


A Universe from Nothing! A scientific materialist perspective



A common question about the early evolution of the cosmos invariably arises: where did the singularity that started the Big Bang come from? For some time, many physicists and cosmologists have said it could be possible for our universe to have actually started from nothing – as wild and counterintuitive as that sounds. But without evidence this seems like a statement of faith, impossible to prove or disprove, and therefore outside the purview of true scientific discussion. Ever since philosopher, Karl Popper said that falsifiability is the demarcation between what is scientific and what is not, it felt like this might be the point where the scientific method would have to give way to the origin stories

of myth. Now, perhaps not.

According to Scientific



American, a new paper that may be as important to our understanding of the Big Bang as was the detection of gravitational waves. A group from the Wuhan Institute of Physics and Mathematics in China has made the first rigorous <u>mathematical</u> proof that the Big Bang could have spontaneously generated from nothing. They have demonstrated that the universe as pictured above is out of balance (only slightly, but sufficiently) which may be showing the influence of gravity from the existence of other adjacent universes. Stay tuned.



On April 7th, over 25 humanist & atheists joined over 3000 religious participants at Tropicana Field for the FAST Social Justice Rally. The 10th annual Nehemiah rally was the largest, with plans for more attendees next year. Issues included juvenile justice, elementary school reading, dental



care for disadvantage youth, and job opportunities for qualified ex-felons. FAST works year round with government leaders to brainstorm no net cost solutions to Pinellas county problems. Hillsborough, Pasco, and Polk have similar programs.

The annual cycle starts again in Fall, with small home-size meetings to discuss issues for next year. All COR are invited to participate and also join in the detail work groups that both research and brainstorm solutions and monitor the integrity of previous year promises.

Civil liberties news in the Sunshine Stat

Did you know that Florida recently started executing people with similar chemicals to those used in Oklahoma's horrifying botched execution of Clayton Lockett?

We can't risk a repeat of this nightmare happening in our home state. **Demand a moratorium on executions in Florida.**

Florida was the first state to start using Midazolam, the same untested drug added to Oklahoma's lethal injection protocol not long before Mr. Lockett's botched execution. It's even more disturbing when you consider Florida's terrible record of 24 death row exonerations, more than any other state. Combine that with a recent law that takes away opportunities for prisoners to challenge death sentences, and it's easy to imagine Florida's long history of getting the death penalty wrong could mean someone dying for a crime they didn't commit.

Between untested lethal injection drugs and the disturbing track record of Florida death sentences getting it wrong, the risk of the unimaginable - an innocent person dying in agony at the hands of the state - is too high for Floridians to allow this process to continue. <u>Tell Gov. Scott to put</u> an immediate stop to executions in Florida. Thank you for standing in defense of fundamental human rights in our state.

"That turns out to be the only thing we know about how fast ice can respond to climate change," he said.

One day last week, sitting in his office at the end of a maze of hallways on the bottom floor of UM's Cox Science Building, Wanless traced his conclusions on climate change to three turning points in the past three decades.

First came a 1980s workshop where a scientist with the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution presented a paper on rising sea level and tidal gauges. Wanless said he came home, recruited a grad student and started reviewing decades of recordings from tidal gauges. He even found indications of sea rise in his own neighborhood: Oysters attached to pilings on the Le Jeune Road bridge over the Gables Waterway had moved six inches higher since the 1940s.

Then in the 1990s, Mann, the Nobel Prize-winning climatologist. completed climate modeling that he said showed greenhouse gases were driving global warming. The final piece of the puzzle came when scientists found the warming was expanding the planet's oceans, making low-lying Florida, the porous ridge of a larger limestone plateau fingering into the Caribbean, particularly vulnerable.

"Then my talks on sea level rise could suddenly say global warming is real and the warming of our oceans was a good part of sea level rise," Wanless said.

Though some skeptics have argued that the planet has stopped warming because temperatures have stopped rising during the past 15 years, he says that's "hooey."

Greenhouse gases trap heat from the sun. That "back radiation" then gets absorbed by the oceans, which cover about 70 percent of the planet.

"That's the way it's always worked. Water has the great capacity to hold heat. It always has. It's wonderful," he said.

In the summers of 2012 and 2013, Wanless headed to western Greenland to see for himself what was happening with the planet's massive ice sheets. He camped at the bottom of the Jacobshavn glacier, which scientists have been closely watching for signs of collapse. When he flew over in 2012, he said, 97 percent of the ice sheet was glistening as it melted. It is also releasing huge amounts of methane from organic material trapped in the ice, one of the chemicals in the greenhouse gas cocktail that could cause even greater warming.


"In 2002, [scientists] thought the Arctic might be ice-free by 2070," he said. "Now they realize it will be ice-free this decade."

