Raising Happy Children

More children are "growing up godless" than at any other time in our nation's history. They are the offspring of an expanding secular population that includes a relatively new and burgeoning category of Americans called the "Nones," so nicknamed because they identified themselves as believing in "nothing in particular" in a 2012 study by the Pew Research Center.

So how does the raising of upstanding, moral children work without prayers at mealtimes and morality lessons at Sunday school? Quite well, it seems.

Far from being dysfunctional, nihilistic and rudderless without the security and rectitude of religion, secular households provide a sound and solid foundation for children, according to Vern Bengston, a USC professor of gerontology and sociology.

He was surprised by what he found: High levels of family solidarity and emotional closeness between parents and nonreligious youth, and strong ethical standards and moral values that had been clearly articulated as they were imparted to the next generation. Full online discussion here.

2017 - A Post Carbon End-of- Year Review From the World Resources Institute.

For CO2 emissions to fall, they first have to peak. And research published this year suggests that this is already happening.

The report, produced by the US-based World Resources Institute (WRI), suggests that 49 countries – which include the UK, US, Australia, Brazil and Canada – have seen their emissions peak, representing around 36% of current global emissions. But how much time does the world collectively have left to reduce its emissions in order to avoid dangerous climate change?

At the beginning of the year, <u>Carbon Brief</u> published our traditional carbon budget update, revealing that just four years of current CO2 emissions would blow what's left of the budget for a good chance of keeping global temperature rise to 1.5C.

However, in September, a new study published in Nature Geoscience proposed that there might be a little more breathing space to meet the 1.5C limit than previously thought.

As lead author Dr Richard Millar explained in a guest post, the study estimates the remaining 1.5C carbon budget from today onwards. This contrasts to previous methods which have been based on cumulative emissions to date. As a result, Millar's study put the remaining 1.5C budget at around 20 years of current emissions.

The paper caused quite a stir, with parts of the media claiming that climate models – the basis for carbon budget estimates – are "wrong" and have overstated the observed warming of the planet.

Carbon Brief <u>factchecked</u> these claims, showing that the model-observation comparisons in the study depend greatly on the dataset and model outputs used by the authors. The authors also published their <u>own response</u> with Carbon Brief, pointing out that they "present no evidence in our paper to suggest that future CO2-induced warming under any emissions scenario will be lower than the projections given in AR5 [the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change's fifth assessment report]".

425 million tons

The world's tropical forests can no longer be considered a carbon sink. In fact, a global rise in deforestation and land degradation has caused tropical forests to become a net emitter of carbon, a study found. It concluded that the world's rainforests had a net loss of around 425m tons of carbon from 2003 to 2014.

In other news, scientists were also forced to reconsider the

role that livestock play in global emissions. In September, a study found that recent methane emissions from livestock were 11% higher than previous estimates suggested.

However, this recalculation is unlikely to seriously dent efforts to meet the climate goals of the Paris Agreement, <u>Carbon Brief analysis</u> revealed. It found that revised methane emissions could have decreased the remaining carbon budget for limiting warming to 1.5C by 1-2%.

2nd (or 3rd) warmest year

Despite the <u>lack of an El Nino</u> event to drive up global temperatures, 2017 is still shaping up to be either the <u>second or third</u> <u>warmest</u> year on record, depending on the <u>organisation</u> <u>measuring</u> temperatures. This year now seems certain to be the warmest non-El Nino year recorded.

The temperatures in 2017 are in-line with what climate models <u>have projected</u> and show continued rapid warming <u>since the 1970s</u>. This is true both in raw and adjusted temperature records, as adjustments have little impact in recent years and actually <u>reduce long-term global warming</u>.

Nassau County textbook challenge: "Bacteria to man evolution is not supported by science"

Nassau County is the first school district I'm aware of that has been faced with a citizen's challenge to topics in the schools' science instructional materials. I told you about this back in early November (Nassau County complaint: "stop promoting this scientifically inadequate theory of evolution as fact to our students"). The disgruntled citizen is 71-year-old Jay Shutt who says he retired after 40 years of teaching. His complaint to the school district earned him an official hearing in front of an appointed hearing officer Nov. 1. I obtained the materials from that hearing (Download here: Evolution Materials Nassau County). It's a lengthy PDF that contains Shutt's original complaint, the script he read from during the hearing, and the hearing officer's summary of evidence.

Here's his opening:

It is my goal to demonstrate to the Board that the material concerning evolution presented in the 3 textbooks I reviewed are not entirely accurate, objective, balanced, and noninflammatory, nor are they suited to the needs of the students.

His script is a good old fashioned romp through one quote mine after another straight out of the standard creationist playbook. It starts with attacks on the veracity of evolutionary theory, then evidence for a young earth, and by the end of the 15 page lecture he's preaching about the merits of the Bible as 100% accurate in all things. Here's his finale:

However, my hope and prayer is the Nassau Board of Education will not only mandate macro-evolution and an old earth not be taught as facts, but will allow Bibles to once again be distributed to our students. And further the Board would use its influence with the state of Florida to bring back legalized corporate prayer and Bible reading to our schools

That's really reaching and it's not what the school board will consider at its Dec. 14 meeting. Instead, they'll consider whether to put disclaimer stickers in all of the science textbooks that feature evolution. Here's Shutt's suggested disclaimer sticker: This book contains material that leads the reader to believe that "bacteria to man" evolution and an old earth of 4.5 billion years are

"bacteria to man" evolution and an old earth of 4.5 billion years are proven scientific facts. Creation scientists would argue that there are dozens and dozens of scientific observations that indicated the earth is young, only several thousand years old.

