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Daniel Dennett

One of our most important living philosophers, **Dan Dennett** is best known for his provocative and controversial arguments that human consciousness and free will are the result of physical processes in the brain. He argues that the brain's computational circuitry fools us into thinking we know more than we do, and that what we call consciousness — isn't.

This mind-shifting perspective on the mind itself has distinguished Dennett's career as a philosopher and cognitive scientist. And while the philosophy community has never quite known what to make of Dennett (he defies easy categorization, and refuses to affiliate himself with accepted schools of thought), his computational approach to understanding the brain has made him, as Edge's John Brockman writes, "the philosopher of choice of the AI community."

"It's tempting to say that Dennett has never met a robot he didn't like, and that what he likes most about them is that they are philosophical experiments," Harry Blume wrote in the *Atlantic Monthly* in 1998. "To the question of whether machines can attain high -order intelligence, Dennett makes this provocative answer: 'The best reason for believing that robots might some day become conscious is that we human beings are conscious, and we are a sort of robot ourselves.""



NOW is a multi-issue political organization. NOW's self-defined role has been to initiate change for the benefit of the greatest number of people, to affect the legal and institutional structures of the society in a way that systematically expands the choices and possibilities available to all women. In this way, NOW takes action to bring women, as a class, into the mainstream of society, rather than offering aid to individual women in achieving personal solutions or temporary relief from oppression.

The Florida National Organization for Women (NOW) is in strong opposition to the Personhood Amendment ballot initiative for which the organization Personhood Florida is currently collecting signatures, according to Florida NOW president Donna Slutiak. "This amendment is ridiculous and an insult to women," Slutiak said. "The issue of Personhood would have very far reaching results, and would do more than criminalize abortion; it would also make birth control pills and the IUD illegal in the state of Florida. The amendment states that human life begins at the time when an egg is fertilized, which will also impact in-vitro-fertilization clinics. How would you like your mother's fertilized eggs that are sitting in a clinic freezer to have inheritance rights? Do you want to have to go underground to get your birth control pills?" Florida NOW expects all intelligent people to pledge not to sign this initiative, and to vote against it, if by some fluke it does get on the ballot. Personhood is bad for womanhood."

This year, the United Nations Human Rights Committee will be conducting a review of civil liberties in the United States to verify our compliance with the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights (ICCPR).

Acton-Boxborough Regional School District." The case challenges a state law that requires daily school-sponsored and teacher-led classroom recitation of the Pledge of Allegiance. Niose, on behalf of his client,

argued that the wording "under God" in the Pledge discriminates against atheists and other nonbelievers, by instilling and defining patriotism according to a god belief.




Freedom of Thought for Our World, and Our Future

Urgency builds for action on Climate Change Issues

This graph, from <u>NOAA</u>, plots how global temperatures each year are different from the average, and the steady increase in temperature is plain. The <u>upcoming IPCC report</u> will also forecast that the globe will continue to warm, alarmingly so, unless we slow and reverse the current pace of global carbon emissions.

We are coming to the realization that our place in this universe is tenuous, and very much contingent on a happy and unusual set of natural circumstances that allow for an intelligent species like ours to come into being.. But it is all too easy to see the limits of our intelligence, as we ignore our looting of the planet's resources and our profligate disruption of the natural system s that brought us into being.

But for our all our wanton indifference to the material basis of our civilization, it is still possible for us to enjoy a decent way of life for all people without inflicting upon ourselves the conditions of our own destruction. Accomplishing this would not preclude an end brought by other sources, but at least we will not be the instrument of our own destruction.

There appears to be general agreement on developing several community wide programs over the year that will allow significant speakers to be presented in our area. The costs of these programs will be shared among the organizations proportionally.


Thus substantive and exciting new activities will be offered to the Tampa Bay area that were not possible for most organizations before.







Jennifer Hancock started this organization several years ago. It uniquely serves Humanist families with a variety of wonderful programs throughout the year.



Did you know you are your connectome? Your connectome - according to neuroscientist Sebastian Seung - is how your brain's cells connect and talk to one another. The study of neuroscience is of great interest to most humanists. Not just because we are intellectual geeks who love to learn geeky new sciency things. But also because our brains is where most of our thinking happens. (Most because our neurobiology is actually spread out around our bodies and that impacts our thinking as well. Check out this <u>article on how</u> the vagina and the brain conspire to create consciousness) And yes, I'm betting that pretty much all of you will click on that link. ;D

The reason neuroscience is so interesting to me is because it cuts to the heart of what it is to be human. Our ability to think, feel, experience and be conscious is both a function of and dependent on our neurology. If it turns out that consciousness is an illusion, does that mean we have no free will? And if we have no free will, how can a philosophy, like Humanism which is dependent upon us having free will, claim to have anything useful to say about how we should try to behave?

Adam Gopnik of The New Yorker, reviewed several neurology books on this topic -see: <u>http://www.newyorker.com/arts/critics/books/2013/09/09/130909crbo_books_gopnik</u>). It's a delightful read to catch up on what has been going on and the debates about free will that are occurring within the field of neurology. But I'm mostly referring you to it because Adam concludes that Humanism has nothing to fear from the demystification of the brain: "Humanism not only has survived each of these sequential demystifications; they have made it stronger by demonstrating the power of rational inquiry on which humanism depends. Every time the world becomes less mysterious, nature becomes less frightening, and the power of the mind to grasp reality more sure. A constant reduction of mystery to matter, a belief that we can name natural rules we didn't make—that isn't scientism. That's science."