In its report last week, the NASA-funded University of California at Irvine study found warmer ocean water was flowing under the edges of the vast West Antarctic ice sheet, destabilizing it. On his visits to Greenland, which began losing ice mass in the 1970s, Wanless said he could see fractures not just around the sheet's edges, but miles inland.

It looked, he said, like "a meandering river valley for 50 miles because the warm water had gotten in."



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



Throughout the year we host parties like Darwin Day in February, World Humanist Day in June, Freethought Day at Disney in October and Carl Sagan Day in November.



Today many non-theists maintain that too few leaders and organizations among unbelievers are involved in social justice. They maintain that non-theists give too much attention to church/state separation, defense of evolution, religious criticism, etc.

However, many of these critics seem to go too far in the other direction. Rather than working to see to it that social justice becomes a major component of their activities, these critics actually make unbelief a minor consideration in their social justice work.

Now would be a good time to go over some important definitions in no particular order:

- Secular humanism: a system of doctrines or practices that disregards or rejects any form of religious faith and worship.
- Secularism: the belief that religion and ecclesiastical affairs should not enter into the functions of the state, especially into public education.
- Skepticism: doubt about fundamental religious doctrines [or paranormal claims]
- Atheism: without a belief in God or gods.
- Freethought: the formation of opinions about religion, politics, morals, etc., independently of tradition, authority, or established belief.
- Rationalism: the principle or practice of accepting reason as the only authority in determining one's opinions or course of action.

One may agree or disagree with any or all of these definitions. However, the point is that in none of these terms is social justice at the center; and this is as it should be. Yet for some non-theists, social justice has come to be practically synonymous with humanism, secular humanism, skepticism, etc.

Some humanists are extreme in this regard. For example, Barry Seidman, a long-time humanist from New Jersey, defines humanism as a "non-hierarchical" system. In other words, Seidman is an anarcho-socialist or libertarian socialist. In his estimation, a true humanist must embrace libertarian socialism or some other supposedly non-hierarchical system.

The Black Atheists of Atlanta equate atheism with Afrocentrism and reactionary African nationalism. They have maintained that any organization with the word "Black" in the title must necessarily be closed to non-Blacks, especially Whites. After all is said and done, the Black Atheists of Atlanta are simply Afrocentrists that might happen to be atheists. Indeed, they rarely even *discuss* atheism.

However, other non-theists are not so narrow and dogmatic with their definitions. They simply go about promoting social justice in the name of skepticism, atheism, humanism, freethought, etc. That is to say, the emphasis is on social justice, and not unbelief, though one could not tell this from the organizations' names.

This causes a great deal of confusion, anger and resentment. However, it does not have to be that way. The burning question is: Why do these non-theists that are almost exclusively concerned with social justice not simply form secular social justice organizations, or join secular social justice organizations that already exist? This way, they would be attracting and working with the best social justice advocates from among the non-religious *and* the religious.

Some of today's social justice advocates seem to be trying to coerce or hijack the non-theist movement by falsely equating non-theism with social justice. However, these terms are simply not one and the same.

It would certainly improve matters if those that are first and foremost concerned with social justice would see to it that their goal is reflected in their groups' names and prominently displayed mission statements. Names such as the Radical Humanist Group, Humanists for Social Justice, etc. would let non-theists know what they are getting into. The Atheism Plus movement is a good example of this. To equate social justice with non-theism, however, seems disingenuous, and it is certainly misleading.

The late Gordon Stein edited a journal called *The American Rationalist* (now published by the Council for Secular Humanism.) Stein was of the opinion that the numbers of organized humanists were so small that it was best to focus only on rationalism and to avoid subjects that might divide non-theists. Many non-theists share this view.

Today it is hard to get the various non-theist groups to agree to support a single social justice issue. It seems that one answer to that is to first focus on trying to get more non-theists to come out of the closet. Until non-theists constitute a critical mass, any kind of meaningful large-scale activism will continue to be a dream.



At the <u>Center for Inquiry</u>, we believe that evidence-based reasoning, in which humans work together to address common concerns, is critical for modern world civilization. Moreover, unlike many other institutions, we maintain that scientific methods and reasoning should be utilized in examining the claims of both pseudoscience and religion. We reject mysticism and blind faith. No topic should be placed off limits to scrutiny—certainly not fringe science and religion, which have an enormous influence on beliefs and conduct.

We also maintain that values are properly the subject of study and discussion as much as empirical claims. The Center for Inquiry studies and promotes human values based on a naturalistic outlook. Ideological doctrine and religious dogma have no more right to dictate our moral norms than they do to influence scientific research.

the donor has issued a challenge to the secular community to help jump start this critical project.





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
