General Election: November 3rd.

Check your registration and preferences now at your county elections office. They'll be happy to confirm your status, makes changes, or explain what you need to know.

Do it now.

Please Don't Delay – Get Your Shingle and Flu Shots Now!

The Food and Drug administration in 2017 approved the much more effective, **Shingrix** as the preferred alternative to Zostavax, which was approved in 2006.

Both vaccines are approved for adults age 50 and older for the prevention of shingles and related complications, whether they've already had shingles or not. If you have already had the first vaccine, get the second.

Also, don't forget your current Flu & Pneumonia shots available now.

Did you know that if you're registered to vote but didn't vote in the past two national elections you may have been removed from the voting rolls? In Florida, if you don't vote in one national election and don't return voter address confirmation mailers, you can be marked as an "inactive voter," and—depending on your county—after two elections without voting you may be marked as an "ineligible voter," and removed.

Thankfully there's a simple fix: Go to registertovoteflorida.gov and check your voter registration status. If you don't show up in the system as a registered voter, you can register online immediately. And be sre to check your signature ab nane. But you must do it before October 5 -- the deadline to register and be eligible to vote in the 2020 election.

Three other important reasons to go to <u>registertovoteflorida.gov</u> before October 5:

- If you haven't registered to vote before and want to vote for the first time.
- If you've moved or changed your name since you last voted.
- If you just want to make sure sometimes voters have been flagged for removal because of a computer error.

Don't lose your right to vote in the 2020 election! Your vote is your voice.

Go to <u>registertovoteflorida.gov</u> to register or to update your registration today.



Dirt

Soil is the earth's fragile skin that anchors all life on Earth. It is comprised of countless species that create a dynamic and complex ecosystem and is among the most precious resources to humans. Increased demand for agriculture commodities generates incentives to convert forests and grasslands to farm fields and pastures. The transition to agriculture from natural vegetation often cannot hold onto the soil and many of these plants, such as coffee, cotton, palm oil, soybean and wheat, can actually increase soil erosion beyond the soil's ability to maintain itself.

Half of the topsoil on the planet has been lost in the last 150 years. In addition to erosion, soil quality is affected by other aspects of agriculture. These impacts include compaction, loss of soil structure, nutrient degradation, and soil salinity. These are very real and at times severe issues.

The effects of soil erosion go beyond the loss of fertile land. It has led to increased pollution and sedimentation in streams and rivers, clogging these waterways and causing declines in fish and other species. And degraded lands are also often less able to hold onto water, which can worsen flooding. Sustainable land use can help to reduce the impacts of agriculture and livestock, preventing soil degradation and erosion and the loss of valuable land to desertification.



The health of soil is a primary concern to farmers and the global community whose livelihoods depend on well managed agriculture that starts with the dirt beneath our feet. While there are many challenges to maintaining healthy soil, there are also solutions and a dedicated group of people, who work to innovate and maintain the fragile skin from which biodiversity springs.

DEFORESTATION

Without plant cover, erosion can occur and sweep the land into rivers. The agricultural plants that often replace the trees cannot hold onto the soil and many of these plants, such as coffee, cotton, palm oil, soybean and wheat, can actually worsen soil erosion. And as land loses its fertile soil, agricultural producers move on, clear more forest and continue the cycle of soil loss.

OVERGRAZING

The conversion of natural ecosystems to pasture land doesn't damage the land initially as much as crop production, but this change in usage can lead to high rates of erosion and loss of topsoil and nutrients. Overgrazing can reduce ground cover, enabling erosion and compaction of the land by wind and rain.. This reduces the ability for plants to grow and water to penetrate, which harms soil microbes and results in serious erosion of the land.

USE OF AGROCHEMICALS

Pesticides and other chemicals used on crop plants have helped farmers to increase yields. Scientists have found that overuse of some of these chemicals changes soil composition and disrupts the balance of microorganisms in the soil. This stimulates the growth of harmful bacteria at the expense of beneficial kinds.

Arable land is any land that can be used to grow crops. Many of the practices used in growing those crops can lead to the loss of topsoil and destruction of soil characteristics that make agriculture possible.

Erosion

Land is often transformed from a forest or other natural landscape, such as floodplains and wetlands, into a crop field or pasture. The converted land is less able to soak up water, making flooding more common. There are methods to improve soil water holding capacity as well as restoration and maintenance of wetlands.

Soil eroded from the land, along with pesticides and fertilizers applied to fields, washes into streams and waterways. This sedimentation and pollution can damage freshwater and marine habitats and the local communities that depend on them.



But we also want to create a landing pad for those who may be doubting their faith or leaving their religion. Often, when people leave belief behind, they're losing more than a God belief. Sometimes family severs contact, the church friends you've been close to for years may start to distance themselves. When your religious connections are a large part of your world, it's easy to find yourself lost and alone when you walk away. If this is you, please know that YOU ARE NOT ALONE. There is a community here that cares for and values you – no commandments required.

