

There is more carbon dioxide in the atmosphere than there has been for 800,000 years — since before our species evolved.

On Saturday (May 11), the levels of the greenhouse gas reached 415 parts per million (ppm), as measured by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's Mauna Loa Observatory in Hawaii. Scientists at the observatory have been measuring atmospheric carbon dioxide levels since 1958. But because of other kinds of analysis, such as those done on ancient air bubbles trapped in ice cores, they have data on levels reaching back 800,000 years. During the ice ages, carbon dioxide levels in the atmosphere were around 200 ppm. And during the interglacial periods — the planet is currently in an interglacial period — levels were around 280 ppm, <u>according to NASA</u>.

But every story has its villains: Humans are burning fossil fuels, causing the release of carbon dioxide and other greenhouse gases, which are adding an extra blanket on an already feverish planet. So far, global temperatures have risen by about 1.8 degrees Fahrenheit (1 degree Celsius) since the 19th century or pre-industrial times, according to a <u>special</u> <u>report</u> released last year by the United Nation's Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change.

Every year, the Earth sees about 3 ppm more carbon dioxide in the air, said Michael Mann, a distinguished professor of meteorology at Penn State University. "If you do the math, well, it's pretty sobering," he said. "We'll cross 450 ppm in just over a decade."

The subsequent warming is already causing changes to the planet — shrinking glaciers, bleaching coral reefs and intensifying heat waves and storms, among other impacts. And carbon dioxide levels higher than 450 ppm "are likely to lock in dangerous and irreversible changes in our climate," Mann told Live Science. "CO2 levels will continue to increase for at least the next decade and likely much longer, because not enough is being done worldwide," said Donald Wuebbles, a professor of atmospheric sciences at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. "The long-term increase is due to human-related emissions, especially the emissions of our burning of fossil fuels."

However, he noted that the annual peak in carbon dioxide, which fluctuates throughout the year as plants change their breathing rhythms, occurs right now. The annual average value will be more like 410 to 412 ppm, he said. Which ... is still very high.

"We keep breaking records, but what makes the current levels of CO2 in the atmosphere most troubling is that we are now well into the 'danger zone' where large tipping points in the Earth's climate could be crossed," said Jonathan Overpeck, the dean of the School for Environment and Sustainability at the University of Michigan. "This is particularly true when you factor in the additional warming potential of the other greenhouse gases, including methane, that are now in the atmosphere. "*Homo sapiens*" walked the planet, the Antarctic Ice Sheet was much smaller and sea levels were up to 65 feet (20 meters) higher than they are today, Overpeck told Live Science.

There Remains the Myth of a Social Safety Net Built on Charity

How Cities Can Rebuild the Social Safety Net

By Brooks Rainwater

Think about the "good" jobs of the past. Whether it's a muchlamented coal miner or a factory worker that pops in your head, what made their work good? It wasn't the day-to-day tasks themselves, but the economic security it provided—not just the benefits and pay, but the stabilizing value it brought to individual households, communities, and society itself. In short, the good jobs of yesterday strengthened the safety net.

Today, we see the service sector replacing secure factory positions. The most recent Bureau of Labor Statistics report shows that restaurants are now creating more jobs than manufacturing and mining—adding nearly 200,000 to the economy since January. As *The Atlantic's* Derek Thompson recently wrote, these positions are responsible for big chunks of urban job growth—more than a third of Cleveland's new hires since 2015 were in restaurants, for example. Many of these types of positions offer fewer, if any, benefits, more onerous and less predictable schedules, and a typical hourly salary of \$12.50—not a wage that supports a family in most of the country.

Such low-wage "growing for now" positions are also in a very tenuous position: Upwards of 47 percent of U.S. jobs are at risk over the next two decades due to advances in technology, and workers earning below \$20 per hour face a greater than 80 percent chance of displacement.

