PUBLISHED HUMANIST LETTERS:

a letter to Menoeceus from Epicurus (255BCE):

"Let no one be slow to seek wisdom when he is young nor weary in the search of it when he has grown old. For no age is too early or too late for the health of the soul. And to say that the season for studying philosophy has not yet come, or that it is past and gone, is like saying that the season for happiness is not yet or that it is now no more. Therefore, both old and young alike ought to seek wisdom, the former in order that, as age comes over him, he may be young in good things because of the grace of what has been, and the latter in order that, while he is young, he may at the same time be old, because he has no fear of the things which are to come. So we must exercise ourselves in the things which bring happiness, since, if that be present, we have everything, and, if that be absent, all our actions are directed towards attaining it."

Epicurus is credited with being one of the first great Humanist thinkers. His social philosophy emphasized the importance of simple human decency in all relationships and embraced the idea of moderation in pleasures and acting to diminish pain where possible. He held no belief in the supernatural as a force in human life. He embraced life and wished others would overcome their fear to do the same. "Do not fear death: life is feeling or sensation; when life ends, there is no feeling. Death does not hurt." Despite the efforts of early Christians to eradicate what they saw as a competing worldview some of his writings survived and continue to exert influence today.

HFA participates in C-3 Table strategic planning session

Following the discussion at May's conference in Sarasota, HFA president Jerry Lieberman recently participated in a two-day strategic planning session at St. Petersburg College as HFA's representative to develop a political action plan with representatives from over 35 statewide organizations. This plan is sensitive to IRS limitations imposed on 501(c)(3) organizations as it ensures there will be full compliance while also taking full advantage of activities that are appropriate for a non-profit in support of its legitimate mission, goals and bylaws. The C-3 Table plan identifies how statewide progressive organizations can collaborate to make a difference in areas of vital mutual interest like separation of church and state, high quality (secular) public education, civil liberties and human rights. The C-3 Table is the most broadly representative and progressive collaborative organization in the state's history with a combined membership in excess of 700,000. It has its own staff and funding but works to achieve the plans that have emanated and been approved through the planning process. HFA is pleased to be an integral part of the Table in helping to shape its direction and by representing secular and Humanist interests in the process. HFA will be working closely with its 26 affiliate groups to gain members' input and involve them so they're well represented.

ON THE WAY TO GRAMMAR'S HOUSE

Reality.

It's such a fiction.

Recently there was a serious article at, I believe, thewashingtonpost.com on "the human side of Gen. Petraeus' testimony" at the hearing on his new Afghan assignment. I beseech each and every one of you, if you can, to let me know what was not human in his testimony or about him in general (no pun intended).

Similarly, we've often been teased, as at least one-time television viewers, that we were about to view the "human side" of the news. The rest of the news, apparently, was filled with surreal emanations from some substitute form of life.



And how often do we hear the whimper that someone was "only human" in performing some dismally disappointing act or demonstrating a dismally disappointing moral stance or other view. This is stunning, since humans, in what was long a prevailing view in our pseudo-Christian culture, have been thought to be made in the image of ""God." There seems to be a sliding scale of disappointment with ourselves, so that at a certain point we become not "only human" but "beasts," "animals" and even "monsters."

And then there are us Human-Ists. There doesn't seem to be a lot of reverence for the "human" in us in what I've just written about. Indeed, what it is to be human seems to be at least parenthetical to what we're really about (in the case of Petraeus and whatever is the "human" side of the news), and downright regrettable for the rest of it.

So where do we get our "Ist?" Is it from the grand sweeps of evolution and of history? It can't be, can it, simply that we're less scaly, feathery and furry than our relatives. Okay, we seem to be brighter, but are we less bestial? We build bigger dams, more complex societies than beavers, ants, bees and wolves and add science and advanced technology to the kinds of societies that our closest primate relatives structure. But do we fight for dominance less or more than our many mammalian relatives, battle less over "territory," ideological as well as geographical? Are we "with" nature, or "above" it? How "permanent" are we anyway, waiting for the next meteorite or virulent epidemic or melodramatic climate change, or (less likely for now) suicidal warfare.

I guess it's "faith." I've got faith, you've got faith, and we'll all dance to it in the light of a full moon, that the goodness in humans will prevail, and we'll develop a shared definition of goodness so that we won't need to destroy those who disagree with us in order to be good.

On another hand, the "human side" seems to imply the revelation of emotion, of feeling, not the I think therefore I gotta be me from Descartes-before-the-horses. In this case we seem to be blessing the hormonal, the limbic, the symbolic heart as something uniquely human, which seems arguable.

And when we apologize for being human, what exactly are we regretting and apparently wishing to reform.

And, consequently, how can "Humanists," in place of apologizing for being human, want to become even more "human" and make society more "human-istic."

Is that merely a euphemism for the mores and goals of liberals and progressives about social justice: sharing the wealth of the planet with all in an equitable manner, and sustaining the planet's riches instead of depleting them. I'm for that. But wouldn't it be equally "human" to go on fighting with each other and despoiling the planet? Christopher Hitchens is fond of calling people he doesn't like, the current Pope for example, ""mammals." We're all mammals.

I've remarked more than once that I'm a humanist, but I wish I knew what that was. Truthfully, I think the term originated and has lived on as an alternative simply to supernaturalism. That's basically how I've thought of myself as a "humanist." I've also found myself politically well to the left. I haven't conflated the two.

Maybe we should be "Morethanhuman--ists."

Am I wrong? Do I have to subscribe to a Humanist Manifesto, or a series of Manifesti, much like the now-you-see-it now-you-don't development of the "Bible?" Do I have to listen to dogmas howling in the night?

The best of Humanism as I've experienced it is when the flowering of each individual is valued as highly as the overall betterment of society. If we're not to apologize for being "only human," at the same time we try to make society more "humanistic," we need to spend more time on that first-mentioned project in this paragraph.

That's my reality.

Is it, too, fiction?

Want to be a more active Humanist?

Being an active agent of social change in many ways defines the practical meaning of Humanism. Despite the vast numbers of us on this planet, all too few actually are involved in making life better for all of us. Especially if you are retired, or have leisure, you should consider expanding the range of your positive involvement in the lives of others.

Traveling to Arizona?

The ACLU of Florida is warning Florida residents of potential threats to the constitutional rights and civil liberties of individuals planning to travel or stay in Arizona.

In light of the recently enacted racial profiling law, SB 1070, we would like to inform Floridians of their rights in the State of Arizona. Although the law is not scheduled to go into effect until July 29, 2010, a history of rampant racial profiling by law enforcement officials in Maricopa County, Arizona (which includes the cities of Phoenix, Glendale, Mesa, and Scottsdale) and a stated policy of "attrition through enforcement" adopted by lawmakers in the state give credible reason to be concerned even before the date SB 1070 is supposed to go into effect.

The law will require police officers to demand papers proving U.S. citizenship or immigration status from any individual whom they stop, detain, or arrest, based on an undefined "reasonable suspicion" that the individual is in the country unlawfully. It invites discrimination against, and pretextual stops and arrests of, Latinos, other racial minorities, and individuals believed to look or sound "foreign," based on their race, ethnicity, or national origin. The law expressly provides that even suspected infractions of city or town ordinances such as jaywalking, excessive noise, or having an overgrown or untidy lawn can and should lead to immigration questioning. If individuals are unable to prove to the police officer that they are permitted to be in the United States, they may be subject to warrantless arrest without any probable cause that they have committed a crime.
