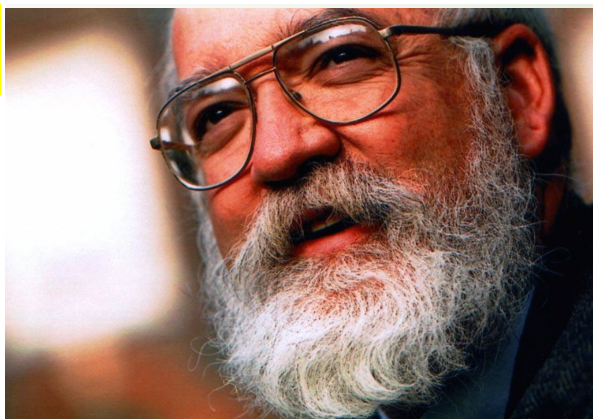

“**H**uman consciousness is just about the last surviving mystery. A mystery is a phenomenon that people don't know how to think about - yet. There have been other great mysteries: the mystery of the origin of the universe, the mystery of life and reproduction, the mystery of the design to be found in nature, the mysteries of time, space, and gravity. We do not yet have all the answers to any of the questions of cosmology and particle physics, molecular genetics and evolutionary theory, but we do know how to think about them With consciousness, however, we are still in a terrible muddle.

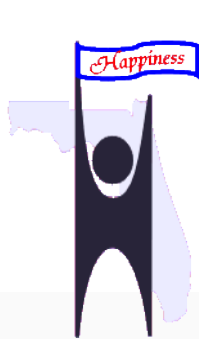

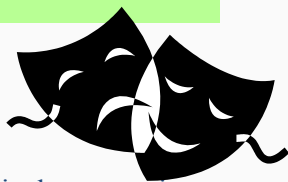

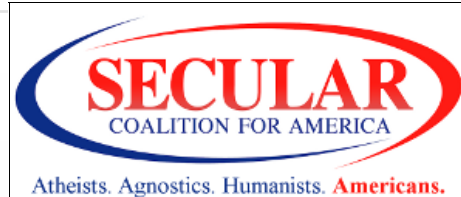

FLORIDA REPORT

Civil liberties news in the Sunshine State



Dear ACLU Supporter,

John Ferguson has been on death row for 35 years. His execution is to take place a few days from now. But Mr. Ferguson is mentally handicapped due to a traumatic brain injury at the age of 21, having been diagnosed with paranoid schizophrenia over 40 times, and therefore his execution is prohibited under the Eighth Amendment.

Demand that Governor Rick Scott stop the execution of John Ferguson due to his severe mental illness.

A federal judge declared that the state of Florida used a "patently incorrect" legal standard in determining that Ferguson was competent for execution. Governor Scott has the authority to commute Ferguson's sentence to life imprisonment.

The United States Constitution clearly bars the execution of those who have been proven to be mentally incompetent. John Ferguson has been in and out of mental institutions throughout his life. To put him to death would be a violation of his civil liberties as well as our Constitution.

Tell Governor Scott to respect the Constitution and stay the execution of a mentally incompetent man.

The Most Common Natural Disaster

Considering that flooding is the most common natural disaster in the United States, our resiliency plans should include provisions to protect against potential damage.

You may be thinking "I don't live in a flood area...this isn't for me." According to the National Flood Insurance Program, over 20% of all flood claims each year come from homes outside commonly flooded areas. In fact, homes in low risk areas received over 1/3 of all flood recovery funding in 2011.

If there is water nearby – flooding is possible.

Even areas without a water source nearby can fall victim to damaging waters when significant rainwater does not drain properly.

How do you know if you live in an area with the potential for flooding? Most local environmental agencies have resources available for residents that show high risk areas for flooding. The FEMA website has a useful tool that allows you to enter your address and receive flood risk information.

Remember that flood zones change annually and you should be checking these resources at least once a year in case projected flood zones have changed.

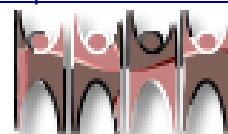

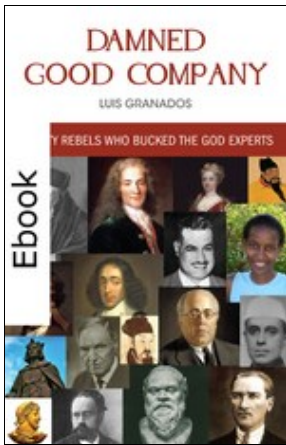
Protect Our Public Lands from Fracking

The March

This year is the [50th anniversary of the famous 1963 March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom](#), a historic event where millions of Americans from different backgrounds and beliefs called for equal civil and economic rights for African Americans. Millions of Americans know of the 1963 march, but few are aware of the humanist connection.

Contrary to popular belief, the march wasn't organized by Dr. Martin Luther King but was instead the brainchild of a humanist named Asa Philip Randolph. As a union organizer and leader of the secular wing of the Civil Rights movement, Randolph had first planned the march for July 1941.

Then two decades later, in December 1962, Randolph began planning the historic gathering we all know, with Randolph serving as march director and opening speaker. Impressed with the growing support in the black community for this new March on Washington, President John F. Kennedy delivered a speech on national television on June 11, 1963, calling for a Civil Rights Act. And then, fifty years ago today, a quarter of a million people filled half the National Mall, generating the political momentum needed for passage of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Voting Rights Act of 1965.

