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

It's time! Time for us to celebrate Humanism boldly under its own name. We've become accustomed to deferring to "reason" and "science" in our commemorative events as if those essential elements represent all there is to say about us. Perhaps we were made shy by attempts in past years in some right wing circles to make "humanism" a "dirty" word.

Circumstances change. Only this month a new Pew Research report re-emphasizes that disaffiliation from traditional religious institutions continues to increase in the U.S., and suggests a growing need for shared values that grow out of direct human experience and the much more informed knowledge of the natural world than existed when our main religious traditions were born many centuries ago.

Please come and participate as part of a program featuring a 'round-the-world tour of the ways humanism is conceived and presented ("marketed," if you will) by humanist groups internationally, in the U.S., and especially in Florida.

Listen to views expressed by leaders of area groups in panel discussion and express your own. Is humanism a personal philosophy or a shared world-view and way of life ready to take its place among the number of life-stances that characterize cultures around the world?

Is humanism "Eight Letters -- No More!?" That is, need it be modified by adjectives of any kind, such as "secular?" Always with a capital "H?" Does "one-size" now fit all?

And share a few moments honoring Humanist "elders" and pioneers who live in our local communities.

We launch this modest effort in the hope that it will inspire other Florida groups to take up the celebration of World Humanist Day.

World Humanist Day celebrations were initiated by several state associations in the U.S. in the 1980s, and subsequently the day was recognized and the date fixed as June 21 jointly by the American Humanist Association (AHA) and the International Humanist and Ethical Union (IHEU).

For some time the day has been promoted largely by the IHEU, a network of well over 100 organizations around the world, many of them networks as well, including in the U.S., the AHA, American Ethical Union, Center for Inquiry, Institute for Science and Human Values and the Society for Humanistic Judaism.

Steve Brown is the man behind the scenes and main organizer of this World Humanist Day observance.

Steve has a long and active history of involvement with the Humanist movement as a way of life over the past 60 years.




Richard Dawkins


Thus substantive and exciting new activities are offered to the Tampa Bay area that were not possible for most organizations before.

Reflections on Segregation in Florida

Shade in the Sunshine State: Reflections on Segregation in Florida, is a powerful history of segregation in Florida, alternating between first-person remembrances and real-life visual images of contemporaneous advertising, postcards, and newspaper articles. Particular attention will be given to the time between the start of WWII (late 1930s) and the time after the passage of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. Topics will include the Rosenwald Schools of Florida; Jackie Robinson's minor league baseball debut in Sanford and Daytona Beach; Ft. Lauderdale's 1961 "wade-in"; Jacksonville's 1960 sit-in; the exclusion of Jews from hotels all over the state; the integration of Florida schools; and even a science fiction book.

The take away from this lecture is two-fold. First, all Americans of a "certain age" have memories of segregation, regardless of where they lived, segregation is part of American history. Second, no matter how far we very well may have to come, there is no doubt, and "Shade in the Sunshine State" will make this very clear, there is no doubt that in the past fifty years America as a nation, and Americans as individuals have come a long, long way in ensuring equal rights for all. There is progress to be made, but the 50th anniversary of the Civil Rights and Voting Rights Acts is a good opportunity to reflect on the progress that has been made.

This Can't be happening!

A tectonic shift is occurring suddenly in the debate over climate change.

Only a few years ago, at least in the US corporate media, there was always a rough equivalence accorded to those experts who were warning about a looming climate disaster facing mankind, and those who called the whole thing a "conspiracy" by corrupt scientists and politicians (without ever explaining what the motive would have been).

Suddenly, though, that rough equivalence in the coverage is gone. The climate deniers are now exposed as charlatans in the pay of energy companies, and the coverage has shifted to talking about climate disaster being closer than we had been being told. If there is a "conspiracy," we are now learning, it may be that climate scientists, afraid of creating a sense of hopelessness and doom among the public, have been soft-pedaling their warnings, stressing the need to quickly cut back on the use of greenhouse-gas-producing fuels in order to try and keep global warming below 2 degrees centigrade (roughly 4 degrees Fahrenheit), when they all really know that a 4-degree centigrade rise is already "baked into" the earth's near-term climate future, perhaps by as early as 2100.

This shift has yet to make its way into the public's consciousness in the US (and much of the rest of the world too), but it is clearly going to happen. The question then will be: how will governments, and more importantly, the people of the world, respond to the new much grimmer reality?

Clearly, the capitalist system, fully corrupted at this point because of the size to which global corporations have grown, and the power they have gained to buy governments, cannot and will not rescue humanity from itself. Just look at the latest news from the Shell Oil Company, where internal documents just released show that company scientists have assured top executives that global warming in the far north means Shell can aggressively lease tracts of the formerly ice-bound Arctic Ocean and move floating platforms up there to extract even more oil and gas from the newly ice-free seafloor. These documents flatly declare that a 2°C temperature rise is passe and that a 4°C rise is already in the cards, moving towards a staggering 6° C rise (note for US readers: that is an almost 11°F temperature rise globally!).