This age of employment uncertainty means that city leaders will need to help build a new urban safety net to help support their citizens. It's also an opportunity to right the wrongs in the existing system and infuse equity into the equation. Here are four ways cities can help prepare for the future of work

In the storybook version most of us learned in school, the Pilgrims came to America aboard the *Mayflower* in search of religious freedom in 1620. The Puritans soon followed, for the same reason. Ever since these religious dissidents arrived at their shining "city upon a hill," as their governor John Winthrop called it, millions from around the world have done the same, coming to an America where they found a welcome melting pot in which everyone was free to practice his or her own faith.


The problem is that this tidy narrative is an American myth. The real story of religion in America's past is an often awkward, frequently embarrassing and occasionally bloody tale that most civics books and high-school texts either paper over or shunt to the side. And much of the recent conversation about America's ideal of religious freedom has paid lip service to this comforting tableau.

From the earliest arrival of Europeans on America's shores, religion has often been a cudgel, used to discriminate, suppress and even kill the foreign, the "heretic" and the "unbeliever" including the "heathen" natives already here. Moreover, while it is true that the vast majority of early-generation Americans were Christian, the pitched battles between various Protestant sects and, more explosively, between Protestants and Catholics, present an unavoidable contradiction to the widely held notion that America is a "Christian nation"

This book is essential reading for anyone seeking the accurate historical background to many of the today's hot-button political debates. In contrast to conservatives' misleading method of citing proof texts to serve a narrow agenda, Austin allows the Founding Fathers to speak for themselves, situating all quotations in the proper historical context. What emerges is a true historical picture of men who often disagreed with one another on such crucial issues as federal power, judicial review, and the separation of church and state. As Austin shows, the real legacy of the Founding Fathers to us is a political process: *a system of disagreement, debate, and compromise* that has kept democracy vibrant in America for more than two hundred years.

"Most Americans today yearn for more civility in political discourse, or an end to gridlock and partisanship, but we should be careful what we wish for. Gridlock and partisanship make our government slow, but slowness is part of the overall design. The train to despotism usually runs on time; democracy requires patience, commitment, and a willingness to engage in an inherently oppositional political process." Although the founders never imagined political parties, they were strongly divided about the same issues we experience. "We must understand their process."





Walmart Just Got Sued for Defrauding Customers With Homeopathic "Medicine" By Hemant Mehta, May 20, 2019

Last July, the Center For Inquiry filed a lawsuit against CVS Health Corporation (which includes its nearly 10,000 pharmacies) for promoting and selling homeopathic remedies. CVS was deceiving customers, CFI said, "through its misrepresentation of homeopathy's safety and effectiveness, wasting customers' money

and putting their health at risk." Homeopathy is, of course the sham treatment that takes a trace amount of actual medicine, then dilutes it with water thousands of times over until no actual medicine remains. The resulting mixture of bullshit and nonsense is packaged and sold to customers who may not realize they're being duped by nothing more than an expensive placebo.

"I find that regardless of the homeopathic catholicons I need to alleviate my discomforts, there are no side illeffects. In fact, I always stock up when there is a sale. I find the cheapest product is as effective as the more expensive brand, and that any homed works as well as any other." ~ Old Bob

It's not just a waste of time and money. Over the past couple of years, some homeopathic remedies meant for babies were found to *harm* them because the pills were manufactured improperly. (The makers found a way to screw up doing nothing.)

Both the U.S. Food and Drug Administration and Federal Trade Commission have taken action against misleading homeopathic remedies in recent years.

In CVS' case, the fake remedies are placed right next to the real ones, with no distinction made for customers who don't understand the difference. CVS doesn't have a special section marked "These Don't Work But Give Us Your Money Anyway." As CFI's Vice President and General Counsel **Nick Little** said, even online, CVS doesn't make any distinctions.