Randolph went on to accept the Humanist of the Year Award from the American Humanist Association in 1970 and sign Humanist Manifesto II in 1973. So on this significant anniversary, when we think of the struggles of those who worked for change, let us include in our memories one of the great humanists of the twentieth century, Asa Philip Randolph. **Roy Speckhardt**

War: A Question for Humanists

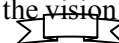
In our lifetime the prospect of war and it's reality have been more or less a constant.

Secular Recovery Programs to Be Approved by Massachusetts Medical Officials


July 1, 2013 – The AHLC has received confirmation that MA medical officials will clarify language making it clear that secular addiction treatment programs are available to health professionals under scrutiny.

Ban on "Pulpit Politicking" Protects Taxpayers, Religious Believers

Religious leaders today released a report that calls for an end to the Internal Revenue Service policy that bans tax-exempt organizations, such as houses of worship and nonprofit groups, from engaging in partisan political activities (news coverage [here](#) and [here](#)).

The [94-page report](#) argues that the ban, which was [enacted in 1954](#), restricts the freedom of speech of religious leaders who consider religious and political expression inextricably tied, and that clergy should be able to say "whatever they believe is appropriate" without any fear of punishment.

The report was prepared by the Evangelical Council for Financial Accountability's (ECFA) [Commission on Accountability and Policy for Religious Organizations](#), and represents the views held by the leaders of dozens of major religious denominations and nonprofit organizations. It was delivered to Sen. Charles Grassley (R-Iowa), who has worked in concert with the ECFA on this issue for years.

But, despite claims made by authors of the report, the ban on partisan political activities by tax-exempt organizations is based on sound reasoning.

First, the ban protects taxpayers from essentially allowing partisan political advocacy on their dime. Opponents of the ban claim that it unfairly restricts houses of worship and nonprofits from addressing elections and political issues. It should be noted that the ban does not bar leaders of tax-exempt outfits from speaking about what their religion purports to be true, or how religious beliefs and values relate to hot-button political issues. It simply bars them from taking explicit stands on political parties and candidates.

But, more to the point: houses of worship and nonprofits are not forced to apply for, or receive, tax-exempt status. They choose to do so because of the benefits provided by such a classification. In return, the government requires these groups to not engage in partisan politicking. This prevents groups from receiving tax breaks, then turning around and using the money saved to influence political elections.

Second, the ban protects religious believers from having their houses of religious worship turn into houses of political worship. Opponents of the ban claim that clergy should be able to endorse or oppose political parties and candidates. But houses of worship are centered on spiritual teaching, support, and guidance -- not outright partisan political promotion. The ban allows religious believers to choose between and belong to congregations without fearing that they will not fit in due to their political affiliation or support for political candidates.

For instance, read what some religious leaders are saying:

"My concern is what that kind of change would make to the integrity and the unity of the church itself," said Rev. C. Welton Gaddy, president of The Interfaith Alliance. "It's about the sanctity of the religious voice in the context of worship and to compromise that authority would be devastating to religion in America."

Or, as [expressed](#) by Rev. Barry Lynn of Americans United for Separation of Church and State: "Americans ... attend houses of worship for spiritual solace, not partisan preaching."

As it turns out, most Americans agree: [numerous surveys](#) have found that roughly two-thirds of Americans believe houses of worship should not endorse political candidates or parties.

The real problem with the IRS ban is not the ban itself, which most Americans believe is a good policy, for good reasons. The real problem is that the IRS does not enforce the ban. You might recall that in December 2012, the Center for Inquiry and American Humanist Association [sent a letter](#) to the IRS voicing shared concerns and disappointment regarding the agency's lack of action against churches which are blatantly violating laws that prohibit 501(c)(3) organizations from endorsing political candidates and parties.

Incredibly, those who oppose the ban actually uses this as an argument against the ban. If the IRS cannot consistently and coherently enforce the ban, they ask, why have it?

Because the ban protects American taxpayers and religious believers. That's why.

The IRS politicking ban doesn't need to go. The IRS politicking ban needs to be enforced.

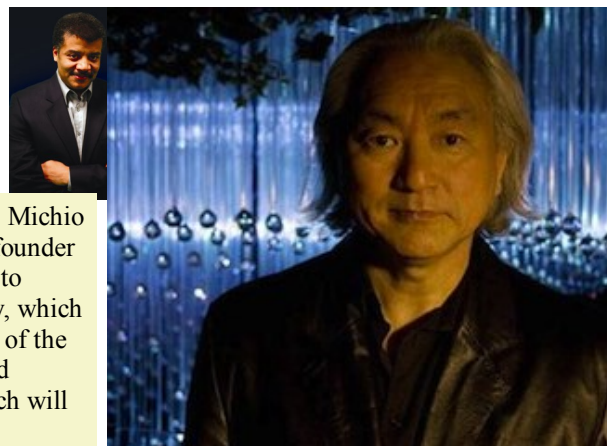

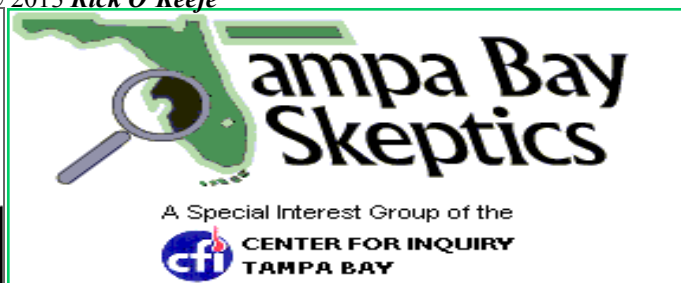