The notion that corporations and a capitalist politico-economic system could ever take the necessary steps to halt climate disaster, for example by adopting energy conservation and becoming "green" companies, was always a pipedream. Just "going green," while still producing unneeded junk and continuing to try and grow would never reduce total carbon emissions. It would require massively scaling back the production of useless or polluting goods and

services, and shutting down many operations. And while the current US Supreme Court majority may think, or pretend to think, that corporations are people, they actually are institutions that are by their very nature and structure devoid of conscience, devoid of morality, and even devoid of any sense of long-term self-preservation"

Planetary boundaries discourse could help explain to frightened masses why the world seems to be falling apart around them, while community resilience-building could help them adapt to changed conditions.

FLORIDA REPORT

Civil liberties news in the Sunshine State



The Tampa Bay Times' [recent disclosure](#) that police are targeting Blacks who ride bicycles — including *children as young as three years old* — for dramatically high rates of stops and searches is the latest piece in the nationwide debate about racial profiling that has followed the police-involved deaths of Michael Brown, Eric Garner, Walter Scott, Freddie Gray, and countless others.

Communities across the country are connecting the deluge of incidents in which police use force against Blacks (or, as in Gray's case, show gross disregard for Black life) to everyday interactions in which police stop, frisk, and search Blacks and Latinos because of their race, rather than evidence of wrongdoing — a practice well-documented in [New York](#), [Boston](#), [Philadelphia](#), and [Ferguson](#). The latest reports from Tampa underscore just how little progress has been made in rooting out racial profiling and how the routine over-policing of communities of color can lead to interactions that tragically devolve into the use of force.

The Tampa Police Department should also [accept the invitation](#) of civil rights groups and faith leaders to discuss bicycle enforcement and reforms to address racial disparities in policing. And it should stop issuing bicycle tickets until an investigation identifies the source of the problem, to prevent the needless issuance of tickets for minor infractions.


Challenge, Create, Connect: Our new motto focuses our commitment to bring the beauty, values, and lessons of the humanities to USF and our community.

Parenting without Punishment



I have never hit my kid. Well, not never. I did one time whack him when he bit my butt, but that was an accident. I was doing dishes when he bit me and I wheel around to see what it was and accidentally hit him in the process. We both cried quite a bit as a result.

What I mean to say is I've never used physical punishment on my child. My son is intelligent, well behaved and a joy to be around. He's 9 and he's reasonably well disciplined. I say reasonably because I still have to keep track of his homework and remind him to do it. But, he's only 9, I'm pretty sure he will eventually have enough self-discipline to be responsible for those tasks too.

Given how many parents seem to think hitting kids and physical punishment is necessary to raising a well-disciplined kid, I have to wonder if maybe their definition of discipline is different from mine. To me discipline isn't imposed by others, it is self-discipline that is the ideal. I was able to help my son become such a pleasant well behaved kid because I taught him how to choose to be good for himself. If I had tried to force him to obey me through the use of physical punishment he would have never become self-disciplined.

Hitting kids to get them to obey you is a form of bullying. It's abusive. It's unnecessary and it's counterproductive to the goal of raising well behaved kids who have sufficient self-discipline to behave well without the threat of punishment.

I'm not alone in thinking this. The American Psychological Association agrees. They came out against corporal punishment back in 1975 as being unnecessary to the development of moral and competent adults (<http://www.apa.org/about/policy/corporal-punishment.aspx>) and more and more research has been done that shows that not only is spanking as punishment not necessary, it's actually counterproductive - <http://www.apa.org/monitor/2012/04/spanking.aspx>

But is the question of whether or not to physically punish children a Humanist issue? Of course it is. The methods humanist parents use to raise ethical, responsible adults must reflect our values. Physically battering a child is morally indefensible given that it serves no good purpose and is actually counterproductive. We have other more humane methods we can use to help our children learn self-discipline and we should be using them.

An enforcement tool, *Fifty Shades of Grey*


“An old story, repackaged”

Carl Sagan and the Dangers of Skepticism

This is an excerpt from [Junior Skeptic 50](#) (published in 2014 inside [Skeptic](#) magazine Vol. 19, No. 1), which is a ten-page biography of Sagan emphasizing his work in scientific skepticism. A different [short excerpt](#) of another section of this story appeared previously in [Skepticblog](#).

Junior Skeptic is written for (older) children, and does not include endnotes, though I often call out important sources in sidebars or the text of the story itself. However, I've included some relevant citations here for your interest:

Sagan believed skeptics "are performing a courageous and essential social service for the rest of us."² But he never lost his concern about how skeptics did that work. Skeptics sometimes cut corners in the quality of their research, he warned: "Sometimes it looks as if the skeptical conclusion came...before, not after, the evidence was examined."³ He also cautioned skeptics strongly against an "us and them" attitude:

You can get into a habit of thought in which you enjoy making fun of all those other people who don't see things as clearly as you do. This is a potential social danger of an organization like CSICOP. We have to guard carefully against it.

