Fetal Heartbeats on Legislative Agenda

State Rep. Mike Hill, R-Pensacola, is making another attempt during the 2020 legislative session to pass a "fetal heartbeat" bill that would drastically limit abortions in Florida.

Hill's bill (HB 271) would prevent physicians from performing abortions if fetal heartbeats have been detected.

Since pulmonary function is one of the earliest systems to become evident in a fetus, this bill would effectively make abortions illegal.

The legislation, filed for the January legislative session would create third-degree felony charges for any "person who knowingly or purposefully performs or induces an abortion on a pregnant woman with the specific intent of causing or abetting the termination of the life of the preborn human being whose preborn intrauterine heartbeat has been detected."

Of course this presupposes that a fetus is a human being - a naïve religious proposition.

Hill and Sen. Dennis Baxley, R-Ocala, had filed such bills for the 2019 session, but the proposals were not taken up in House and Senate committees.

Florida Rep Daniels under Fire

As a U.S. Appeals Court rules President Trump's blocking people on Twitter who criticize him is unconstitutional, an elected official from Jacksonville is deleting comments and banning some constituents from expressing their views on her Facebook page.

A number of constituents in her district have complained she was blocking people who criticized her religious posts on the page titled "State Representative Kimberly Daniels."

Daniels' page discusses both policymaking and, increasingly, Christianity. Daniels is a pastor in addition to an elected official, and she uses the <u>State Representative Kimberly Daniels page</u> to post video sermons and taped episodes of her Christian radio program.

FFRF has sent cease-and-desist letters to about a dozen public officials for similarly blocking people, nationwide.

Downtown Clearwater target for Scientologists

According to a recent article in the Tampa Bay Times, a forthcoming election could put the Church of scientology in a commanding seat in overseeing plans for the heart of Clearwater.

The Downtown Development Board will acquire new members to help create policy and serve as a guide to assist the city council. The downtown area, already dominated by church related properties and church members is the object of speculation that the scientologist board has its own plans for the area that may not take into account the development goals expressed by the citizenry. 

Choosing Extinction

The climate strikes over the coming weeks will focus a great deal of attention on government and the urgent need for policy action. Rightly so. But it's also a good time to reflect on the bigger context, as this is not anything like protests of the past. There has in fact, never been a point like this in all of human history.

I called this column 'choosing extinction' because that is the path we are on today. There is considerable debate whether that extinction applies to us humans, or 'just' to millions of other species. But either way a mass extinction event is on the way, unless we choose to stop it.

What we now know, is that we are facing a time sensitive, existential risk. Failing to respond adequately, could commit humanity to widespread misery for hundreds and possibly thousands of years. It could literally change the course of evolution and human history.

We are well advised on the risks and they are clear and material. Not certain, but nor unlikely. The evidence is very clear and it tells us:

- The scale and level of risk it threatens civilization;
- The scale of change required the transformation of the global economy; and
- The speed with which this transformation must be delivered largely within a decade.

What this means is we have been warned of an imminent danger. Not just a danger to our prosperity or our level of progress but a danger to the very existence of organized civilization. We know how to fix this and we know we can afford to do so.

Now it's time to decide.

To decide whether humanity will continue on its long social, cultural and economic path of exploring and fulfilling our potential. Whether to find out what we are capable of. To decide how many of the world's 8.7 million species we will allow to live and continue on their evolutionary path. And how many species we will choose to destroy, presumably never to return. Perhaps including our own.

We know all this. Yet we sit idly by, as the evidence mounts and the risks get greater, paralyzed in various ways by ignorance, despair, delusion and fear. There should be no surprise in this, it is the path we have always taken in response to existential risk, even at smaller scale like WWII, which continues to be the closest analogy. The big difference in this case however, is that the existential risk applies to our whole planetary civilization. With this, there is no historical parallel. Not since the dinosaurs. But unlike the dinosaurs, we are consciously aware of the risks, we fully understand them, and we *can* choose to address them.

We know exactly what we need to do. We cannot be certain of success if we act, but we can be pretty certain of catastrophe if we don't.

Some argue it is hopeless, that there is no chance of success. In war this attitude would be considered treason – aiding and abetting the enemy. Such people have nothing to contribute on this topic, except to serve the interests of today's 'enemy' – those who resist and delay change. They should cease all public comment and keep to themselves.