New on the Secular Invocations front

ACPC Director Sarah Ray gave a secular invocation at the Lake Wales City Commission Meeting on August 4th that set off a series of events that recently ended in the City Commission passing an invocation policy which reads as if it will prohibit the ACPC and its members from participating in future invocations and effectively limits invocation speakers to Christians.

The City Commission voted 4-1 on a Resolution to establish an official voluntary chaplain position with the City, appointed Rev. Dr. Moyer to that position, and in the event Moyer is unavailable, further declares that, "The prayer shall be voluntarily delivered by the City's Chaplain or by an eligible member of the clergy/religious leader in the local community of Lake Wales." They worked hard to prevent us from being involved in the future.

Shortly after Lake Wales, ACPC Member Darhlene Zeanwick presented a secular invocation at the Davenport City Commission meeting. In stark contrast, the City of Davenport passed a resolution following the 2019 ruling in Williamson v. Brevard where the City Attorney advised the Commission that if they were to continue invocations, they should have a formal policy that opens it up to everyone.

We are thankful to the City of Davenport for honoring religious equality in their invocation process.

The Board voted at our September meeting to resume certain community service activities with strict modifications for safety. And I get the pleasure of sharing a VERY exciting announcement about a new program that we'll be launching very soon!

Commissioner Curtis Gibson and *Keep Polk County Beautiful* are hosting a cleanup event in Lake Wales. While he voted in favor of the invocation policy that gives preference to Christians, we remain committed to our Mission & Vision of being a positive force throughout the county. Join us to help clean up an area of Lake Wales and continue to demonstrate positive community engagement, helping to change people's perceptions of nonbelievers.

ACPC will provide vests and pickers to our volunteers, and we have bags as well. Everyone is parking at Grace Healthcare, so you'll want to find the ACPC crew to get your supplies and ACPC safety vest! Text 863-666-0574 if you need help finding us day-of.

Social Progress Index: Norway Up, US Down

As The New York Times' Nicholas Kristof writes, the latest Social Progress Index (put out yearly by the DC-based nonprofit the Social Progress Imperative) rates Norway as the global leader in its broad metrics of the quality of human life, while containing bad news for the US. "[D]espite its immense wealth, military power and cultural influence," Kristof writes, the US "ranks 28th—having slipped from 19th in 2011. The index now puts the United States behind significantly poorer countries, including Estonia, Czech Republic, Cyprus and Greece."

The calculation, which includes data from "globally or locally respected sources," as the group deems them—in categories like access to advanced education, personal freedom, water and sanitation, access to quality health care, and personal safety—is a blow to Americans' sense of exceptionalism, as Kristof puts it. WHEN ENVIRONMENTALISM CLASHES WITH SCIENCE By Dibakar Das

Protecting the environment is a worthy goal. The quality of our lives depends on the quality of the environment. We all need clean air, clean drinking water, and healthy food to have a healthy life. Poor air quality increases the risks of respiratory illnesses. Degrading soil health and warming global temperatures challenge continued food production. And deforestation, air and water pollution, and excess use of chemicals in food production only make things worse. The conservation of many endangered species of animals depends on protecting their environment. Protecting the environment is also important to contain man/wildlife conflicts, which often end badly. Wild animals driven by habitat destruction often attack human settlements in search of food, and in the worst scenario may help spread new diseases. The responsibility to protect the environment is therefore natural in most of us.

This tendency to care deeply for the environment, although useful in most instances, sometimes leads to irrational behaviors—ones based more on emotions than science. This issue merits some consideration in the interest of science and scientific thinking in general.

As people are becoming more environmentally aware, a form of environmentalism fashioned in exaggerated interpretation (and sometimes science denial) is growing among some youth. Secured in innocent emotions to protect and worship mother nature, this form of environmentalism looks similar to dogmatic religion in some aspects. It is often blind in opposition, based on emotions, and fierce in response to criticism. While I do not want to brand everybody who cares for the environment as a new religionist, the tendency of innocent youth to stand out as environmentalists at every occasion without being skeptical is dangerous and contrary to scientific thinking. This almost cult mentality may obstruct constructive and useful discussion—for example, whether we should go "all organic." The environmentalist I am talking about, of course, will say yes, even if a strong case could be made against the proposal.



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Sorry, 'Theistic Science' Is Not Science

A recently published book documents the creationist misrepresentation of science called "theistic science." Who Was Adam? A Creation Model Approach to the Origin of Humanity (2015) consists of a reprint of a book of the same title published more than ten years earlier, followed by a thorough update that constitutes one-third of the text.

