Repeal Blasphemy Laws

Exciting news! Yesterday, Representatives Raskin (D-MD) and Meadows (R-NC) introduced House Resolution 512 to support the repeal of blasphemy laws globally. This necessary resolution strongly encourages the State Department to make the repeal of blasphemy laws a priority in their relationships with foreign nations.

More than 70 nations around the world still have blasphemy laws that endanger the lives of those who do not conform to the state's official religion or worldview. Christians, Muslims, Hindus, nontheists and other religious minorities are all at risk. These laws have dire consequences; conviction can mean life in prison or a death sentence.

Joint efforts to move the needle have been working. Recently, countries such as Greece, Ireland, and Canada have repealed their blasphemy laws and more are considering bringing these draconian laws to an end. Can you take a moment right now to ask your Representative to cosponsor H.Res.512?

In today's divided political climate, Republicans and Democrats have come together to say that this issue is too important for politics. That's because the issue of religious freedom, which includes the right to believe any faith or none at all, is something that all Americans can support. Will you join us in supporting international religious freedom by asking your Representative to cosponsor this resolution?

Many people don't know what biodiversity means

by Brandon Keim | Jul 24, 2019 Since being adopted by scientists in the mid-1980s, the word 'biodiversity' has become a default term for describing nature and its significance. We're in the midst of a biodiversity crisis; biodiversity loss threatens human well-being; citizen scientists monitor their local biodiversity; and so on. The word is so ubiquitous that its comprehension by the public is taken for granted—yet a great many people don't even know what it means.

"It seems prudent for communicators to use 'biodiversity' cautiously," write ecologists led by Michael Weston of Australia's Deakin University in the journal Pacific Conservation Biology. "At the very least, anyone using this term should provide a definition with it."

Weston, joined by fellow Deakin ecologist Heather Kiley and Gillian Ainsworth of Charles Darwin University, prompted 499 demographically representative residents of the Australian state of Victoria with the question, "What does the term 'biodiversity' mean to you?"

Nearly 50 percent of the respondents either said they didn't know what it meant, or furnished an answer that had little to do with the accepted scientific definition: a diversity of species, genetic heritage, and ecosystems. Some 18 percent mentioned either plants or animals, or described concepts like harmony and balance. That left just one-third with an understanding that tracked the scientific—and even they didn't necessarily mention each of biodiversity's three aspects.

When the researchers cross-referenced the results with demographic information, they found no relationship to income or sex. Only education had a significant effect, with two-thirds of people who'd attended college having at least a rough idea of what biodiversity is.

Accelerating our Choices

There's a growing consensus that the next 18 months will be critical in dealing with the global heating crisis, among other environmental challenges.

Last year, the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) reported that to keep the rise in global temperatures below 1.5C this century, emissions of carbon dioxide would have to be cut by 45% by 2030.

But today, observers recognize that the decisive, political steps to enable the cuts in carbon to take place will have to happen before the end of next year.

The idea that 2020 is a firm deadline was eloquently addressed by one of the world's top climate scientists, speaking back in 2017.

"The climate math is brutally clear: While the world can't be healed within the next few years, it may be fatally wounded by negligence until 2020," said Hans Joachim Schellnhuber, founder and now director emeritus of the Potsdam Climate Institute.

The sense that the end of next year is the last chance saloon for climate change is becoming clearer all the time.

"I am firmly of the view that the next 18 months will decide our ability to keep climate change to survivable levels and to restore nature to the equilibrium we need for our survival," said Prince Charles, speaking at a reception for Commonwealth foreign ministers recently.

So why are the next 18 months so important?

The Prince was looking ahead to a series of critical UN meetings that are due to take place between now and the end of 2020.

Ever since a global climate agreement was signed in Paris in December 2015, negotiators have been consumed with arguing about the rulebook for the pact.

But under the terms of the deal, countries have also promised to improve their carbon-cutting plans by the end of next year. One of the understated headlines in last year's IPCC report was that global emissions of carbon dioxide must peak by 2020 to keep the planet below 1.5C.

Current plans are nowhere near strong enough to keep temperatures below the so-called safe limit. Right now, we are heading towards 3C of heating by 2100 not 1.5.

As countries usually scope out their plans over five and 10 year timeframes, if the 45% carbon cut target by 2030 is to be met then the plans really need to be on the table by the end of 2020.





Do Inalienable Rights Exist?