Now, CFI is initiating a similar lawsuit against Walmart. According to a lawsuit filed today in the same D.C. court as the CVS case, the mammoth chain is "committing wide-scale consumer fraud and endangering the health of its customers though its sale and marketing of homeopathic medicines." "Walmart sells homeopathics right alongside real medicines, in the same sections in its stores, under the same signs," said Nicholas Little, CFI's Vice President and General Counsel. "Searches on its website for cold and flu remedies or teething products for infants yield pages full of homeopathic junk products.

We are deeply concerned with the moral education of our children. We want to nourish reason and compassion. We believe in an open and pluralistic society and that democracy is the best guarantee of protecting human rights from authoritarian elites and repressive majorities. ~ Center for Inquiry *The Affirmations of Humanism: A Statement of Principles*

It's an incredible betrayal of customers' trust and an abuse of Walmart's titanic retail power."

"Walmart can't claim it doesn't know that homeopathy is snake oil, because it runs its own enormous pharmacy business and make its own homeopathic products," said Little. "So whether it's a scientifically proven remedy like aspirin or flatly denounced junk like homeopathic teething caplets for babies, Walmart sells all of it under its in-house 'Equate' branding. It's all the same to Walmart."

It's almost incredible that Walmart sells generic versions of brand name bullshit... The lawsuit itself includes several pictures of what this looks like in practice, with scientifically tested medicines next to homeopathic products.

"Despite being among the richest corporations on Earth and the largest retailer in the United States, Walmart chooses to further pad its massive wealth by tricking consumers into throwing their money away on sham medicinal products that are scientifically proven to be useless and potentially dangerous," said Robyn Blumner, president and CEO of the Center for Inquiry. "We intend to put a stop to it."

As CFI notes, the Federal Trade Commission said in 2016 that all marketing for homeopathic products had to include disclaimers saying "1) there is no scientific evidence that the product works; and 2) the product's claims are based only on theories of homeopathy from the 1700s that are not accepted by most modern medical experts."

The lawsuit isn't meant to pull the products from the shelves. After all, people can waste their money as they see fit. But CFI is calling on Walmart to make it very clear that these products don't work. They should have clear labels that say as much, and the fake products shouldn't be placed near actual medicine. That's not all:

In addition, **CFI holds that Walmart should not suggest** that homeopathic products can treat particular illnesses or symptoms unless it has "credible scientific testing." It recommends clear, legible warnings to consumers regarding what homeopathy is.

The group says, by not doing these things already, Walmart is currently violating the D.C. Consumer Protection Act. They're asking the court to declare Walmart guilty of violating that law, force the company to include the proper disclaimers in all advertisements and stores, and get them to pay \$1,500 per violation of these rules (to CFI or the "general public" in D.C.). That's in addition to legal fees and other court costs.

"Think again about how the history of human knowledge is the history of supernatural explanations being replaced by natural ones ... with relentless consistency, again, and again, and again. There hasn't been a single exception to this pattern." ~ Greta Christina



Air Conditioning Turned the USA Republican

Suddenly, that means people could live in sweltering Southern cities without discomfort — or, in the case of the elderly, even heat-related death. "All of a sudden it triggers this extraordinary migration of human beings," Johnson says. "There are changes in population centers that are visible from space, thanks to air conditioners."

And of course, where people go, so do votes. "There's this big transfer of electoral college votes from the north to the south," Johnson says. "You have more conservative retirees moving to the South now because of air conditioning."

And that's where we come back to Ronald Reagan: "A very important component of Ronald Reagan's election in 1980 is kind of the Sun Belt bloc of conservative voters that just would not have existed," Johnson says, without air conditioning.

After the Second World War, droves of Americans moved from chilly northern states. This demographic shift exactly mirrored the proliferation of air conditioners across the country. "Air conditioning was essential to the development of the Sun Belt," says Mormino. "It was unquestionably the most significant factor."

That population boom gave southern states considerably more influence in the electoral college, the body of voters who hold the key to the White House. CFI's vision is a world in which evidence, science, and compassion—rather than superstition, pseudoscience, or prejudice—guide public policy.

