

The air is almost electric with the crackle, zing, and fizz of renewed interest in the Freethought movement here in the Tampa Bay area. The arrival of Richard Dawkins in our midst marks a turning point of sorts.

In 1985 there was no organized freethought presence in the area. Now there are more than 10 such groups with many more allied groups and over 400 members. Meetup groups have memberships that total over 1000. The recent and growingly successful events of TB-CoR are yet another indicator of the expanding influence of these alternatives to conventional religion. On the world scale, the election and tour of the current pope show another sea change in the tactics of the major religious bodies as they struggle to regain the prestige and authority that has slipped away in the accelerating evolution of the world's people toward secular forms of life.

If you are not yet a member of our movement, now is the time to join with like minded sisters and brothers everywhere who are showing that the joy of critical thinking and a superstition free existence are worth pursuing.

Three Questions of the Economy and Morality

- What constitutes a good life and how should I live mine?
- If the norms of my current civilized society no longer apply, what moral framework will I live by?
- What will be my moral boundaries?

It's important to answer these questions for yourself sooner rather than later. Egregious moral lapses usually occur in unfamiliar situations where the normal moorings which regulate our moral reasoning and conduct are absent. This situation could arise for many of us in the eventuality of a sudden energy or financial crisis in a fluctuating economy. What concerns me most is the behavior of our governments during such a crisis. What will you do if your government starts to enact laws and policies which you find morally objectionable? Would you stand up and risk their censure or would you pretend not to notice programs or incidents which didn't directly affect you?

Cap Fossil Fuel Production Now!

Right now climate policy negotiators are hammering out an agreement to be signed in Paris late this year. Of the policy measures being discussed, some (carbon taxes) do not entail actual caps. If caps are approved, there are further decisions to be made: should we limit carbon dioxide emissions (which can be complicated: do you account for offsets, which can be gamed?) or actual fossil fuel extraction at the mine or wellhead (which is likely to be much simpler)? Then, how should remaining production amounts be allocated? A promising idea that has gleaned far too little attention is the use of rationing, via Tradable Energy Quotas.

Our climate dilemma is dire and worsening by the month. We have no time to dither. We should do the simplest, most straightforward thing and forgo an ever-larger annual portion of fossil fuel production, limiting extraction at the mine/wellhead. Then allocate produced fuels via tradable quotas to citizens on a per-capita basis and auction the rest to industry, with companies vital to the renewable energy transition either subsidized outright or given a discount on the fossil energy they use. Also, we should create one international fund for relief from climate-related disasters, and another to help poor countries do an endrun around carbon-heavy development policies by going directly for renewable energy and intermediate technology. Oh yes, and while we're at it: we should provide serious support for carbon sequestration efforts that center on soil-building and reforestation.

Will this be the outcome of the United Nations Conference on Climate Change in Paris, November 30-December 11? Don't hold your breath. But if this is what you think we should do, now is the time to say so. *Richard Heinberg*, Senior fellow



How to lose friends and influence fewer: On being good allies

About thirteen years ago I wrote about the culture wars we faced and their roots in the Dominionist movement. Much has changed in that time, and it seems that we are winning against those forces -- those who would try to undo secularism. Through victories big and small, in courts, legislatures, and by slow cultural change, we have successfully pushed back in many ways against the onslaught on secularism, although some exceptions remains, there are battles still to be fought. It is at times like this that movements become vulnerable. We are vulnerable.

Our mission and our goals remain the same: continue the project of the enlightenment, ensure safety for secularism, continue to critique religion and superstition and promote the methods of empiricism, naturalism and humanism. There are many who share some of the same goals, and those of us who work even within the same institutions have differing views on how to pursue those goals, or even differing visions of those goals. As with any "movement" it shifts and sways, alters course and accommodates changes, becomes more or less urgent depending upon the cultural milieu. And as with any movement, it depends upon groups of individuals, and individuals are prone to their own interests and concerns.
