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

Learning from the Past to Influence the Future

Applying Archaeology to Solve Modern Dilemmas

We often hear lip service paid to George Santayana's warning, "Those who do not learn from history are doomed to repeat it." But seldom do we hear of the applicable solutions to our foibles.



Archaeologist, Naturalist and Certified Permaculture Designer, **Jay Hardman** will present a program on the prehistory of anthropogenic (human created) soil, He will show how ancient practices, adapted through the use of more modern technology and broad scale practices, presents enormous potential for real world solutions. Through petrochemical-free horticultural practices, the sequestration of carbon residue in soils for millennia, and other permaculture solutions, multiple vexing modern issues, can be addressed.

Our immediate, small scale, local applications today will serve as crucibles (pun intended) for industrial farming applicability into the new paradigm of the future. An introduction to Permaculture (permanent culture/agriculture) and examples of user friendly, low-tech options for the backyard farmer/inventor will be offered. What will this mean for a more humanistic world? Group discussion will follow and is encouraged.



Dr. Jonathan Smith



As President of Florida Citizens for Science, Dr. Smith has dealt with many strange forms of life, most notably in the Florida legislature. This time however he will be using his professional experience to discuss more interesting (and likely more intelligent) forms as they might arise elsewhere in the universe. You might not want to miss this discussion, which involves an essential aspect of our evolving cosmos, of which we ourselves are an example.

Dr. Smith is president of the Florida Citizens for Science, whose mission statement gives a fairly comprehensive idea of their purpose:

Florida Citizens for Science is a statewide, nonprofit, grass-roots organization made up of those who wish to help our state develop and maintain the highest educational standards. We support science-based curricula, textbooks, testing methods and appropriately trained teachers to provide students with the analytical skills and understanding necessary for the good of our communities, our state, our country and our world. We welcome members with different political views, religions and philosophies, but maintain that the proper focus of science education is the study of the natural world through observation, testing and analysis.

The Practical Urgency of Science 5

All around us we find an astonishing array of charlatans in all fields of human endeavor. We find people making money out of scams such as weight loss programs, miracle cures for cancer and diabetes, and inheritance and investment scams.

We encounter people who seriously believe that prayer can cure cancer, solve their financial problems and even make it rain in a particular location.

Of course it is much easier to pull this sort of trick on people who have little or no scientific training. They don't ask the questions: "What is the evidence for this claim and is the source reliable? Many people don't know what a double blind test is and don't distinguish between experimental evidence and anecdotes.

Many of these people are not fools, nor do they lack a form of education; they simply don't have even the most basic scientific background.

I have an acquaintance who has been a very successful accountant. He has informed me of his deep religious faith and also of the fact that he does not believe climate change is caused by human activity.

In other words he is able to accept the veracity of documents written by ancient Middle Eastern tribesmen with a personal agenda but not the word of various scientific researchers with no common agenda greater than discovery.

He subscribes to the common story that volcanic action is the cause of the carbon buildup in the atmosphere. He prefers the science of public clowns like Lord Monckton, Andrew Bolt and others.

This is why we have to hold out for improved scientific education at the earliest levels in our schools. The criteria of scientific skepticism needs to be an instrument everyone can use. It needs to be taught to students as soon as they can read, write and count. WA Humanists, Perth AU

The Oil Price Crash of 2014

Oil prices have fallen by half since late June. This is a significant development for the oil industry and for the global economy, though no one knows exactly how either the industry or the economy will respond in the long run. Since it's almost the end of the year, perhaps this is a good time to stop and ask: (1) Why is this happening? (2) Who wins and who loses over the short term?, and (3) What will be the impacts on oil production in 2015?

1. Why is this happening?

Euan Mearns does a good job of explaining the oil price crash here. Briefly, demand for oil is softening (notably in China, Japan, and Europe) because economic growth is faltering. Meanwhile, the US is importing less petroleum because domestic supplies are increasing—almost entirely due to the frantic pace of drilling in "tight" oil fields in North Dakota and Texas, using hydrofracturing and horizontal drilling technologies—while demand has leveled off.

Usually when there is a mismatch between supply and demand in the global crude market, it is up to Saudi Arabia—the world's top exporter—to ramp production up or down in order to stabilize prices. But this time the Saudis have refused to cut back on production and have instead unilaterally cut prices to customers in Asia, evidently because the Arabian royals want prices low. There is speculation that the Saudis wish to punish Russia and Iran for their involvement in Syria and Iraq. Low prices have the added benefit (to Riyadh) of shaking at least some high-cost tight oil, deepwater, and tar sands producers in North America out of the market, thus enhancing Saudi market share.