Defining Critical Thinking

Critical thinking is a rich concept that has been developing throughout the past 2,500 years. The term "critical thinking" has its roots in the mid-late 20th century. Below, we offer overlapping definitions which together form a substantive and trans-disciplinary conception of critical thinking.

Critical Thinking as Defined by the National Council for Excellence in Critical Thinking, 1987

A statement by Michael Scriven & Richard Paul, presented at the 8th Annual International Conference on Critical Thinking and Education Reform, Summer 1987.

Critical thinking is the intellectually disciplined process of actively and skillfully conceptualizing, applying, analyzing, synthesizing, and/or evaluating information gathered from, or generated by, observation, experience, reflection, reasoning, or communication, as a guide to belief and action. In its exemplary form, it is based on universal intellectual values that transcend subject matter divisions: clarity, accuracy, precision, consistency, relevance, sound evidence, good reasons, depth, breadth, and fairness.

It entails the examination of those structures or elements of thought implicit in all reasoning: purpose, problem, or question-at-issue; assumptions; concepts; empirical grounding; reasoning leading to conclusions; implications and consequences; objections from alternative viewpoints; and frame of reference. Critical thinking — in being responsive to variable subject matter, issues, and purposes — is incorporated in a family of interwoven modes of thinking, among them: scientific thinking, mathematical thinking, historical thinking, anthropological thinking, economic thinking, moral thinking, and philosophical thinking.

Telling 'Real' from 'Fake' Psychics

Skeptics are known for warning the public about the perils of psychics (ranging from exploitation to fraud), but it may surprise you to know that "real" psychics sometimes join in as well, offering advice about how to avoid those "fake psychics."

A recent article explained, "Every day thousands of people look to psychics for advice, information and insight on their lives. There's little doubt that some psychics can help people find peace of mind [sic], but it's unfortunate that amongst the truly gifted psychics around [sic] there are also several fakes. People who at best have zero or very limited psychic ability but want to help others, or at worst set out to con their audience from the start – whether for payment or because they crave attention and they need to feel special."

This article is interesting for several reasons including its pseudoskeptical and special pleading fallacy approaches. Here's some of the tips it offers:

"True psychics are able to give you accurate and relevant information on specific things which are not obvious, for example, they may mention the exact full name of a person from your past, or a place you spent a vacation. Fake psychics cannot do that, instead they make general claims like: 'I have an older man here, he passed due to a heart problem', knowing that statistically it's likely that a good number of people in the audience have lost someone who fits the bill."

This reasonably accurate description of cold reading is followed up with, "In comparison, a real psychic may mention an older man, but they would add detail such as he passed on several years ago from a heart problem which he had known about but never told anyone. He says that's the reason he quit driving, even though he blamed it on his eyesight." But this still doesn't really solve the problem, for various reasons. Merely adding the qualifier "he knew about but never told anyone" doesn't help; how could a person know that the deceased knew about his heart problem if he never told anyone, or that that was the real reason he quit driving? It's all more plausible speculation than confirmable fact, and because of flexible interpretation, the psychic's client may think, "Well, he didn't stop driving, but he may have thought about it," thus seeming to confirm the information.

The article goes on: "Fake psychics speak slowly because they are fishing for clues." This is incorrect, but the reason the author gives is correct in some circumstances: "They make a statement and then either read your body language or wait for your response to adjust their 'insights'; making statements like: I can sense you have had heartbreak in your life. (Who hasn't? If you are suddenly emotional or anxious they will ramp it up.) It's very recent, but you have spirits with you, supporting you. (If you look blank they try a different tactic.)"