The authors are Fazale Rana and Hugh Ross, both executives and scholars with Reasons to Believe (RTB), a Christian ministry located in Southern California. They have graduate degrees in science (chemistry and astronomy, respectively) and have written many books that profess to put biblical creationism on a scientific foundation.

Rana and Ross's work focuses on the "scientific case for God's existence and the Bible's reliability" and the "integration of scientific fact with biblical faith."

Throughout *Who Was Adam?* they describe their creationist approach to human origins as science.

However, Rana and Ross also make clear their fundamental biblical premise: "We believe life's origin and history cannot be fully explained apart from the direct involvement of the Creator, who repeatedly intervened in Earth's history, initiating new life-forms, including humans who alone were made in His image."

This premise reflects Rana and Ross's explicit statement that creation by supernatural intervention is the foundational assumption of RTB's human origins model. The central presupposition of "theistic science" is operationalized in the repeated use of phrases such as "God's handiwork," "Creator's direct action," "work of the

The RTB strategy does not satisfy the basic requirements of a scientific endeavor, and in this article I explain why, giving numerous examples taken primarily from the ten-year update of *Who Was Adam?*.

Creation Model

The RTB human origins model is based on all Bible verses that describe God's work in creating humans and that recount early human history. Six well-known assertions illustrate the RTB creation model's testable propositions:

- •God created Adam and Eve as the first humans (the primordial couple) through direct intervention.
- All humans came from Adam and Eve, who are the parents of humanity.
- Humans originated in a single geographical location, the Garden of Eden.
- •A universal (but regional) flood shaped early human history.
- •Life spans of the first humans were once longer than 900 years but shortened after the flood.

Humans are behaviorally distinct (in ways that reflect God's image) from the earlier hominids and the great apes.

The authors' stated objective is to demonstrate that a traditional biblical view of human origins has scientific credibility. They assert that the RTB model recasts the biblical scenario into scientific terms. It is purported to be like all scientific ideas or models, in that it is poised to stimulate future scientific work. With RTB's biblical model, Rana and Ross argue that the concept of creation is testable and has entered the scientific domain. Not surprisingly, they state that *Who Was Adam?* is primarily a scientific book.

Scientific Principles

Before listing concrete examples of Rana and Ross's approach to defending the RTB biblical view



Chiropractic: Not All That It's Cracked Up to Be

My new book has just been published. Allow me to try and whet your appetite by showing you the book's introduction:

"There is no alternative medicine. There is only scientifically proven, evidence-

based medicine supported by solid data or unproven medicine, for which scientific evidence is lacking." These words of Fontanarosa and Lundberg were published 22 years ago. [1] Today, they are as relevant as ever, particularly to the type of healthcare I often call 'so-called alternative medicine' (SCAM)[2], and they certainly are relevant to chiropractic.

Invented more than 120 years ago by the magnetic healer DD Palmer, chiropractic has had a colourful history. It has now grown into one of the most popular of all SCAMs. Its general acceptance might give the impression that chiropractic, the art of adjusting by hand all subluxations of the three hundred articulations of the human skeletal frame[3], is solidly based on evidence. It is therefore easy to forget that a plethora of fundamental questions about chiropractic remain unanswered.

I wrote this book because I feel that the amount of misinformation on chiropractic is scandalous and demands a critical evaluation of the evidence. The book deals with many questions that consumers often ask:

- •How well-established is chiropractic?
- •What treatments do chiropractors use?
- •What conditions do they treat?
- •What claims do they make?
- Are their assumptions reasonable?
- Are chiropractic spinal manipulations effective?
- Are these manipulations safe?
- •Do chiropractors behave professionally and ethically?

Am I up to this task, and can you trust my assessments? These are justified questions; let me try to answer them by giving you a brief summary of my professional background.

I grew up in Germany where SCAM is hugely popular. I studied medicine and, as a young doctor, was enthusiastic about SCAM. After several years in basic research, I returned to clinical medicine, became professor of rehabilitation medicine first in Hanover, Germany, and then in Vienna, Austria. In 1993, I was appointed as Chair in Complementary Medicine at the University of Exeter. In this capacity, I built up a multidisciplinary team of scientists conducting research into all sorts of SCAM with one focus on chiropractic. I retired in 2012 and am now an emeritus professor. I have published many peer-reviewed articles on the subject, and I have no conflicts of interest. If my long career has taught me anything, it is this: in the best interest of consumers and patients, we must insist on sound evidence; not opinion, not wishful thinking; evidence.

In critically assessing the issues related to chiropractic, I am guided by the most reliable and up-to-date scientific evidence. The conclusions I reach often suggest that chiropractic is not what it is often cracked up to be. Hundreds of books have been published that disagree. If you are in doubt who to trust, the promoter or the critic of chiropractic, I suggest you ask yourself a simple question: who is more likely to provide impartial information, the chiropractor who makes a living by his trade, or the academic who has researched the subject for the last 30 years?