"We hold these truths to be self-evident", wrote Thomas Jefferson in the Declaration of Independence, "That all men are created equal, and are endowed by their creator with certain inalienable rights...". The word inalienable is usually taken to mean "can't be taken away from", but dictionaries also include a second meaning — that they can't even be given away by the possessor.


In this view, governments may not recognize a person's rights, but they would still exist. The government would only be limiting their expression. John Locke argued that even if a people chose to surrender freedom for safety and security, for example, it would still be wrong for the government to deny them. They are considered natural rights, and are part of natural law.

A contrasting theory would be that of Thomas Hobbes. In his view, before governments, humans had a right to everything, even to cannibalize each other. Because this would be chaotic and dangerous, humans agreed to surrender their rights to a government so that they could live and survive together.

But this raises questions – does this then mean that a society is never wrong in denying a particular right, if the society agrees to surrender it? What if a sizable majority agrees to surrender or deny a right, but a minority disagrees. Does the minority still possess the right, but simply is being repressively denied of it?


No longer could taxpayer funded adoption and foster care agencies cite religion to discriminate against atheist, LGBTQ, or religious minority children and potential parents.





Dominion theology (also known as **dominionism**) is a group of Christian political ideologies that seek to institute a nation governed by Christians based on their personal understandings of biblical law. Extents of rule and ways of achieving governing authority are varied. For example, dominion theology can include theonomy, but does not necessarily involve advocating Mosaic law as the basis of government. The label is applied primarily toward groups of Christians in the United States.

Prominent adherents of these ideologies are otherwise theologically diverse, including Calvinist Christian reconstructionism, Roman Catholic Integralism, Charismatic/Pentecostal Kingdom Now theology, New Apostolic Reformation, and others. Most of the contemporary movements labeled dominion theology arose in the 1970s from religious movements asserting aspects of Christian nationalism.

Some have applied the term *dominionist* more broadly to the whole Christian right. This usage is controversial. There are concerns from members of these communities that this is a label being used to marginalize Christians from public discourse. Others [who?] argue this allegation can be difficult to sympathize with considering the political power already held by these groups and on account of the often verbally blatant intention of these groups to influence the political, social, financial, and cultural spectrums of society for a specific religion, often at the expense of other marginalized groups.

When Superstition Replaces Science

L. Sprague De Camp wrote *The Ancient Engineers*, in which he elucidated why the budding of science in the age of pre-imperial Rome rapidly faded in the West during the Principate. Afterward, it took nearly 1,400 years before Europe began to recover, and a few centuries thereafter for reason and reality to overcome the brutal opposition of religion. The following is excerpted from De Camp's book (pp. 254–256).

In commenting on the growing dominance of credulity and religion, Seneca wrote that "... far from advance being made toward the discovery of what the older generations left insufficiently investigated, many of their discoveries are being lost." (Seneca: *Quaestiones naturales*, VII, xxiv, 4.)

De Camp continues: There was no active discouragement of Science under [Imperial] Rome, at least before Christianity came into power. But science has to compete for attention, belief, respect, interest, and financial support with politics, commerce, art, literature, religion, entertainment, sport, war, and all the other areas of human activity. If any of these interests greatly expands its appeal to the people, it does so at the expense of the others.

Now, the great intellectual movement of the classical world under the Principate was towards supernaturalism; that is, religion, mysticism, and magic. There was nothing new about these. All went back to primitive times. Mystery cults had flourished in Greece from -500 on and probably earlier if the record were complete. But, under Rome, those who exploited the human love of the marvelous and fear of the unknown made striking advances in methods, just as metal workers learned to make brass and glaziers to make windowpanes. They found that it added to their following and advanced their own power, glory, and wealth to flourish a body of sacred writings wherewith to confound the heathen; to promise lavish rewards and punishments after death, in order to right the injustices of earthly life; to set up a tightly knit, far-flung, conspiratorial organization; to expound a verbose and seemingly logical body of spiritual doctrine; to impose a fixed code of morals and tabus-some reasonable and some purely arbitrary-on their followers; and, most of all, to incite a fanatical hatred of rival groups and a grim determination to win the world to one's own faith. All these procedures were inventions, just as much as Heron's toy steam engine. With these new techniques, the priests, prophets, and magicians could more effectively compete for public attention and support. Credulity they redefined as "faith", and fanaticism as "zeal", while respect for laws of cause and effect was condemned as "blind materialism."

The success of a cult depended upon its fidelity to these principles.

This success, needless to say, had nothing to do with the objective truth of its doctrines, any more than the success of a modern advertising campaign has to do with the virtues of the cigarette or detergent being sold.