Many psychics, such as John Edward, speak quickly, while others don't. The idea that fake psychics speak slowly to give them time to react and redirect responses is rarely true; a skilled speaker can do it in a second or less and doesn't need to draw out the words or statements fishing for time. In fact most psychics speak quickly precisely because the more they say, the more potential bits of information and guesses they throw out, the more likely it is that something will catch someone's attention and perceive it as meaningful. This is especially effective in a large audience, where the psychic on stage may not be close enough to the person (or the place may not be well lit enough) to read the microexpressions and body language. Speaking slowly would be of no help in those circumstances, so they adopt a faster, rapid-fire patter technique (I saw this first hand at several readings by Edward).

And finally, "Fake psychics demand cash to remove curses or spells. This is one of the ugliest aspects of fakery in the psychic sphere. People who feel they may be cursed following endless bad luck are vulnerable to suggestions that they could escape it if they pay for the curse or spell to be removed." This is an excellent and valuable warning, though of course the best way to avoid these unethical "fake psychics" is to avoid all psychics....

Carla Baron Fumes at Fake Psychics

Sometimes well-known psychics themselves help "warn" the public. In 2011 police outside of Houston, Texas, surrounded a rural farmhouse with guns drawn. They

were acting on a tip from a psychic who told them that the property was the scene of a grisly mass murder: dozens of dismembered bodies would be found there, she insisted including those of children. It all turned out to be false, and the story made international news. The Committee for Skeptical Inquiry was on the story almost immediately, getting the skeptical perspective out. I wrote a piece that appeared on MSNBC and the Christian Science Monitor, and Joe Nickell was quoted in The New York Times.

Within a day or two psychics were commenting about the skepticism and the whole fiasco—including a famous TV psychic named Carla Baron, who fumed on her blog.

She wrote that the woman "falsely reported a crime. She falsely claimed she had 'psychic' ability. THIS is precisely the irresponsible behavior I have pointed out previously in my official blog. Those who wish to 'help' - those that feel they have some sort of intuitive ability, those that are just simply lunatics looking for a little attention. This 'psychic' who called in the false tips to law enforcement is, in fact, not a psychic at all..... This behavior threatens to tear at the very fabric of any credibility displayed by AUTHENTIC psychics, mediums, and psychic profilers such as myself." Baron then railed against journalists and skepticsincluding myself-who mentioned her name in recent news articles about the failure of psychic detectives. She asks, "Why is it that most MEDIA outlets (and many lesser media - i.e., blogs, discussion forums, individual websites) find it necessary to use my famous name to promote their articles, commentary, and news pieces?"

The obvious answer is that if the subject of the news piece is psychic detectives who cannot solve cases and give false and useless information, then she is Exhibit A.

Baron was part of the TruTV show Haunting Evidence, in which she and two other investigators tackled real-life unsolved murders. The show was cancelled after 22 episodes without any of the cases having been solved; two were later closed through police work. The Independent Investigations Group did an excellent analysis of Baron's claims and found a near-spotless track record of failure. Baron's question would be like Tiger Woods wondering why he's being mention in a news article on golfing.


Baron was concerned that all this negative publicity about psychic failures is leading to a modern witch hunt reminiscent of the Salem Witch Trials. No, seriously: "My mind is beseiged at the moment with images of the Salem Witch Trials of 1692. From June through September of 1692, nineteen men and women, all having been convicted of witchcraft, were carted to Gallows Hill, a barren slope near Salem Village, for hanging.....Is history not only repeating itself, but mutating into ardent new ways of \widetilde{sep} " witch burning"?"

Baron was apparently fearful that she and other "real psychics" may be abducted by angry mobs, put on mock trials, and possibly hung or pressed to death in a public place. It's not clear whether Baron was worried about "fake psychics," like the woman who led police to the Texas house. Presumably the best proof of psychic powers (or witchcraft) would be a track record of amazing success and accurate information; in that case I don't think Baron has much to worry about.





A Response:

Ms. Woolley's letter, on 5/27/2019, states that an atheist "has no meaning or hope". As an atheist I must disagree. As an officer of the Atheists of Florida, I know many people who would disagree, and who daily demonstrate that they have meaning in their lives as well as a great hope for themselves and others.