Additionally, creation scientists would argue that bacteria to man evolution is impossible because (1) living things only come from living things, not from matter and energy. (2) living cells need information to live and function. That information must come from an intelligent source. It cannot come from matter and energy, and (3) life is too complex to be explained by natural selection and chance beneficial mutations. The human genome has 3 billion base pairs, and the human brain operates faster than 30 trillion calculations per second, exponentially faster than any computer. Cont. next column.

The recommendation the school district staff is making to the board is to "Continue using the challenged textbooks without placing a disclaimer in them." You can see that document here: Cover Sheet Agenda Statement for Textbook Challenge Nassau. However, I'm a bit worried that during the hearing, the only counterargument presented by the school district was that replacing the textbooks would be expensive.



At the international level, the OPP supports the work of CFI at the United Nations by lobbying Congress and the State Department on UN-related issues.

CFI at the United Nations – The Center for Inquiry is a non-governmental organization (NGO) with special consultative status under the UN Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC). It maintains official representation at UN headquarters in New York and UN offices in Geneva and Vienna, where it works to defend the secular, scientific outlook in the international community.


Legal Department f— iles amicus briefs in cases involving First Amendment rights, reproductive freedom, assistance in dying and other issues of importance CFI and its supporters. Where appropriate, the Center or one of its affiliates, such as the Council for Secular Humanism, may file its own lawsuit. In addition, the Legal Department will also consider offering free legal assistance to individuals who believe that their constitutional rights are in jeopardy or that they have experienced discrimination because they are not religious.



Before he began his recent travels, it seemed to Phil Zuckerman as if humans all over the globe were "getting religion" praising deities, performing holy rites, and soberly defending the world from sin. But most residents of Denmark and Sweden, he found, don't worship any god at all, don't pray, and don't give much credence to religious dogma of any kind. Instead of being bastions of sin and corruption, however, as the Christian Right has suggested a godless society would be, these countries are filled with residents who score at the very top of the "happiness index" and enjoy their healthy societies, which boast some of the lowest rates of violent crime in the world (along with some of the lowest levels of corruption), excellent educational systems, strong economies, well-supported arts, free health care, egalitarian social policies, outstanding bike paths, and great beer.

Zuckerman formally interviewed nearly 150 Danes and Swedes of all ages and educational backgrounds over the course of fourteen months. He was particularly interested in the worldviews of people who live their lives without religious orientation. How do they think about and cope with death? Are they worried about an afterlife? What he found is that nearly all of his interviewees live their lives without much fear of the Grim Reaper or worries about the hereafter. This led him to wonder how and why it is that certain societies are non-religious in a world that seems to be marked by increasing religiosity. Drawing on prominent sociological theories and his own extensive research, Zuckerman ventures some interesting answers.

This fascinating approach directly counters the claims of outspoken, conservative American Christians who argue that a society without God would be hell on earth. It is crucial, Zuckerman believes, for Americans to know that "society without God is not only possible, but it can be quite civil and pleasant."





On Monday, December 4, 2017, I hosted a showing of the documentary Contradiction, by Black atheist Jeremiah Camara. I appeared in the 2014 documentary that deals with theism – primarily Christianity – in the Black community.

The film was very well-received and there was a lively discussion that followed. Most of those in attendance were theists and two Afrocentric individuals had some defenses of theism. One man, a local college instructor, made several comments. He did not like the title of the film. He pointed out that rather than a contradiction, Black religion is a paradox.

That is to say, it might appear to be contradictory, but deeper thought reveals its conflicting truths. I disagree. Religion in general and "holy" books in particular are filled with contradictions.

Moreover, the main contradiction that the documentary sought to highlight was the large number of Black churches (estimated at 85,0000) in the U.S. with the widespread poverty, suffering, ill health, etc. found among African Americans. If we spend so much time, money and prayer on spirituality, why are we at the bottom where the major quality of life indicators are concerned? That is a blatant contradiction.

Finding an on-site service project on a small budget can be a challenge. Here's a meaningful solution and a resource site with everything you need to host this project at your next event, conference, or meeting! The *Positive Postcard Project* shares messages of human connection and love that can inspire, comfort, or uplift a recipient of any faith or non-faith perspective.

This is important. Many support card and note projects come from churches and other organizations that are biased towards theism and proselytizing. These cards often contain language that not only isn't meaningful or relevant to non-theistic people, but can further victimize or even isolate them, thereby increasing their burden, and causing unnecessary grief and anxiety during their times of need.

People who identify as non-theistic are all around us, and they, too, are among those in need. They deserve resources, support, representation, comfort, care, and love. Positive Postcards engages secular communities and our secular-friendly allies by providing that support and encouragement. The project can also be hosted at public events, educating theistic faith communities about respecting the diverse perspectives of those who receive cards or letters such as these.

A person's time of turmoil, challenge, or disadvantage should not be an opportunity to market religious belief or no preference. We don't know the perspective of the person receiving the card and therefore should <u>craft messages that speak to any recipient</u>—unapologetically inclusive and loving. As non-theists, we're empowered and emotionally intelligent to ensure that members of our shared values community are respected and supported. As Humanists, we have a responsibility to seek the means to uplift others and make the world a better place.