Some argue we may not succeed, that we may have left it too late. They are correct, we *may* have. But there is no evidence – nor can there be ahead of time – that we have done so. There is, therefore, no reason for this *possibility* to influence our decisions or actions today. There will be a future – our kids will live in it. We get to choose what it will be like.

What we have to do now is simple. We have to decide – do we choose extinction? Or do we choose to fight it? To rebel against it. To stand in its way.

To do all we can possibly do, to get humanity on a different path. That is our choice. And each and every one of us now gets to decide. That's why we're in the streets.

That's why this matters....like never before.



An open discussion hosted by *Brent Hardaway* **Is Democracy doomed to Fail?**

The 20th century saw democratic forms of government grow to levels unprecedented in human history. This seems to validate Winston Churchill's maxim tht "Democracy is the worst form of government except all those other forms that have been tried from time to time". Monarchy and Authoritarianism are widely seen as failures, while Democracy will generally allow for greater freedom and less tyranny – but that doesn't exclude it from being very messy at times.


In fact, some have argued that democracy will eventually fail (like all the others). One of the earliest was Socrates, as he is presented in Plato's Republic. Socrates thought that the general populace was too strongly governed by appetites to remain stable. This would lead to unscrupulous leaders gaining power through appealing to what is popular rather than wise. And the next step would be tyranny.

Concerns over such ideas as "mob rule" led the Founding Fathers of America to try to put checks and balances on such excesses as they constructed America's representative democracy (or republic). But even they did not believe that this guaranteed stability forever. Benjamin Franklin seemed to echo Socrates on the dangers of Democracy when he said "Only a virtuous people are capable of freedom. As nations become corrupt and vicious, they have more need of masters".

There are other possible threats – will a crisis situation eventually lead to people surrendering their right to rule to someone who promises them security? If one group consistently loses elections, might they feel justified in attempting to seize power, for the peoples "own good" (in their minds)? At the very least, the survival of democracy depends on a deep respect for the democratic process that accepts that it is better that the people sometimes choose poor leaders and poor policies, rather than them not having a choice at all.

political and social issues, to participate in civic life, and to protect the rights and freedom of all citizens is imperative if the nation we love is to survive.

Public school classrooms are one of the first places where children form a community that mirrors the larger society. It is here where students can learn the imperatives of logical and scientific thinking, the skills of making group decisions, establishing and enforcing rules, learning tolerance and handling disagreements.

You provide an excellent example of these skills by your commitment to respecting the inherent dignity and worth of each person and realizing that apparent differences of race, religion and party affiliation are merely the exuberance of our cultural diversity. Our common humanity unites us all and helps us recognize that through our interdependence, we share a common fate. It is important that we root our policymaking process in these shared values, that are relevant to residents of Pinellas county, regardless of religious belief or nonbelief. That decisions are made using the unifying secular virtues of reason, curiosity, empathy, and compassion.

One of our most precious shared values is that of being able to think for ourselves. Since the 1980's, the last week in September has been recognized as Banned Books Week. Even if the motivation to ban or challenge a book is well-intentioned, the outcome is detrimental. Censorship denies our freedom as individuals to choose and think for ourselves. At least 46 of the

Top 100 Novels of the 20th Century have been the targets of ban attempts. Among them is the book from which this quote is taken:

"In every bit of honest writing in the world, there is a base theme. Try to understand men, if you understand each other you will be kind to each other. KNOWING A MAN WELL NEVER LEADS TO HATE and nearly always leads to love."

This is from "Of Mice and Men" by John Steinbeck. I would be remiss if I didn't remind you that having an official prayer at a public-school function is unconstitutional and encourage you to replace prayerful invocations with a full moment of silence, to ensure all the people who attend feel welcomed.

A Famous Argument Against Free Will Has Been Debunked

The death of free will began with thousands of finger taps. In 1964, two German scientists monitored the electrical activity of a dozen people's brains. Each day for several months, volunteers came into the scientists' lab at the University of Freiburg to get wires fixed to their scalp from a showerhead-like contraption overhead. The participants sat in a chair, tucked neatly in a metal tollbooth, with only one task: to flex a finger on their right hand at whatever irregular intervals pleased them, over and over, up to 500 times a visit.

The purpose of this experiment was to search for signals in the participants' brains that preceded each finger tap. At the time, researchers knew how to measure brain activity that occurred in response to events out in the world—when a person hears a song, for instance, or looks at a photograph—but no one had figured out how to isolate the signs of someone's brain actually initiating an action.