As a result, the world witnessed a great "return to religion." The new cults grew swiftly. The old Greek and Roman polytheisms, with no central organization, no theology but a mass of childish and inconsistent myths, and no particular doctrine of future life, crumbled before the tide. The worship of Kybelê, Mithra, Isis, Yahveh, Serapis, Abraxas, and Christ waxed mighty. The magical cults of the Neopythagoreans, the Neoplatonists, and the Gnostics throve. The pseudo-science of astrology flourished, and hedge-wizards like Simon Magus swarmed.

The methods listed above had already, before the Christian era, appeared to some extent in Judaism and Zoroastrianism. So it is not surprising that the strongest of the new religions should prove to be Christianity and Mithraism, heretical offshoots of Judaism and Zoroastrianism respectively.

... Who wanted to spend years in pursuit of some obscure natural law, or pay somebody else to do so, when by joining one of the new cults you got drama, passion, mystery, a feeling of superiority to all non-members, and a promise of eternal bliss in heaven? ... Strabon of Amasia, the great geographer of the time of Augustus, knew what he was talking about when he remarked: "The great mass of women and common people cannot be induced by mere force of reason to devote themselves to piety, virtue, and honesty. Superstition must therefore be employed, and even this is insufficient without the aid of the marvelous and the terrible." (Strabo, I, ii, 8.) But supernaturalism is not, on the whole, friendly to science and technology, and there is no use pretending that it is.

Our dear departed friend **Jack Robinson** had his own views of what science terminology is and as it should be used. Here is what he shared with CFI OnCampus group Freethinkers@USF, way back in 2000.

Some science concepts and terminology

By Prof. Jack H. Robinson, March 4,2000

One of our goals as Freethinkers is "to overcome ignorance through science and logic". The pursuit of this goal will be facilitated if we all have the same understanding of important scientific concepts and related terminology. Therefore, I offer the following definitions and explanations.

Fact: Something that's known with virtual certainty. In science, facts are typically descriptions of things or actions, determined empirically (i.e., by observation, direct or indirect); and they are expressed by simple descriptive statements, e.g.: The Earth is spherical with mean diameter approximately 8000 miles. The acceleration due to gravity at the Earth's surface is approximately 32 ft/sec per sec. The Sun's surface temperature is about 10,000° F. The last fact was determined by indirect observation, but it was found by applying three different theories that are independent of each other, and they all gave the same result.

Law: A statement and/or algebraic equation that indicates the relationship between two or more variables. Example, the "law of gravity": Every object in the universe attracts every other object, with a force that is directly proportional to each of their masses, and inversely proportional to the square of the distance between them; i.e., $F = G \text{ Mm/d}^2$. This law is now considered to be superseded by Einstein's General Theory of Relativity/Gravitation; but Newton's law is still correct to an excellent degree of approximation, and it is preferred (for its simplicity) unless extremely high speeds or very strong gravitational fields are involved.

Hypothesis: A tentative statement of a fact, law, or theory—which has yet to be verified. Cold fusion (the idea that hydrogen nuclei could be fused into helium nuclei at ordinary temperatures) was "only a hypothesis"; and when it was further tested, it was cast into great doubt--virtually disproved.

Theory: A well verified idea or set of ideas that relate and explain a number of facts and perhaps laws as well. For example, the Newtonian theory of the solar system (based on Newton's law of gravity and his laws of motion) relates and explains Kepler's three laws of planetary motion; it also explains—and enables us to predict—many facts about the Earth, other planets, satellites, comets, asteroids, and about

processes that go on within the solar system.

Notes: When a hypothesis is well verified, it becomes a fact, law, or theory--according to its nature. If anyone says, "Evolution is only a theory", or talks about a theory becoming a fact, that person misunderstands how most scientists use the terms and concepts discussed above.

P.S. A few legitimate, accomplished scientists do use the above terms differently. For example, they may say, "Evolution is a fact," or they may say "theory" instead of "hypothesis". Perhaps they do this so as to better communicate with the general public.

Trump Orders Pence to Find Passage in Bible Where Jesus Tells People to Get the Hell Out

After a shaken Pence said that he would "see what I can find," Trump reportedly demanded that the Vice-President also locate a passage where Jesus calls journalists "the lowest form of life."

