No place for government meddling

Charlie Crist has never been one of my heroes, but I applaud his veto of the abortion bill. Requiring distraught, confused women to view a first-trimester fetus and listen to a detailed description of it, along with its heartbeat — does that resolve anything? And what does it say about big government, the *bete noire* of the ultraconservatives?

State Sen. Andy Gardiner's remark, "If you really wanted people to change hearts, what better way than to see a heartbeat," is at the core of the problem. Is it the government's place to "change hearts"? Is it the government's place to shame and frighten private citizens at any time, especially at moments of emotional (and physical) stress? Should the government monitor our most private sorrows and crucial decisions? Crist is absolutely right: He is against making the government more powerful than it is now by using coercion in medical matters.

Yet they may legally be aborted. Isn't this discrimination?

Ah well. "A foolish consistency is the hobgoblin of little minds, adored by little statesmen and philosophers and divines," as Ralph Waldo Emerson said long ago. Evolution Institute positions itself to explore 'quality of life' indices

The Evolution Institute (EI)) has convened scientists from multiple disciplines, universities and nations to share with their colleagues and the public what rich insights can be gained and applied to improving the quality of life by means of applying an evolutionary theoretical perspective. This largely has been done topically and in focal areas including, but not limited to, early childhood education, risky adolescents behavior, large-scale regulatory mechanisms and community building. Outcomes such as policy papers, applications of recommendations on local levels and broader recognition in terms of press and publications have been realized. Additionally, relationships have begun with organizations like the Prindle Institute, the Royal Academy of the Arts, Manufacturing and Commerce (RSA), the Equality Trust (ET) and the National Evolutionary Synthetic Center (NESCent).

The EI is unique in its evolutionary theoretical perspective by applying it to the study of humans, rigorously and systematically, based on state-of-the-art research that includes mathematical modeling. It is the only institute in the world that engages and represents scholars from highly diverse disciplines who utilize evolutionary theory in their research that pertains to humans, which regards cooperation and prosociality as feasible and consistent with nature and culture. These scholars are committed to improving the human condition through collegiality, without ideological considerations or underpinnings.

EI is able to leverage substantial resources through collaboration with others well beyond its internal resources and funding streams. Our scholars are profoundly invested in this unique opportunity because it enhances their work on many campuses around the world, and at the same time, provides access to resources not available on/in any one campus, professional association, conference or institute/center. There is considerable continuity and progression for those engaged in EI that is enhancing and catalytic. Also a topic as broad as "quality of life" requires not only the unique lens of evolutionary theory to bring new and rich insights, but also the EI mission and infrastructure to sustain such an ambitious and challenging agenda.

Why is the EI so well positioned to take the lead for giving meaning and concrete practical results to discussions of measures to gauge the quality of life? One strong reason is the relationship it has already established with the RSA and Equality Trust. The former organization has done extensive research on the brain, culminating in its recent Social Brain report. Equality Trust and the work of Richard Wilkinson and Kate Prickett published in *The Spirit Level* document the impact societies have on the quality of life. Equality Trust and RSA offer strategies to address improving the human condition. Wilkinson and Pickett make a powerful case for what the human condition is today in the most technologically advanced societies in the world within the context of public health – certainly an important aspect of quality of life in any society concerned with the survival of our species.

We have, in the combined research efforts of RSA, ET and EI, a plethora of information and resources to identify what constitutes quality of life and a foundation to grasp under what circumstances it can be nurtured and better fulfilled. We are not suggesting "one size fits all" here or any utopian or ideological pathways. However, evolutionary theory provides the basis for uncovering how culture impacts our human condition and offers insights wherever an ameliorable mismatch exists between our nature and cultural practices. RSA offers excellent research and information on the structure and function of our brain that needs to be taken into consideration as we provide tangible solutions that can improve the human condition. The ET methodology provides the foundational database, benchmarks, criteria and tools to assess whether our strategies are succeeding.

In an agreement dated June 11, the University of Chicago outlined the terms for publication of *Evonomics: Evolutionary Theory as a New Foundation for Economics and Public Policy.* The agreement results from the first proposal the Evolution Institute submitted to a publishing company, and it results from the groundwork of last fall's NESCent conference at Duke University. It is also the first time royalty fees are to become a source of income for EI.