The experiment's results came in squiggly, dotted lines, a representation of changing brain waves. In the milliseconds leading up to the finger taps, the lines showed an almost undetectably faint uptick: a wave that rose for about a second, like a drumroll of firing neurons, then ended in an abrupt crash. This flurry of neuronal activity, which the scientists called the *Bereitschaftspotential*, or readiness potential, was like a gift of infinitesimal time travel. For the first time, they could see the brain readying itself to create a voluntary movement.

This momentous discovery was the beginning of a lot of trouble in neuroscience. Twenty years later, the American physiologist Benjamin Libet used the *Bereitschaftspotential* to make the case not only that the brain shows signs of a decision before a person acts, but that, incredibly, the brain's wheels start turning before the person even consciously intends to do something. Suddenly, people's choices—even a basic finger tap—appeared to be determined by something outside of their own perceived volition.

As a philosophical question, whether humans have control over their own actions had been fought over for centuries before Libet walked into a lab. But Libet introduced a genuine neurological argument against free will. His finding set off a new surge of debate in science and philosophy circles. And over time, the implications have been spun into cultural lore.

In a new study under review for publication in the *Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences*, Schurger and two Princeton researchers repeated a version of Libet's experiment. To avoid unintentionally cherry-picking brain noise, they included a control condition in which people didn't move at all. An artificial-intelligence classifier allowed them to find at what point brain activity in the two conditions diverged. If Libet was right, that should have happened at 500 milliseconds before the movement. But the algorithm couldn't tell any difference until about only 150 milliseconds before the movement, the time people reported making decisions in Libet's original experiment.

In other words, people's subjective experience of a decision—what Libet's study seemed to suggest was just an illusion—appeared to match the actual moment their brains showed them making a decision.

When Schurger first proposed the neural-noise explanation, in 2012, the paper didn't get much outside attention, but it did create a buzz in neuroscience. Schurger receivedawards for overturning a long-standing idea. "It showed the *Bereitschaftspotential* may not be what we thought it was. That maybe it's in some sense artifactual, related to how we analyze our data," says Uri Maoz, a computational neuroscientist at Chapman University.

For a paradigm shift, the work met minimal resistance. Schurger appeared to have unearthed a classic scientific mistake, so subtle that no one had noticed it and no amount of replication studies could have solved it, unless they started testing for causality. Now, researchers who questioned Libet and those who supported him are both shifting away from basing their experiments on the *Bereitschaftspotential*. (The few people I found still holding the traditional view confessed that they had not read Schurger's 2012 paper.)

"It's opened my mind," says Patrick Haggard, a neuroscientist at University College London who collaborated with Libet and reproduced the original experiments.

It's still possible that Schurger is wrong. Researchers broadly accept that he has deflated Libet's model of *Bereitschaftspotential*, but the inferential nature of brain modeling leaves the door cracked for an entirely different explanation in the future. And unfortunately for popular-science conversation, Schurger's groundbreaking work does not solve the pesky question of free will any more than Libet's did. If anything, Schurger has only deepened the question.

Is everything we do determined by the cause-and-effect chain of genes, environment, and the cells that make up our brain, or can we freely form intentions that influence our actions in the world? The topic is immensely complicated, and Schurger's valiant debunking underscores the need for more precise and better-informed questions.

"Philosophers have been debating free will for millennia, and they have been making progress. But neuroscientists barged in like an elephant into a china shop and claimed to have solved it in one fell swoop," Maoz says. In an attempt to get everyone on the same page, he is heading the first intensive research collaboration between neuroscientists and philosophers, backed by \$7 million from two private foundations, the John Templeton Foundation and the Fetzer Institute. At an inaugural conference in March, attendees discussed plans for designing philosophically informed experiments, and unanimously agreed on the need to pin down the various meanings of "free will."

In that, they join Libet himself. While he remained firm on his interpretation of his study, he thought his experiment was not enough to prove *total* determinism—the idea that all events are set in place by previous ones, including our own mental functions. "Given the issue is so fundamentally important to our view of who we are, a claim that our free will is illusory should be based on fairly direct evidence," he wrote in a 2004 book. "Such evidence is not available."

Here's How Amazon Employees Know in 5 Seconds if Jeff Bezos Thinks a Meeting Requires 'High IQ' Brainpower—And why the Amazon founder intentionally puts off certain meetings until the following day.