Are vitamins a waste of money? A new study says yes

For decades, <u>Consumer Reports</u> laid out the facts on vitamin/mineral supplements. There is nothing new that is contraindicatory. People remain immune to reality, to the tune of billions of dollars. A major

new study reinforces that conclusion—supplements and diets will not improve health, prevent disease, or extend life.

"If there's a known micronutrient deficiency, then it would behoove someone to supplement," says Vaishnava. In other words, don't drop your dietary supplement because of this study if you're taking one prescribed by your physician or nutritionist. "What does help you live a longer, heart-healthy life? Eating a healthy diet. As Moyer points out: "You can't out-supplement an unhealthy diet. It's very much along this 'take a pill and everything will be okay' mentality we have with health and medicine."

"Bottom line: If you eat a healthy, well-balanced diet and do not have any nutritional deficiencies, you don't need to pop those vitamin and mineral supplements." Full report: https://yhoo.it/2M25mum

Human Space Exploration: Our History or Our Future?

It has been almost 50 years since man first ventured into space (Yuri Gagarin, 1961). Forty years ago, the world was glued to TV sets watching the Apollo 13 crisis play out. Thirty-eight years ago, Gene Cernan became the last man on the moon. The entire history of manned spaceflight beyond low-earth orbit spanned three-and-a-half years.

Since then, we have seen lots of big space exploration plans. The current Space Shuttle and

International Space Station owe much to Ronald Reagan's desire to see humans maintain a presence in space. George H.W. Bush announced the "Mission to Planet Earth," and put Vice President Quayle in charge of a panel to explore a mission to Mars. When the price tag came in, \$500-billion spread out over two decades, the administration and Congress quickly lost interest.

President Clinton put the nail in the coffin of American manned space exploration when he opted for "faster, better, cheaper" as the way to go, hoping that the Shuttle program could become as ubiquitous as milk runs. In his turn at the helm, President Bush heralded a broad plan for a Mars mission by 2020. The Constellation program, announced in 2005, envisioned the development of new booster rockets to replace the Shuttle and get us to the moon, and new spacecraft (Orion and Altair) to take humans to the moon and Mars.

After five years of lackluster progress, hampered in large part by a combination of inadequate funding and cost overruns, President Obama recently announced that the Constellation program would be canceled and that America would rely on private industry rather than the federal government to keep the Space Station accessible to astronauts and to get us beyond low-earth orbit and on to the planets and stars.

There has been an outcry of protest since this was announced. The Senators from Florida and Texas (the two states most affected by lost federal jobs and money) have promised opposition to this plan (nothing like federal pork to get politicians from opposite parties together). Former astronauts have bemoaned the abandonment of space exploration. Gene Cernan called the plan "a blueprint for a mission to nowhere."

Not all have been opposed to the new plan, however. The commercial space industry is obviously delighted at the influx of funding that is soon coming its way. Planetary scientists at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory are hoping that some of the unspent human exploration funds will be diverted to their robotic missions. And the American taxpayers will not be asked to foot yet another spending bill in a heavily indebted economy.

In response to such opposition, however, President Obama has indicated that there might be some compromises, allowing development of some additional booster capabilities and a very long-range plan to go to Mars, maybe by 2030.

This history of space flight points to one obvious fact. Our willingness to support a full space program must rely on something

beyond its economics. Forget all the talk about how the space program pays for itself in innovations that filter down into society. That is absolutely true, but taxpayers want something for their money right now, not down the road. "Why should I pay for a bunch of people to bounce around the moon when we have problems enough of our own right here on earth?"

The only reason we were able to move so quickly from the first man in space to the first man on the moon had to do with their respective nation-alities, Russian and American. As has been so well documented elsewhere, the sole impetus for the "Space Race" was the Cold War, not a love of science nor a "desire to explore." Lacking the military and international pressures to succeed in space, we are destined to a future of low-earth orbit.

There is one hope, however -- the Chinese. While we are winding down our ability to transport humans into space, the Chinese are embarked on their own visions of space exploration. Current Chinese plans call for a manned moon landing by 2020, followed by a mission to Mars. With the GDP of China growing at an aggressive rate, fueled in large part by America's desire to buy Chinese goods and borrow money from China to support our burgeoning federal debt, China is currently a better bet at beating us back to the moon. Once that reality starts to sink in, politicians will wring their hands at the "loss of American prestige," and voters will likely be more willing to support expensive and inefficient crash programs to try and catch up. There's nothing like a good international rivalry, a "death match to the finish," to stoke the fires.

