active life. Just as action without insight was held to be aimless and barbaric, insight without action was rejected as barren and imperfect. Humanitas called for a fine balance of action and contemplation, a balance born not of compromise but of complementarity.

The goal of such fulfilled and balanced virtue was political, in the broadest sense of the word. The purview of Renaissance humanism included not only the education of the young but also the guidance of adults (including rulers) via philosophical poetry and strategic rhetoric. It included not only realistic social criticism but also utopian hypotheses, not only painstaking reassessments of history but also bold reshapings of the future. In short, humanism called for the comprehensive reform of culture, the transfiguration of what humanists termed the passive and ignorant society of the "dark" ages into a new order that would reflect and encourage the grandest human potentialities. Humanism had an evangelical dimension: it sought to project humanitas from the individual into the state at large.



Albertus Seba's Cabinet of Natural Curiosities is one of the 18th century's greatest natural history achievements and remains one of the most prized natural history books of all time. Though it was common for men of his profession to collect natural specimens for research purposes, Amsterdam based pharmacist Albertus Seba (1665?-1736) had a passion that led him far beyond the call of duty. His amazing, unprecedented collection of animals, plants and insects from all around the world gained international fame during his lifetime. In 1731, after decades of collecting, Seba commissioned illustrations of each and every specimen and arranged the publication of a four-volume catalog detailing his entire collection--from strange and exotic plants to snakes, frogs, crocodiles, shellfish, corals, insects, butterflies and more, as well as fantastic beasts, such as a hydra and a dragon. Seba's scenic illustrations, often mixing plants and animals in a single plate, were unusual even for the time. Many of the stranger and more peculiar creatures from Seba's collection, some of which are now extinct, were as curious to those in Seba's day as they are to us now. This reproduction is taken from a rare, hand-colored original. The introduction offers background information about the fascinating tradition of the cabinet of curiosities to which Seba's curiosities belonged.

Christian Charity Gets in the Way of Genuine **Economic Progress**

Conservative Christians relentlessly brag about how much more they give to charity than other religious and secular groups. For purposes of this article, I am not primarily concerned with the findings that show that most of that charity does not find its way to the intended targets. Let's say for the sake of argument that all of the money goes to the intended recipients.

Conservative Christians are especially generous around Thanksgiving and Christmas. No surprise there. What better way to call attention to your faith than to give money during two of the most popular holidays in the U.S.? Sadly, though, after the holidays are over, conservative Christian giving goes way down and the causes they support fall from the proverbial radar.

Charity is important and it makes the world a better place. I have given to charity throughout most of my life and will continue to do so. But like religious progressives, I understand that charity is simply not enough.

It is all well and good to open soup kitchens, build clinics and hospitals, open shelters for the homeless, and so forth. But as nice as all of this is, it simply puts a band aid on a gushing wound.

Conservative Christian Dinesh D'Souza rarely engages in formal debates to defend Christianity without bragging about how much more money conservative Christians give to charity than everyone else. Moreover, when told about the genuine success that secular social democracies in Europe are having in combating poverty, homelessness, bad health, and so on, he implies that that is no big deal because the government is responsible for that success.

Duh! That's exactly the point and the point of this article. That is the only way to make widespread progress for suffering people. Charity has never done so and never will.

Conservative Christians seem to have a point when they claim that the Bible does not say that the government should intervene on behalf of its citizens in need. If they are correct, it just shows how sadly outdated the Bible truly is.

While Conservative Christians pat themselves on the back for feeding some of the hungry, they want to cut food stamps and other government programs that could feed far more people than they ever could.

For example, shortly before Christmas in 2019, President Donald Trump, the hero of White evangelicals, made plans to cut the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) from the U.S. Department of Agriculture. As many as 3.1 million people could lose benefits as a result. No matter how much they give and pray, conservative Christians would be unable and unwilling to help so many needy people on a regular basis. That is the government's job!

The law is proposed to go in effect in April 2020. It would deny

benefits to seniors, veterans, the disabled and hundreds of thousands of children, i.e., the most vulnerable members of society. It would even hurt many of Trump's poor White supporters.

Conservative Christians love to point to the clinics and hospitals that they have built all over the world. They have volunteered their time as well as put their money where their mouth is. However, they have routinely opposed good health care for the poor majority.

For example, in 2018, Judge Reed O'Connor ruled that the entire Affordable Care Act be dismissed. Later, on December 18, 2019, a federal appeals court found that the act's requirement that people have health insurance is unconstitutional.

If the law is dismissed, millions of people could lose health insurance, including many of Trump's poor White supporters. Fifty million people with pre-existing conditions could be without health insurance. What, pray tell, could charitable conservative Christians do to help all of these people?

Incidentally, this raises the question of why hospitals are needed in the first place. Why can't Christians and other theists just ask God to intervene on behalf of the sick and suffering? Perhaps the omnipotent and omniscient God could even bring people back from brain death and grow people new limbs.

There are many other areas of need in which government aid is paramount, such as disaster relief. However, conservative Christians have steadfastly opposed government aid for those suffering from the ill effects of "acts of God."

Not surprisingly, on August 27, 2019, President Trump declared that he would take \$155 million from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to detain asylum seekers and create locations for their court hearings.

There are several secular and religious charities that provide disaster relief. However, such efforts are simply too short. For example, they cannot pay for the Coast Guard during floods, and so on.

Again, though, we must ask why Christians and other theists cannot simply pray away hurricanes, earthquakes, and so on. To make matters worse, many self-righteous conservative Christians blame the victims. For example, that have blamed alleged sinners for the fires in California, a major earthquake in Haiti, Hurricane Katrina, and so on.

Last but not least, Trump has proposed massive cuts to affordable housing, to bipartisan disapproval. Despite conservative Christians building houses for the poor, providing homeless shelters, and so forth, this simply will not help most poor people in need of housing.

Conservative Christians are too obsessed with their own sense of moral superiority to be truly concerned with the elimination of widespread human misery. They can always pat themselves on the back for the charity they give to hospitals that will not be able to serve those poor people to whom conservative Christians have gleefully denied health insurance.