Imagine you're up for parole. You've been a model prisoner. You've shown remorse. You've even prepared a speech for the parole board to equal Red's from *Shawshank Redemption*.

Unfortunately, none of your effort might matter.

Researchers analyzed more than 1,000 parole decisions and found that prisoners who appeared before a parole board first thing in the morning had their parole granted about 70 percent of the time.

But as the day went on, the rate of favorable rulings fell to almost zero. (Although it did spike back up for the first case or two after lunch.)

Yep: *When* you go before the parole board -- the luck of the scheduling draw -- makes a bigger difference than any other factor.

Why? The judges got tired: They fell prey to decision fatigue.

Which is why the best time to make difficult decisions -- to do important things -- is early in the day.

That's what Amazon founder Jeff Bezos does. According to Bezos:

I like to do my high-IQ meetings before lunch. Anything that's going to be really mentally challenging: That's a 10 o'clock meeting. Because by 5 p.m., I'm like, "I can't think about that today. Let's try this again tomorrow at 10."

As a senior executive ... you get paid to make a small number of high-quality decisions. Your job is not to make thousands of decisions every day. Is that really worth it if the quality of these decisions might be lower because you're tired, or grouchy, or any number of things?

In fact, Bezos feels it's "enough" if he can make three good decisions each day.

The same is true for you: While you probably make dozens of decisions every day, only a few *truly* matter. (What Bezos might call "Type 1," meaning "almost impossible to reverse" decisions.)

So how can you make sure you -- and your team -- are operating at your peak when you need to make important decisions?

1. Limit the number of small decisions you need to make.

Every choice -- no matter how small -- you make throughout the day decreases your supply of mental energy and increases decision fatigue.

And then one of two things happens:

You make impulsive decisions: The "Oh, the heck

with it" response.

You avoid making decisions: The "I can't deal with this now" response. (That's what happened to the judges in the parole board study; as they grew mentally tired, it became easier and easier to delay releasing a prisoner.)

Either way, no matter how much willpower you try to summon, decision fatigue makes you look for shortcuts.

That's why the fewer decisions you need to make, the smarter the decisions you can then make when you do need to make a decision.

How can you reduce the number of decisions you need to make? Add a little choice architecture to your surroundings. Automate certain decisions. Make one decision instead of many by granting authority: Decide who will decide. (And make sure it's not you, unless it really, really needs to be.)

2. Do "high IQ" things early in the day.

The best time to make tough decisions is early in the day. The best time to do the most important things you need to do is early in the day.

Decide the night before what those things are, and plan to tackle them first thing.

And if you can't get them all done in the first couple of hours, schedule one right after lunch.

Although the judges studied started the morning strong, their decision-making graph looked like a roller coaster: Immediately after lunch, their likelihood of making favorable rulings spiked upward.

That's because glucose is a key source of mental energy. Your brain doesn't stop working when glucose levels are low; it does respond more strongly to immediate reward and pay less attention to long-term outcomes.

3. Get enough sleep.

Seriously.


While saying they work 18-hour days seems like a badge of honor for many entrepreneurs, it's also a pathway to disaster. A chronic lack of sleep decreases daily functioning and adversely affects health and longevity.

One study even found that reduced sleep time carries a greater mortality risk than smoking, high blood pressure, and heart disease.

To make matters worse, chronic sleep problems may be linked to a greater risk of Alzheimer's.

On the flip side, Bezos says when he gets enough sleep, "I think better, I have more energy, my mood is better."

If a guy as successful as Bezos thinks it's important to get seven or eight hours of sleep every night, who am I to argue?

THE HARD TRUTHS OF CLIMATE CHANGE — BY THE NUMBERS

Bruno Rodriguez is only 18, but he has seen enough in his time on Earth to know that he must to do something for the planet. Inspired by the student climate strikes in Europe, he founded Youth for Climate Argentina in his home country. The group drew more than 8,000 demonstrators to the national congress in May, and its leaders worked with senators to pass a resolution on 17 July, declaring a climate emergency.

Argentina is responsible for less than 1% of annual global emissions, but Rodriguez says the science is clear: everyone must take aggressive action if the world is to avoid a massive environmental and humanitarian crisis. "There is no middle ground," says Rodriguez. "We need radical industrial transformation."