Very little of this debate has to do with actual science. Oh sure, we all know that a human exploring the surface of Mars is much better than little can-do robots like the Spirit and Opportunity rovers. It goes without saying, however, that you can deploy an entire battalion of robots to cover the surface of Mars a lot more cheaply than sending fragile humans there. A broken robot can set back a program hardly at all. A dead human can set back a manned program by years.


But, alas, even our unmanned missions are suffering. In May, a review panel of scientists and engineers concluded that NASA is experiencing a decline in basic research, jeopardizing its ability to explore our solar system. NASA's ten research centers were found by the panel to be "marginally adequate." Most of the research centers are more than 40 years old and have been deferring needed maintenance for several years due to lack of funding. At the current rate of funding, said one panel member, "In five years the research community would not be able to support NASA's long-term goals."

And it is not only space research that is suffering. Aeronautics research has seen a 50% decrease since 2005. America may soon lose its edge in basic research. The impact of such a tendency is much like eating the "seed corn" necessary for next year's crop.


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

There was a time in the not-too-distant past when I believed that it did not really matter who became the President of the U.S. I was of the opinion that any moron could reach that position without any serious damage being done to the nation.

However, President Donald Trump has quickly disabused me of that foolish notion. Trump is the most anti-intellectual, antiscience, hopelessly irrational, conspiracy-minded president in the history of this nation. And the damage that he could do to the world is truly terrifying. Recently, Trump has been in the news for his willingness to speak with President Kim Jong Un of North Korea about denuclearization. However, what has not received front-page news coverage is the fact that he has done so without the help of a White House science adviser.

According to a story by Coral Davenport in the New York Times: Trump is the first president since 1941 not to name a science adviser, a position created during World War II to guide the Oval Office on technical matters ranging from nuclear warfare to global pandemics.

As a businessman and president, Trump has proudly been guided by his instincts. Nevertheless, people who have participated in past nuclear negotiations say the absence of such high-level expertise could put him at a tactical disadvantage in one of the weightiest diplomatic matters of his presidency. ("In the Trump administration, science and advice have been made unwelcome," the Buffalo News, June 10, 2018, p. A4.)

The story goes on to quote R. Nicholas Burns, who headed negotiations with India about nuclear power for civilian uses during the Presidency of George W. Bush. Burns pointed out that without a powerful senior science adviser at the negotiations, the U.S. is at a clear disadvantage. "You can be sure the other side will have that," he said.



The article summed up leadership under Trump as "the death of science in shaping U.S. policy." As evidence supporting this disturbing claim, the story related: There is no chief scientist at the State Department, where science is central to foreign policy matters such as cybersecurity and global warming. Nor is there a

chief scientist at the Department of Agriculture. Trump last year nominated Sam Clovis, a former talk show host with no scientific background, to the position, but he withdrew his name and no new nomination has been made. (Emphasis added.)

The article pointed out that due to Trump's war on science, the Interior Department and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration have done away with their committees addressing climate science. Moreover, the Food and Drug Administration eliminated its Food Advisory Committee that addressed the issue of food safety.

All of this is added to the long-known fact that government scientists complain that the Trump Administration is squashing their research. Trump is alienating scientists to the point where many of them are moving to other countries to do their research.

Trump is, in many ways, dumbing down the United States. Trump has taken the lead in attacking Obama's climate change policies. The article quoted William K. What are the steps?

The first major hurdle will be the special climate summit called by UN Secretary General Antonio Guterres, which will be held in New York on 23 September.

Mr Guterres has been clear that he only wants countries to come to the UN if they can make significant offers to improve their national carbon cutting plans.

This will be followed by COP25 in Santiago, Chile, where the most important achievement will likely be keeping the process moving forward.

"And we need at COP26 to ensure other countries are serious about their obligations and that means leading by example. Together we must take all the steps necessary to restrict global warming to at least 1.5C."

The researchers don't speculate in their findings as to the consequences of this limited awareness for Australia's biodiversity, which is declining at calamitous rates even as the country's government is pilloried by conservationists for largely failing to take meaningful action. That so few people even comprehend what's being lost can't help, though.

"I suspect this is one contributor to Australia's biodiversity extinction crisis," Weston says. And Australia certainly isn't alone: one survey found that only one-third of Europeans say they know what biodiversity is.

Given the importance of public engagement, Weston and colleagues recommend that conservation communicators do a better job of explaining what biodiversity means when speaking to general audiences, or else use more intuitive language. The "balance of life," for example, or "richness of life," may better resonate.