This book offers an easy to understand, concise and dependable evaluation of chiropractic. It enables you to make up your own mind. I want you to take therapeutic decisions that are reasonable and based on solid evidence. My book should empower you to do just that.



Humanism and the Black Lives Matter Movement

Religious conservatives and reactionary thinkers approach the problem of police misconduct differently than do progressive humanists (and religionists.) The former believe that the problem is rooted in "sin," or a transgression against the law of God. Moreover, they believe in maintaining law and order by any means necessary. They quote the Bible, maintaining that the powers that be are ordained of God and that we must render unto Caesar what is Caesar's. When asking themselves "What Would Jesus Do?", they do not answer "join a protest for social and racial justice." They pray about their concerns, hoping to get some kind of sign from God as to how to go about confronting the problem.

Humanists, on the other hand do not believe in sin. We acknowledge power relations and understand that many people will abuse their power for various reasons. We believe that human-centered action must be coupled with human-centered thought in confronting the problem. Rather than law and order, we are concerned with challenging the powers that be.

This was the difference between conservatives and reactionary thinkers and progressives during the civil rights movement. The latter were, for all intents and purposes, opposed to the civil rights movement. They considered even the most nonviolent protesters to be trouble makers. They prayed about the "Negro problem," but had no realistic solutions to racial injustice.

Today we are once again faced with protests against police misconduct all over the world. Progressive humanists are involved with or sympathetic to the Black Lives Matter movement. Conversely, conservative and reactionary thinkers are coming down on the side of maintaining law and order.

Progressives are looking for proposed solutions. Here are two:

- 1. Add more women to police forces. Research shows that women police officers are far less likely to get violent than their male counterparts. Indeed, it is extremely rare to hear about a policewoman involved in an act of brutality or death. They behave more respectfully and rationally toward suspects, and are better able to handle dangerous, chaotic situations. If now is not the time to hire more women cops, then when?
- 2. Pass laws against the use of chokeholds by cops. The New York State Assembly has just passed the Eric Garner Anti-Chokehold Act, named in honor of the Black man who was killed by a New York Police Department officer using a chokehold. It is a felony to break the law, and anyone found guilty of violating it could receive up to 15 years in prison.

It would also help if young children could learn how difficult and dangerous police work is. I was a part-time security policeman in

the air force, and I was amazed at how much is expected of cops. How many of us have jobs where people are trying to humiliate, hurt or kill us? How many of us worry about whether we will make it home alive after work? We need to have empathy for cops who are only trying to do their jobs.

On the other hand, the blue wall of silence is a stain upon the police. Cops often blindly defend rogue cops. Perhaps the most recent example occurred in Buffalo, New York where a 75-year-old man protesting police misconduct was shoved to the ground by cops and seriously injured. Rather than show empathy for the elderly man, all 57 members of the Emergency Response Team (the riot police) resigned from that group in support of the two cops charged with pushing the man to the ground. When the two cops were arraigned, hundreds of cops filled the street outside the courthouse, in support of the two cops. (President Trump even tweeted a conspiracy theory in support of the two cops.) If cops have no empathy for the victims of police brutality, they are greatly decreasing the likelihood that progressives will empathize with them.

Many progressives maintain that police misconduct is rooted in capitalism. However, police misconduct in the former Soviet Bloc was widespread. Moreover, in Cuba, Black rappers have long complained about police brutality in their music. Regardless of one's preferred economic system, what the world needs is better policing, and that could come about under capitalism.

As humanists, we want social and racial justice, but we also believe in mercy. Someone once said that those who shout the loudest for justice would soon beg for mercy if justice was rendered unto them. We must never abandon the presumption of innocence for political expediency or anything else. On the other hand, justice cannot simply be a matter of who has the best lawyers. As the 19th Century freethinker Robert Green Ingersoll noted, we must be guided by a "caring rationalism" and try to be as fair as possible.

Some Whites complain about the name "Black Lives Matter." However, the point of the name is to demonstrate that White lives matter more to the powers that be. For example, whenever young White girls are reported missing, they are the recipients of nonstop media coverage and police attention. However, young Black girls are reported missing all of the time, but the media and cops hardly notice. That is one reason why it is necessary to show that Black Lives Matter (as much as White lives.)

Progressive humanism and the Black Lives Matter movement make for a good match. Rather than blindly defend the powers that be, we must continue to hold their feet to the fire and demand what we deserve.

Norm R. Allen Jr. is the editor of two ground-breaking books: African-American Humanism: An Anthology, and The Black Humanist Experience: An Alternative to Religion. 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