Atheists do not pray to anyone. She is correct to ask why an atheist should give an invocation. She should be asking why is a prayer being given at a government meeting. We choose to do this because someone has to let their elected representatives know that not everyone in their community is religious. In Polk County only 41% of the people indicate they have a religion and yet there is no more chaos in Polk County than anywhere else. And believing in god certainly does not indicate that a person is moral, just look at the scandals in the various religions, even by their leadership (priest, ministers, etc.).

But she is wrong that we have no hope or meaning in our lives. Many of us choose to live by the words of Robert Ingersoll - "Happiness is the only good. The time to be happy is now. The place to be happy is here. The way to be happy is to make other so." Our meaning comes from our relationships with our family, friends, community, and nature. What White Supremacy Really Means

White supremacy isn't predicated on white

people flourishing, [sic] it's just about white people doing better than everyone else. – David Dennis, Newsone.com, July 27, 2018, "Russia Won Because It Understands America's Obsession with White Supremacy."

In his excellent book, The Ethnic Myth, scholar Stephen Steinberg demonstrated that throughout history, poor and workingclass Whites in the U.S. often kicked their best interests to the curb if it meant maintaining their status above Black people. Indeed, White supremacy is largely about identity and psychology.

Some of President Donald Trump's most loyal supporters are poor, White, uneducated paranoid conspiracy theorists. They believe that making America great again largely means bringing a White man back to the White House. (Even a White billionaire.) These are the same people that bought into the birther notion that Obama was not a U.S. citizen. They believed he was a secret Muslim with ties to extremist Muslims. They made all kinds of racist remarks about him and his wife.

What is truly remarkable is that many of these Trump supporters are dependent upon Obamacare. However, in pursuit of White privilege, they are willing to jeopardize their health and their lives.

This is this kind of attitude that led the Black clinical psychologist Bobby E. Wright to suggest that racism is a mental illness. Not surprisingly, most White psychologists did not accept his proposal. Still, it raises the question of why it is that so many Whites are willing to sabotage their lives just to keep others on the bottom. That simply does not seem to be sane behavior.

For most African Americans, the accumulation of wealth has been a colossal failure. For example, according to a story dated September 28, 2017 on the website of the Washington Post, White families have about 10 times the net worth of Black families. However, what is especially frightening is that, according to a story dated September 13, 2017 on the website of the Guardian, the median wealth of Black Americans will fall to zero by 2053!

White supremacists are delighted by news of this kind. No matter how poor they might be, they can always identify themselves as belonging to the dominant group. They can feel better about themselves knowing that, regardless of how badly they might have it, there are many others that are suffering even more than they are.

For White supremacists, race trumps everything, including economics and patriotism. This was made especially clear when Trump rallied White bigots by disparaging the family of an American Muslim that died fighting on behalf of the U.S.

During the 2016 Presidential campaign, Trump verbally attacked a Muslim Gold Star family. He antagonized Khizar Khan and Ghazala Khan, parents of Humayun Khan, who, at age 27, died in Iraq in 2004 as he tried to save other soldiers in a car bombing.

It is hard to imagine what more one would have to do to earn the title "hero." Yet, here was Trump suggesting that Ms. Khan was subservient to Mr. Khan and afraid to speak up about her son's tragic death. At no point was it clear that Trump and his minions were willing to applaud the fallen soldier's sacrifice. On the contrary, they seemed to view Captain Khan as just another Muslim undeserving of any special credit. What should have been obvious evidence of Trump's disrespect for military members, instead fired up his rabid base.

With the exception of Crispus Attucks, the first person to die in the American Revolution, Black patriots have never counted much in the eyes of White supremacists. For example, after W.W. I, many U.S. soldiers returning to the States were victimized by racist abuse, including killings. White supremacists consider themselves to be more American and more patriotic than non-White Americans. They consider non-White Americans to simply be along for the ride as Whites drive the nation to its proper destiny.