Atheists Sponsor "One Nation Indivisible" Ads

LAKELAND, Fla.—Atheists of Florida placed five new billboards in the Lakeland, Florida area on June 22, 2010, in recognition of Independence Day. The design for the patriotic ad campaign features a flag background with the words, "One Nation, Indivisible," along with the website for the atheist non-profit organization.

John Kieffer, president of Atheists of Florida, explained, "We want to remind residents of the way the Pledge of Allegiance was recited prior to its divisive change in 1954 when 'under God' was added during the fear and suspicion of the McCarthy era."

"The original phrasing does not artificially divide the country along religious lines," said Atheists of Florida Executive Director Rob Curry. "It recognizes the unity of America and the equal value of all citizens, no matter what they may or may not believe about religion."

There is a special meaning to the ad campaign for EllenBeth Wachs, the organization's Legal Affairs Coordinator and Director for the Lakeland chapter. "It directly responds to an incident that occurred during a Lakeland City Commission meeting when, after I had made public comments on an unrelated issue, my patriotism was questioned by one of the commissioners who noted that, because of the words 'under God,' I had not stood for the Pledge of Allegiance."

Atheists of Florida will host a "Meet the Patriots" question and answer event, scheduled for Thursday, July 22, at 6:00 p.m., in the Community Room of the Lakeland Public Library on Lake Morton Drive.

Wachs will host the event with speakers to be announced shortly. This forum is free and open to the public. All are invited to participate, though seating is limited.

Lakeland was the site for the first billboard that Atheists of Florida erected in November last year. That board presented motorists with the message: "Don't believe in God? You are not alone."

Because of the words "under God," many regard the Pledge of Allegiance not simply as an expression of patriotism, but also as an expression of religious piety. Furthermore, it has been used by many as evidence that this is a religious nation; not simply in the sense that most people are religious, but rather that the government itself is founded upon religious (typically Christian) principles. This argument is deeply flawed. The first reason is that the Pledge of Allegiance does not date to the founding of America. Because it was not created until near the end of the 19th century, it cannot be read as saying anything about the nature of the United States as it was founded in the late 18th century. Secondly, the words "under God" are an even more recent addition. When the Pledge of Allegiance was originally written by Francis Bellamy on October 11, 1892, he did not use those words in any way, shape or form. Here is the original Pledge of Allegiance: I pledge allegiance to my Flag, and to the Republic for which it stands: one Nation indivisible. With Liberty and Justice for all.

Gulf Oil Disaster may have a Bad Side

Because of the geologic compromises induced by BP in its drilling operations, it is possible that a large methane gas cloud will surface, killing everything it touches, and set off a supersonic tsunami with the wave traveling somewhere between 400 to 600 miles per hour.

While the entire Gulf coastline is vulnerable, the state most exposed to the fury of a supersonic wave towering 150 to 200 feet or more is Florida. The Sunshine State only averages about 100 feet above sea level with much of the coastline and lowlands and swamps near zero elevation.

But wait, there's more...

If the deposits of methane hydroxide were not for the most part imbedded in the surface of the ocean floor, the scenario described above would actually be something to worry about. Methane hydrates are a solid ice-like form of water that contains methane gas molecules "caged" in tiny cavities. They are usually stable at the sea floor at water deeper than about 500meters (1200 ft.), usually embedded in the first 500meters of sediment. Alarmist claims as those above require more investigation at the least!



A Veto, and a Thank You

8,299 of you heard our plea to urge Gov. "For those who are concerned about government intrusion into the most personal, private decisions that individuals face, today's decision was a victory," said Courtenay Strickland, ACLU of Florida Director of Public Policy. "Had HB 1143 become law, countless Florida women would not have been able to buy health insurance that covers abortion care, even with their own money, and even if they received no government subsidy to purchase their insurance. As a result, millions of Floridians would have lost the coverage that they currently have through the private market.

I am so proud of the steadfast commitment and activism of the thousands of ACLU supporters who made their opinions known to the Governor," added Strickland. "Together, we made a difference."