The media frame this situation as an oil "glut," but it's important to recall the bigger picture: world production of conventional oil (excluding natural gas liquids, tar sands, deepwater, and tight oil) stopped growing in 2005, and has actually declined a bit since then. Nearly all supply growth has come from more costly (and more environmentally ruinous) resources such as tight oil and tar sands. Consequently, oil prices have been very high during this period (with the exception of the deepest, darkest months of the Great Recession). Even at their current depressed level of \$55 to \$60, petroleum prices are still above the International Energy Agency's high-price scenario for this period contained in forecasts issued a decade ago.

Part of the reason has to do with the fact that costs of exploration and production within the industry have risen dramatically (early this year Steve Kopits of the energy market analytic firm Douglas-Westwood estimated that costs were rising at nearly 11 percent annually).

In short, during this past decade the oil industry has entered a new regime of steeper production costs, slower supply growth, declining resource quality, and higher prices. That all-important context is largely absent from most news stories about the price plunge, but without it recent events are unintelligible. If the current oil market can be characterized as being in a state of "glut," that simply means that at this moment, and at this price, there are more willing sellers than buyers; it shouldn't be taken as a fundamental or long-term indication of resource abundance.

2. Who wins and loses, short-term?

Gail Tverberg does a great job of teasing apart the likely consequences of the oil price slump <u>here</u>. For the US, there will be some tangible benefits **Post Carbon Council...**

from falling gasoline prices: motorists now have more money in their pockets

to spend on Christmas gifts. However, there are also perils to the price

plunge, and the longer prices remain low, the higher the risk. For the past five years, tight oil and shale gas have been significant drivers of growth in the American economy, adding \$300 to 400 billion annually to GDP. States with active shale plays have seen a significant increase of jobs while the rest of the nation has merely sputtered along.

Other oil exporting nations with a high-price break-even point—notably Venezuela and Iran, also on Washington's enemies list—are likewise experiencing the price crash as economic catastrophe. But the pain is widely spread: Nigeria has had to redraw its government budget for next year, and North Sea oil production is nearing a point of collapse.

Events are unfolding very quickly, and economic and geopolitical pressures are building. Historically, circumstances like these have sometimes led to major open conflicts, though all-out war between the US and Russia remains unthinkable due to the nuclear deterrents that both nations possess.

As <u>analysis by David Hughes of Post Carbon Institute</u> shows, even without the price crash production in the Bakken and Eagle Ford plays would have been expected to peak and begin a sharp decline within the next two or three years. The price crash can only hasten that inevitable inflection point.

How much and how fast will world oil production fall? **Euan Mearns offers three scenarios**; in the most likely of these (in his opinion) world production capacity will contract by about two million barrels per day over the next two years as a result of the price collapse.

We may be witnessing one of history's little ironies: the historic commencement of an inevitable, overall, persistent decline of world liquid fuels production may be ushered in not by skyrocketing oil prices such as we saw in the 1970s or in 2008, but by a price crash that at least <u>some pundits are spinning as the death of "peak oil."</u> Meanwhile, the economic and geopolitical perils of the unfolding oil price rout make expectations of business-as-usual for 2015 ring rather hollow. *Richard Heinberg, Senior Fellow* Click www.tampabaypostcarbon.com for more.



Civil liberties news in the Sunshine State



In our marriage case, the US supreme court has given us a final word that should allow loving same-sex couples to start getting married and having their marriages recognized in Florida as soon as Tuesday, January 6!

In the drug testing case, the Court ruled that forcing people who apply for temporary state aid to submit to an invasive and humiliating search of their bodily fluids is <u>an unconstitutional</u> government search.

This is the fourth time a court has rejected Gov. Scott's arguments that the government can subject people to tandom searches of their bodily fluids based on nothing more than stereotypes about poor people, but Gov. Scott has stated before that he is willing to defend this plan all the way to the U.S. Supreme Court. We need a strong network of supporters to help us protect these important wins from being overturned in Florida.

He offers a blizzard of ideas, from healthy recipes that stimulate natural "feel-good" chemicals in the brain to the journaling of positive events, even on a bad day. The highest attainable happiness, though, is communing with friends.