Rodriguez is part of a grass-roots climate movement that is gaining momentum across the globe. It is driven in part by a new generation of young activists, and by mounting evidence that global warming is accelerating, which is increasing the odds of severe heatwaves in Europe, deadly fires in the western United States and massive tropical storms fuelled by increasingly warm oceans, among other things. With greenhouse-gas emissions still rising, frustrated activists are taking to the streets to pressure politicians to keep their promises.

This new activism will be on full display as groups in 150 countries stage strikes around next week's global climate summit in New York City, convened by United Nations secretary-general António Guterres. The meeting comes nearly four years after the Paris climate agreement, which seeks to limit global temperatures to 1.5–2 °C above pre-industrial levels. Guterres's goal is to build momentum as countries prepare to submit new commitments next year.

Whatever they decide, nations will have to reckon with some difficult numbers that will ultimately determine whether the world can avoid the rapidly approaching climate meltdown. *Nature* documents the scale of the challenge in an infographic that explores energy use, carbon dioxide pollution and issues of climate justice. At a time when countries have pledged to curb greenhouse gases sharply, the data show that annual emissions spiked by 2.1% in 2018 — owing in part to increased demand for coal in places such as China and India.

Questioning Dr. Isadore Rosenfeld's China Acupuncture Story

"What's wrong with this picture?" That familiar refrain came to mind as I was reading the paragraph, in Dr. Isadore Rosenfeld's August 16, 1998, *Parade* magazine article about acupuncture, in which he describes an extraordinary Chinese operation witnessed by him in the 1970s. That same question echoed upon my inspection of the accompanying picture -- a documentary photograph of that operation, taken by the author himself.

Dr. Rosenfeld, a cardiologist and professor of medicine, has appeared on national TV talk/interview shows since the 1960s, and has authored several books, including the 1996 best-selling *Dr. Rosenfeld's Guide to Alternative Medicine*. Upon locating the book, I found a discussion of the operation in question on pages 30-32. My quotations herein are from the *Parade* article, the book, and several e-mail communications to me from Rosenfeld.

Accompanied on his China trip by several other prominent American physicians (now deceased), the Rosenfeld party watched as a 28-year-old female patient was wheeled into an operating room at the University of Shanghai and prepped for heart surgery to repair her mitral valve. But in lieu of standard anesthesia, a practitioner placed "an acupuncture needle in her right earlobe" (per *Parade*), with an electrode attached to supply a mild electrical current.

Rosenfeld observed as "the surgeon . . . cut through the . . . breastbone with an electric buzzsaw [and] her chest was split in two [and] spread apart with a large clamp to expose the heart" (per his book). Rosenfeld shortly thereafter snapped the photograph that appears in *Parade* (it was not used in the book). Because Rosenfeld had denied me permission to reprint his photograph in the articles I was planning to write for *The Scientific Review of Alternative Medicine* and *Skeptical Inquirer*, *TBS Report's* Don Addis has faithfully reproduced its image (see above), which is rotated 90 degrees

counterclockwise. *

Only the patient's face and incision are visible through the gaps in the surgical sheets. Let us assume, as the photo appears to indicate, that her head is essentially "face up" as opposed to being significantly rotated right or left. (Her eyes are focused to her left, as if she is attempting to observe the operation but cannot rotate her head.) Drawing a vertical line down the midline of her body, the operative field appears to be displaced far to the patient's left, rather than being centered where the breastbone and heart are situated. In fact, it appears so far to the left as to exist beyond the border of the patient's body (see 2nd sketch by Don Addis). There does not appear to be any appreciable distortion in the photo such as might be encountered from the use of a wide-angle lens.

Rosenfeld says that this apparent leftward displacement "must be due to the angle at which [the photo] was taken" (per e-mail to me). He teased me with the fact that one of the others present (Dr. Wilbur Gould, ENT) had also taken photos and that his widow "... no doubt has all his... pictures in her possession." But he would not assist me in contacting her to obtain the photographs for review, saying that he did not wish to "participate in your project to prove that my four colleagues and I did not see what we saw."

In addition to the photographic oddities, I asked Dr. Rosenfeld how such surgery could have been performed without artificial ventilation: With the I pointed out other problems as well, which are explored in a more extensive article on this matter that I have co-authored with Dr. Wallace Sampson, tentatively planned for publication in the Fall/Winter 1999 issue of *The Scientific Review of Alternative Medicine*.