Trump has shown that there is now no need for dog-whistle racism in which White supremacists speak to one another in code. In fact, that is why Trump left his Republican competitors in the dust. They were unwilling or unable to descend to Trump's racist depths.

Trump's most loyal supporters – White evangelicals – are those that have the greatest objections to the browning of America. Many of them believe that it is bad for the U.S. that Whites are expected to become a minority during the 21st Century. They are running scared and they will continue to support Trump and his ilk.

White supremacists are not the only ones that feel a need to look down upon others. For instance, extremist Muslim males feel culturally and psychologically obligated to oppress women, even though there is much evidence that equal opportunity for women translates into better societies for all. Many, if not most, sexist Muslims would rather suffer in poverty than bring about equal opportunity for women. As long as many Whites feel the need to look down upon non-White people, White supremacy will be a problem. It is not primarily about economics. It is primarily about psychology and self-worth by any means necessary.

"Thus, we could soon be at the point where comparable reductions in ice sheet size, and corresponding increases in sea level, are both inevitable and irreversible over the next few centuries," he said. Smaller ice sheets, in turn, might reduce the reflectivity of the planet and potentially accelerate the warming even more, he added.

Thinking Freely Speaking Out

I am a Humanist. I believe people are basically good. It's sometimes hard to believe that when I keep being told negative things about things negative people have done. But I still believe it to be true.

Why? Because most of the people I come in contact with - from the wide variety of backgrounds they have - are good people. Most people are good.

I teach how to stop bullying and harassment in the workplace using behavioral science. You would think that would make me focus on the bullies of the world. But most people who we think are bullies, aren't bullies. Most are good people with issues who are having trouble coping with whatever is going on in their lives.

This doesn't mean that really toxic people don't exist. They do. It's more that - they are actually really rare.

When I do a training in a company - what normally happens is that everyone starts behaving better in an attempt to get the person they are in conflict with - to behave more badly. The reality is - people allowed their beliefs to bias how they experienced interactions. Believe someone is bad - everything they do is suspect - even if what they are doing is totally normal.

When you stop treating people as if they are enemies they often stop acting as if they are your enemy.

Adding to the anger and negativity of the world doesn't help you or anyone else feel better. Reach out to others with compassion. Focus on problem solving instead of blaming. You may just find that you have more in common with other people than you realize. The key - is being open to the possibility that other people are - good.

So stop complaining about other people and start helping your fellow humans solve their problems.

I was born in Greece, a country which was, and still is, saturated with religion.

(Of course I was not consulted) It is ironic because later I became a founder of Atheists of Florida, (1992) and was the first Co-president of Atheist Alliance (1992-1995) which today is an international organization with member societies from all over the world. Neither can I believe that the individual survives the death of his body, although feeble souls harbor such thoughts through fear or ridiculous egotism.

The only good thing that I can say about "God" is to echo George Bernard Shaw , "I am an atheist and I thank God for it." *Christos*

Men and Women Are from Mars, Zontar Is from Venus Opinion

Or at least so say the "woke" (in so many words). And there can be no disputing the latter of those two cosmic assertions, as anyone who takes the time to watch this Emmy-winning CNN documentary (at least I think that's what this is) will no-doubt concede (tinyurl.com/Zontar-Venus). But my title's pre-comma premise may actually crater under critical scrutiny.

Most of us "baby boomers" already had an inkling, but in 1992 the world was officially notified that men and women (in general, with of course many exceptions) are so inherently unequal — not merely in terms of procreational plumbing and muscle mass, but psychologically — that we might as well have evolved on different planets! That year's *Men Are from Mars, Women Are from Venus* by John Gray was to become not merely the #1 bestselling non-fiction book of the decade but, per Wikipedia, "a part of popular culture and the foundation for the author's subsequent books, recordings, seminars, theme vacations, one-man Broadway show, TV sitcom, workout videos, a podcast, men's and ladies' apparel lines, fragrances, travel guides and his-and-hers salad dressings" (tinyurl.com/Yes-Salad-Dressings-Seriously).