"Perhaps, like commercial marketing campaigns, governments and the science community need to express the concept of biodiversity in a variety of ways to maximize engagement," they write. "More radically, the term could be avoided when engaging with the public."

That would be radical indeed. Yet if—to paraphrase the oft-quoted Senegalese forester Baba Dioum—people only conserve what they love, and only love what they understand, the reliance of scientists and conservationists on a term that many people don't understand is reason for concern.

Extreme Heat in Miami Will Only Get Worse, Scientists Warn

Dr. Cheryl Holder was volunteering at the Overtown Music & Arts Festival this past weekend when an 11-year-old girl became extremely ill. The temperature was in the low 90s, but the heat index level — a combination of heat and humidity that more accurately explains what the temperature feels like — was closer to triple digits. Noticing the girl was displaying early stages of heat exhaustion, Holder provided water and cooled the child down with a cold compress until emergency medical technicians arrived.

Miami has broken heat records left and right this summer, but scientists say this is just the beginning. A study published this morning by the Union of Concerned Scientists reveals an extremely hot future for the Southeast United States.

"If we don't take drastic action to reduce carbon emissions, then most people in the United States will be experiencing a lot more killer heat days," says Juan Declet-Barreto, a climate scientist for the Union of Concerned Scientists and one of the report's authors. "We're putting millions of people in danger."

Florida averages 125 days per year with a heat index above 90 degrees Fahrenheit — the point at which outdoor workers can easily fall ill. Assuming no global action to reduce carbon emissions occurs, Florida can expect 166 "extreme caution" heat days by midcentury and 186 days by 2100. Florida has historically had about three weeks every year where the heat index tops 100 degrees, but Floridians can expect more than three months of temperatures in the triple digits by midcentury. Currently, four days on average have a heat index above 105 degrees, classified as dangerous by the National Weather Service, but that number is predicted to skyrocket to 63 days per year by midcentury and 111 by the century's end.

Limiting warming to 2 degrees Celsius (35.6 degrees Fahrenheit) above pre-industrial levels — the goal set by the Paris Climate Agreement — would minimize the frequency of extreme heat days in South Florida. Days above a heat index of 105 degrees Fahrenheit could be capped at 41 days

"The more rapid reductions in carbon emissions we take today, the higher the possibility we can avoid the worst-case scenario of climate change," Declet-Barreto says.

Likelihood of Heat Disorders with Prolonged Exposure or Strenuous Activity

Caution

The National Weather Service offers no calculation for a heat index above 137 degrees Fahrenheit. Such extreme temperatures are reserved for places such as Death Valley in California, where very few people live due to what the government agency calls "extreme danger" heat. Fewer than 2,000 people nationwide have experienced heat above 137 degrees, but by the end of the century, 13 million will have experienced those conditions. Florida currently averages zero off-the-chart heat days in any given year, but Floridians can expect two weeks a year to be 137 degrees or hotter if the current rate of warming and emissions continues. "We keep waiting for 2050 to look for these magical changes in our climate," Holder says. "It's not 2050 — it's right now." Holder, a physician in Little Haiti and the co-chair of Florida Clinicians for Climate Action, says Miamians are already feeling the health consequences of climate change. Extreme heat waves are the number one climate killer in the world, exacerbating issues with the cardiovascular system and causing health complications such as chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD) and asthma. Dehydration is another major concern, particularly in children because they lose sweat much faster and are more susceptible to overheating. Those who work outside all day, such as in the construction and agricultural industries, will need access to water and cool-down stations to reduce their body

temperature. Society's most vulnerable populations children, the elderly, and the poor — will be most adversely affected by heat waves. "Environmental justice and climate resiliency need to become one," Holder says. (UPDATE: According to the Union of Concerned Scientists, Miami averaged 16 days per year with a heat index at or above 100 degrees Fahrenheit from 1971 to 2000, The city can expect that number to multiply by seven times to 114 days by the middle of the century and by nearly ten times to 153 days per year by the end of the century. Days with a heat index level of 105 degrees will grow from an average of one per year to 59 by mid-century and 119 by 2100. Sunstroke, heat cramps, and heat exhaustion are likely health consequences at such extreme temperatures, according to the National Weather Service, and heat stroke is possible with

Metropolitan construction materials such as cement, glass, and steel store heat faster than they release it, so urban areas often have higher temperatures than surrounding rural areas with more trees and land cover."Florida is ground zero for the impacts of climate change," Declet-Barreto says. "Floridians know climate change is happening because they are living it."