I suggested to Dr. Rosenfeld that his party may have been taken in by a hoax perpetrated for propaganda purposes -- a well-documented propensity of the Chinese during the Cold War. But Rosenfeld scoffed at the notion (as he does in his book), and suggested that I contact Dr. Michael DeBakey, one of the world's foremost cardiac surgeons, who "witnessed a similar procedure one year later [and] can explain your legitimate technical questions about ventilatory support. I spoke with him yesterday . . . " (per his e-mail). I asked Dr. Sampson to speak with DeBakey on our behalf, and the results of that interview were quite enlightening.

DeBakey informed Sampson that despite his conversation with Rosenfeld of just a few days earlier, he had neither read Rosenfeld's accounts of the operation nor seen his photograph, and he was thus unconversant with the precise details that were of concern to us. As for his own experience in China, DeBakey recalled that the mitral valve surgery that he had witnessed involved a patient who, it turned out, had been given pre-op medication intravenously prior to having the acupuncture administered. Additionally,







Paranoia Banned

Alex Jones, Bigotry, Falsehoods, and "Censorship"

Paranoid conspiracy theorist and reactionary polemicist Alex Jones has been banned from Apple, Facebook, YouTube and Spotify.

Jones, through his website Info Wars and other outlets over the past 20 years, has promoted such conspiracy theories as the following:

• Barack Obama was not born in the U.S. and is not a U.S. citizen • Hillary Clinton headed a sex trafficking ring with the D.C.-based Comet Ping Pong Pizza establishment (aka, Pizzagate) • The terrorist attacks on 9/11 were inside jobs • Hitler and Mussolini were leftists that influenced the Left in the U.S. • The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) is forming concentration camps to brainwash Americans • The Sandy Hook massacre, in which 20 children were murdered, was a hoax.

However, as cruel and bizarre as these beliefs are, they are not why Jones has been barred from so many social media outlets. He was barred because these non-governmental businesses have standards against hate speech, which Jones repeatedly violated. The pressure from anti-bigots had become so great that the social media giants had to react. This is simply not an issue of censorship. The government had nothing to do with any of this. More importantly, Jones is free to peddle his bigotry and falsehoods on his website and in many other ways. Jack-booted government thugs are not coming after him and his ilk.

Still, Jones, predictably, has turned this into a First Amendment issue. Not surprisingly, Jones is in "good" company. The paranoid conspiracy theorist-in-Chief, President Donald Trump, complains that Google is biased against conservatives, as does Jones. Jones claims that he is advising Trump in his opposition to social media. (Trump has appeared on Jones' show and has even stated that Jones is worthy of a Pulitzer prize!)

This is a baseless claim against Google. Google prioritizes credible original sources over paranoid conspiracy theories and "real" fake news.

However, how does one reason with a paranoid conspiracy theorist? In the convoluted logic of the conspiracy theorist, strong evidence against the theory is viewed as part of the conspiracy! As someone once said, "once fanaticism gets inside you, nothing else can."

Ironically, the conservatives that whine about "fake news" are Jones' biggest supporters. Like Trump, most of these conservatives seem to believe that anything with which they disagree must be fake news. Meanwhile, Trump tells an estimated seven lies per day, which his gullible followers eagerly accept.

To his credit, Jones has his share of progressive supporters. They embrace the slippery slope common logical fallacy, or the idea that Jones was unjustly banned from social media, and that anyone with unpopular ideas could also be banned. Indeed, I first became fascinated with Jones' banning from social media as I was listening to a radio program I used to appear on regularly as a guest. The talk show host, Mary Davis, asked her guests about anything in the news they wanted to discuss. Frank Gist, another regular guest, brought up the Alex Jones story. Much to my horror and disgust, Gist said that "some conspiracy theories are true," and started to defend the idea that 9/11 was an inside job. He said he would gladly debate anyone on any number of conspiracy theories. Thankfully, there was a professor that was also a guest on the show who was able to show how crazy and dangerous these kinds of ideas are. It is sad that otherwise rational commentators can destroy their credibility by promoting paranoid conspiracy theories. However, should people be censored because they promote conspiracy theories?

Conspiracy theories can cause widespread panic, rage, violence and death throughout populations. Blacks and Jews have been historically victimized by conspiracy theories and rumor mongering. Is this any different than shouting fire in a crowded theater when there is no fire?