I don't know about you but I get excited whenever I see someone talking about Humanism in a major magazine especially when the topic is so relevant to our concerns as Humanists.

If someone asked you today what you wanted more than anything else JP in life, what would you say to them?

We want not only to explore the good life, but more importantly how to obtain and maintain it. Throughout history there have been all sorts of notions as to how we can achieve the two prime goals in human existence (and the answer most often given to the question above): *Happiness and Inner Peace*.

Can we find this inner Shangri-La through Jesus, Allah, Yahweh, Scientology, Hedonism, Asceticism, Atheism, No-ism? What are the basic structures of joy? Which path shall we take? How can we guide our children? These we believe are the most important questions human kind can attempt to answer. Equally important is how we can become a better role model and teacher for our children in their quest for a better life.

Two major areas will be the foundation for this section: One cerebral and one experiential. The cerebral area will largely come from the rational and scientific base of the Cognitive Behavioral approaches to mental health and well-being. The grandfather of these approaches was Dr. Albert Ellis, a pioneer who broke from the shackles of psychoanalysis and Freud to create the third major movement in Psychology. He called his reason/ scientific-based approach Rational Emotive Behavior Therapy (or Theory). The experiential area will largely come from studies on mindfulness and from Zen. In a brief but very incomplete sense, Zen is a finger pointing at the human mind and reality. It is the reality of every moment "as it is" -- from the micro to the macro. From the tiniest subatomic particle to Galaxies circulating the Universe. This helps us put our problems and plights in proper perspective. It also humbles us and helps us to see that the only authority that anyone or anything has (including Religion and Science) is ultimately because of the power we give them.

Through combining these two wisdom-based approaches to epistemology comes a sense of Freedom -- a freedom that allows us to pause and choose our actions. When the actions that we take come from a center of good will, empathy, and compassion toward others, we create a morality that can be taught from generation to generation.

When we "react" to others from a set of fixed beliefs, we lose our freedom to choose and we become mired in a world of delusion and illusion becoming like automatons. As a result, our actions often come from ill will, greed, anger, hostility and intolerance. Others who don't hold our views or beliefs become our enemy and immoral behavior based in anger often follows.

Our overall goal is Freedom. Freeing the mind of the habits that create suffering and disturbance.

<u>Naval Academy Refuses Use of Chapel for Non-</u> <u>Christian Weddings</u>



CFI Tampa Bay Member Completes Science and the Public Master's Program, Publishes Thesis

One of the most unique and instrumental features of CFI is its educational programs and resources. For instance, CFI partners with the Graduate School of Education of the University at Buffalo (UB) to offer the accredited Ed.M. program in Science and the Public. Through this online degree program, students examine the latest findings and techniques in science and technology and explore the broader philosophical, social, and cultural implications of the scientific outlook. One of our CFI Tampa Bay members, Jason Rodriguez, recently graduated from the Science and the Public program. When asked about his experience in the program, Jason stated, "The Science and the Public program is a truly unique graduate education experience. For anyone who is interested in science, the scientific method, critical thinking, current issues in science and technology, philosophy of science, and science policy, this is the degree for you. It's not only ideal for those who appreciate and advocate for science; it provides relevant, real-world tools for becoming a well-informed citizen and a better human being." As part of the program's culminating project, Jason completed a master's thesis entitled "American Science Advocacy Organizations: Examining Their Strategies and Engagements with Religion." In August, he successfully defended his thesis and had it approved for publication. Provided below is a summary of his thesis on this fascinating and controversial topic:

"The Science and the Public program is a truly unique graduate education experience...It's not only ideal for those who appreciate and advocate for science; it provides relevant, real-world tools for becoming a wellinformed citizen and a better human being."

Over the past several decades, science advocacy organizations have increasingly participated in discussions of the relationship between science and religion to the public, mainly to counteract the resurgence of anti-evolution activities across the country, to address misconceptions and misunderstandings about science and religion, and to help make science more palatable and less threatening to religious believers. These engagements with religion have primarily involved four organizations: the American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS), the National Academy of Sciences (NAS), the National Center for Science Education (NCSE), and the Smithsonian National Museum of Natural History (SNMNH). In their engagements with religion, each of these organizations has simultaneously employed two distinct lines of operation: (1) defending science against anti-science religions and movements and (2) engaging science-friendly religions and the religious public. These lines of operation are driven by key objectives and supported by specific strategies and tactics to achieve those objectives. Science advocacy organizations' approaches to discussing science and religion have generated considerable controversy. Many claim that their depictions of science and religion and their religious outreach initiatives are constructive and worthwhile, while others claim that they are inappropriately weighing in on philosophical matters and unnecessarily appearing religious people. The research for this project includes interviews with Francisco Ayala, Connie Bertka, Daniel Dennett, Barbara Forrest, Jim Miller, Ken Miller, Chris Mooney, P. Z. Myers, Massimo Pigliucci, Eugenie Scott, and Jennifer Wiseman. Based on an analysis of the research collected, this paper also provides key findings and recommendations for science advocacy organizations to consider for their ongoing and future engagements with religion.