"I like to say that most of philosophy, which is a declining and highly endangered academic species, incidentally, consists of failed models of how the brain works. So students going into philosophy have to learn what Descartes thought and then after a long while why that's wrong and what Schopenhauer might have thought and what Kant might of thought or did think. But they cannot go on from that position and historical examination of the nature of humanity to what it really is and how we might define it. So by default the explanation of meaning, of humanity, falls to science and we are making progress, if I might speak for science."

"Much like the current appeal of the libertarian movement and *Reason* magazine, the sharp iconoclasm of Myers and others appeals to young people seeking something novel and antiestablishment, an outlook easily captured in a T-shirt and expressed as an identity by way of a label such as atheist. But as college students move into their late twenties and thirties, marry and start families, something more than entertaining, ideologically reinforcing attacks on religion are needed to sustain adult-level engagement.

"Studies show that rising Millennials are skeptical or at least ambivalent about religion, but at the same time looking for a positive and inclusive message about values, tolerance, and collective action to solve problems. Among this generation, there is a deep commitment to tolerance, diversity, and public service.

"A positive vision of secular humanism can capture and channel this ethos across the life course of a diverse segment of individuals, from college to old age. In contrast, the rhetoric offered by confrontationalists such as Myers is in many ways counter to this emerging preference among young people and to the need for a life-long philosophy, preaching instead intolerance while encouraging individualism and association among only like-minded others."


Jennifer Hancock started this organization several years ago. It uniquely serves Humanist families with a variety of wonderful programs throughout the year.




The idea is to gather together the top Humanist educators to provide courses that will help people think better, have better relationships and get better results by using the techniques and tools of Humanism.



Religion is Dying: Soaring Secularism in America and the West

By James A. Haught, Paperback (\$6.93) or E-book (\$3.99) — Author's Web site

Perhaps 50 million adult Americans now say their religion is "none" or "don't know." This number has climbed dramatically since the 1990s.

About 20 million U.S. Catholics have left that church - so one-tenth of American adults now are ex-Catholics.

Two-thirds of American Christians in their 20s drop out of church before age 30, one report estimates.

Once-prestigious mainline Protestant faiths with seminary-educated clergy have disintegrated so severely since 1960 that one analyst refers to "Flatline Protestantism."

An estimated 4,000 American churches close each year.

From every direction, evidence is snowballing that America, known for devout religion, is following the secular path of Western Europe, Canada, Australia, Japan and other modern democracies, where churchgoing has retreated to a fringe.

The trend can be seen in cultural changes such as the rapid social acceptance of gays. The Bible commands that homosexuals "shall surely be put to death," and fundamentalist churches have ranted against them for centuries - yet most Americans now feel that they deserve human rights and equality. Religion has lost its power to dictate America's morality.

The Barna religion polling service says secularism has ballooned so much that "about 156 million U.S. adults and children are churchless." That's half of the population.

This book chronicles the slow, relentless demise of supernatural religion in educated societies.



Neil deGrasse Tyson and the value of philosophy

"It seems like my friend Neil deGrasse Tyson [1] has done it again: he has dismissed philosophy as a useless enterprise, and actually advised bright students to stay away from it. It is not the first time Neil has done this sort of thing, and he is far from being the only scientist to do so. But in his case the offense is particularly egregious, for two reasons: first, because he is a highly visible science communicator; second, because I told him not to, several times.

"Let's start with the latest episode, work our way back to a few others of the same kind (to establish that this is a pattern, not an unfortunate fluke), and then carefully tackle exactly where Neil and a number of his colleagues go wrong. But before any of that, let me try to halt the obvious objection to this entire essay in its tracks: no, this isn't about defending "my" turf, for the simple reason that *both* philosophy and science are my turf [2]. I have practiced both disciplines as a scholar/researcher, I have taught introductory and graduate level classes in both fields, and I have written books about them both. So, while what follows inevitably will unfold as a defense of philosophy (yet again! [3]), it is a principled defense, not a petty one, and it most certainly doesn't come from any kind of science envy.

"Neil made his latest disparaging remarks about philosophy as a guest on the Nerdist podcast [4], following a statement by one of the hosts, who said that he majored in philosophy. Neil's comeback was: "That can really mess you up." The host then added: "I always felt like maybe there was a little too much question asking in philosophy [of science]?"