It seems that if conspiracy theories lead to violence, the conspiracy theorists should in some way be held accountable for his or her words. They could certainly be held legally accountable if they were found to be inciting to riot.

It is amazing how comfortable Trump supporters are with a paranoid conspiracy theorist in the White House. They do not understand – or care – what it means to have a sitting president that is divorced from reality.

What does this say to the rest of the world? There certainly will not be any support for reason in this regard coming from most of Trump's fellow Republican politicians. He succeeded in terrorizing them way back during his run for the Presidency. Republicans seem to stand for nothing but naked political power by any means necessary. They have shown repeatedly that they are willing to put the pursuit of political power before the best interests of their country, while hypocritically wrapping themselves in the flag. Though they obviously do not care, history will judge them harshly for their greed, duplicity and cowardice.



Humanist Progress against Blasphemy Laws

A protest against Northern Ireland's blasphemy laws took place in Belfast September 30th to raise awareness of the damaging impact of the law in countries where people face extreme punishment for expressing their views on religion.

Northern Ireland Humanists, which is part of the charity Humanists UK, organised the protests on International Blasphemy Day (Monday, 30 September) as part of its campaign to abolish Northern Ireland's blasphemy laws.

Protesters urged Northern Ireland to play its part in the global fight against blasphemy by removing it as a crime under common law, the Law of Libel Amendment Act 1888, and the Criminal Libel Act 1819, which remain in force in Northern Ireland.

Retaining blasphemy laws like those in Northern Ireland, even if they are not often used, legitimises their use in countries such as Pakistan and Saudi Arabia, where people face the death penalty, mob violence, and other persecution. The abolition of these laws, on the other hand, can be a striking declaration to the world that free speech should not be a crime. Recent abolitions in New Zealand, Canada, and elsewhere, and the upcoming abolition in the Republic of Ireland, have had this beneficial effect.

Even in countries where prosecutions are not common, these laws have still been a source of injustice, as was seen in the Republic of Ireland in 2017 when Humanists UK patron Stephen Fry was investigated for blasphemy.

All parties in Northern Ireland support abolishing the laws except for the Democratic Unionist Party (DUP) and the Ulster Unionist Party (UUP) which is considering its position.

Earlier this month Humanists UK submitted evidence to the UK Parliament's Foreign Affairs Committee on alarming cases of individuals who have been murdered for declaring they have no religious beliefs on their social media accounts.

Religious Freedom: Trump style

(Washington, D.C., September 23, 2019) – At the United Nations Global Call to Protect Religious Freedom event today, President Donald Trump announced the formation of a coalition of U.S. business leaders meant to "encourage the private sector to protect people of all faiths in the workplace." The American Humanist Association's executive director, Roy Speckhardt, attended at the invitation of the Department of State to represent the interests of humanists and other nontheists.

"Given this administration's relentless attempts to permit religious bigotry and discrimination under the guise of religious freedom, this troubling language is likely nothing more than a thinly veiled attempt to privilege Christianity at the expense of true religious freedom for all," explained Speckhardt. The AHA's humanist and atheist constituents were noticeably left out of Trump's call for freedoms for the faithful.

Speckhardt continued, "Since his election, Trump attempted to create and enforce special rights for the religious right. Despite claims to stand by all who seek religious freedom, it's obvious the president does not extend that protection to all. Religious freedom is not, nor should it ever be, a license to discriminate."

The administration also announced efforts to encourage other governments to allow people to "follow their conscience, live by their faith, and give glory to God." However, the number of countries in which nontheists experience harassment is growing rapidly. Twenty-two countries have criminalized apostasy, or renunciation of religious faith, and in 12 countries, the crime is punishable by death.




How often are young atheists rejected by their families? How many people are openly nonreligious in their daily lives? To what extent do atheists face discrimination in the workplace?

We don't know. There's no data to give us the answers to these questions and the many issues facing our community. Unlike demographics based on race, gender, and sexual orientation, federal surveys do not gather data about atheists and nonreligious people.

And this lack of data very much limits our ability to advocate for civil rights for atheists, to understand the challenges atheists face in their daily lives, to seek grant funding to benefit our population, and to establish programs to meet community needs.

That's about to change. On **October 15**, American Atheists will launch the **U.S. Secular Survey at**<u>SecularSurvey.org</u>. With your participation, this will be the largest and most comprehensive data collection about atheists and nonreligious people ever conducted.
