# Is Religion in our Genes?

Dr. Lynda Gurvitz will explore current theories and research related to the idea that religiosity and religious experience are "hardwired" in the human brain, and that is why it is so difficult for rationalists and religious people to come to any meeting of the minds.

In preparation, members may wish to read Julian Jaynes <u>The Origin of Consciousness in the Breakdown of the Bicameral Mind.</u> There is also an article in the October/November issue of Scientific American <u>Mind</u> magazine called "Searching for God in the Brain," by David Biello that sums up the research nicely.

Lynda Gurvitz is a licensed clinical psychologist and have been practicing in the area for close to 30 years. One of her interests is neuropsychology - the relationship between brain structure and cognition. She received her Ph.D. in psychology from Arizona State University. While she has not done formal research in this area, it has long been a matter of some interest to her.