Sagan considered it not only unhelpful but also unfair when skeptics act "superior and contemptuous." He added, "I've even sometimes heard, to my retrospective dismay, that unpleasant tone in my own voice."¹⁰ I've often wondered if Sagan had a specific occasion in mind as an example. Some skeptics and others have argued that Sagan was not careful enough in his research when he criticized the pseudoscientific theories of Immanuel Velikovsky.¹¹ Some also felt that Sagan was unkind in his 1974 debate with the elderly Velikovsky. Science fiction author Jerry Pournelle said "Sagan wisecracked through the whole 'debate'...using his verbal skills to ridicule the old man. It was as shameful a thing as I ever saw Carl do."¹² (See [Junior Skeptic 49](#) for the story of Velikovsky's life.)

Two decades after his debate with Velikovsky, near the end of his life, Sagan called again for kindness. Skepticism can be "heroic," he said. But we must always remember that:

supporters of superstitions and pseudoscience are human beings with real beliefs, who, like the skeptics, are trying to figure out how the world works and what our role in it might be. ... If their culture has not given them all the tools they need to pursue this great quest, let us temper our criticism with kindness. The Brutalist Style in Academia

The term "Brutalism," that describes an architectural style, evolved out of the French term for "bare concrete," as many such buildings are undecorated, often oversized, and dominate the natural environment.

I think it reflects a trend in academia *in general*, one that has shifted the focus from the best, most humanistic qualities of the liberal arts towards something much more severe, less human, and that undermines the most noble purposes of universities. I was lucky to be in graduate school from 1992 to 1997, just before the bottom fell out of the market for graduates. There was still hope, and many in my graduating class found tenure track jobs. Some have risen to national prominence. Now, as opportunities diminish, university administrations appear to have helped promote a trend that mimics the cold, stark, inhuman texture of brutalist architecture.

I recently struck a chord with a tweet, receiving 38 retweets: "Philosophy as a discipline has been nearly destroyed by careerism, professionalization, and conformism... all driven by fear," I think that the brutalist trend is what is at work in my field.

Finally, in order to ascend in the profession, conformity is fostered. As in other fields, too much "rocking of the boat" will hold you back. You cannot cross the wrong people, and you must bow to the right gatekeepers. Don't attempt something too new, too radical, too risky. Stay within the lines, make only incremental arguments, avoid controversy.

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

Why Atheist groups deserve equal protection under the first amendment as religious groups.

Is Atheism a Religion?

Atheists of Florida, Inc. (d/b/a Florida Atheists) does not represent itself as a church, nor does it consider itself a religion. However, the U.S. Supreme Court and several other federal courts have recognized atheism as equivalent to a “religion” for purposes of the First Amendment. *McCreary County, Ky. v. American Civil Liberties Union of Ky.*, 545 U.S. 844, 125 S.Ct. 2722, 162 L.Ed.2d 729 (2005). In *Reed v. Great Lakes Cos.*, 330 F.3d 931, 934 (7th Cir.2003), it was said that “if we think of religion as taking a position on divinity, then atheism is indeed a form of religion.” In *Kaufman v. McCaughtry*, 419 F.3d 678, 682 (7th Cir. 2005), the court stated that “Atheism is, among other things, a school of thought that takes a position on religion, the existence and importance of a supreme being, and a code of ethics. As such, we are satisfied that it qualifies as Kaufman’s religion for purposes of the First Amendment”.

Do Atheists have a code of ethics?

There is no single code of ethics that all atheists have adopted. However, many of us find the origin of human morality in the hypothesis Frank Zindler stated in his essay “Ethics without Gods”

“As human beings, we are social animals. Our sociality is the result of evolution, not choice. Natural selection has equipped us with nervous systems which are peculiarly sensitive to the emotional status of our fellows.”

Humans have built societies on the recognition of our interdependence, and historical evolution has provided us with the

various codifications we call ethics. Most atheist organizations have built substantial intellectual structures, and find validation, on the basis of ethical arguments.

More directly, as a 501c3 and a non-profit corporation in the state of Florida, Atheists of Florida Inc. maintain bylaws that were established when we incorporated. These original bylaws included our prospective purposes, which contained the following objectives among others:

“Cooperation and equality—not conflict—among all peoples must be encouraged and promoted”

“To perceive the believers of any faith, as the product of unfounded dogmas toward whom sympathy and understanding must be extended.”

Membership in the organization is “open to all persons and organizations adherent to the purposes” of the bylaws. While we have modified the language of these purposes over the years, the influence of the founders continues, especially the idea of treating people with respect and equality. We continue to emphasize positive moral behavior in our interactions with others. As such, Atheists of Florida, Inc. does hold to the ethical standards exemplified in its bylaws. As well, under federal law, we therefore should be given equal protection under the first amendment as traditional religious groups

So what does this mean in relation to the First Amendment and other “religions”? To me, it means that government should stay out of our affairs, just like it traditionally has done with churches and religions since the founding of our country. It means we have the same right to autonomy – to be free from illicit government interference – that churches already have.