Though the book's author was but a thinly credentialed relationship counselor, a bit earlier that same year, *Time* magazine's January 20 cover (tinyurl.com/Time-Different) depicted a boy and a girl with this headline: "Why Are Men and Women Different?" The subtitle: "It isn't just upbringing. New studies show they are born that way."

Naturally, there are many who reject such an "offensive" notion. As but one example (given my lazy-ass Martian predisposition to stop after the first Google "hit"), see this 2017 article, "What planet are women from again?" by Stephanie Buck (tinyurl.com/What-Planet). She finds Gray's approach "cosmically weird" and his "sexism ... downright laughable," but explains how she persevered: "By the time I was halfway through [the book] I had softened to the grating gender stereotypes. As a woke millennial, I had trained myself to replace mentions of 'man' or 'woman' with the word 'person.""

So the "woke" envision both sexes as having evolved on the same red planet. And Beck implies that perhaps this truth has begun to sink into Gray's gray matter: "Then in January 2017, Gray published a new book: *Beyond Mars and Venus: Relationship Skills for Today's Complex World*. It's a whole new set of rules for today's woke relationships and relaxed gender roles." But, alas, she makes clear that Gray still has a ways to go, since, "At worst, it's a masochistic hate-read that makes you feel even more alone."

Ouch! OK, let's accept, for now, the woke premise that my title's opening line is correct, and that Zontar's home planet is *not* the origin of womankind writ large but only of Zsa Zsa Gabor and her merry maidens (tinyurl.com/Zsa-Zsa-Venus). Assuming the following single example (see my previous "lazy-ass" excuse) is representative, please ponder how well the woke position comports with this reasoning:

The former "Bruce" Jenner was born a "male" and lived "his" life as a "man" until transgendering into "Caitlyn," who now lives "her" life as a "woman" (though still a genetic "male" — the XY chromosomal pair in one's cells cannot be changed to XX/female). What could have possessed Caitlyn to undergo this radical transformation? She was not raised as if a female. She grew up to be a tall, muscular man, so much so as to win an Olympic decathlon gold medal. She also married three times (all females/women) and fathered six children. And as she wrote in her memoir, with regard to any sexual attraction then or now toward males/men, "I have never had the inclination."

And as she put it to another, "[It's a] misperception that people transition because of their sexual desires. ... Transitioning is about nothing else but your soul" (tinyurl.com/Jenner-Soul).

Caitlyn's references to the woman inhabiting her very soul certainly suggest having been born with a feminine brain housed within her formerly masculine body. Perhaps, despite the XY factory specs, one of God's gestational helpers mistakenly painted her attic with an XXtra coat of estrogen after the downstairs plumbing had already been installed. Or, put another way (à la John Gray), perhaps her manly body came from Mars, but her womanly brain came from Venus.

Critical Thinking as Defined by the National Council for Excellence in Critical Thinking, 1987



Critical thinking is the intellectually disciplined process of actively and skillfully conceptualizing, applying, analyzing, synthesizing, and/or evaluating information gathered from, or generated by, observation, experience, reflection, reasoning, or communication, as a guide to belief and action.

In its exemplary form, it is based on universal intellectual values that transcend subject matter divisions: clarity, accuracy, precision, consistency, relevance, sound evidence, good reasons, depth, breadth, and fairness. It entails the examination of those structures or elements of thought implicit in all reasoning: purpose, problem, or question-at-issue; assumptions; concepts; empirical grounding; reasoning leading to conclusions; implications and consequences; objections from alternative viewpoints; and frame of reference.

Critical thinking — in being responsive to variable subject matter, issues, and purposes — is incorporated in a family of interwoven modes of thinking, among them: scientific thinking, mathematical thinking, historical thinking, anthropological thinking, economic thinking, moral thinking, and philosophical
