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





#### The "Quotable" Richard Dawkins

"My eyes are constantly wide open to the extraordinary fact of existence. Not just human existence, but the existence of life and how this breathtakingly powerful process, which is natural selection, has managed to take the very simple facts of physics and chemistry and build them up to redwood trees and humans."

"The chances of each of us coming into existence are infinitesimally small, and even though we shall all die some day, we should count ourselves fantastically lucky to get our decades in the sun."

"Secularism is categorically not saying that the religious may not speak out publicly or have a say in public life. It is about saying that religion alone should not confer a privileged say in public life, or greater influence on it. It really is as simple as that."

"It's a horrible idea that God, this paragon of wisdom and knowledge, power, couldn't think of a better way to forgive us our sins than to come down to Earth in his alter ego as his son and have himself hideously tortured and executed so that he could forgive himself."

"By all means let's be open-minded, but not so open-minded that our brains drop out."

"In the original introduction to the word meme in the last chapter of 'The Selfish Gene,' I did actually use the metaphor of a 'virus.' So when anybody talks about something going viral on the Internet, that is exactly what a meme is, and it looks as though the word has been appropriated for a subset of that."

"Design can never be an ultimate explanation for anything. It can only be a proximate explanation. A plane or a car is explained by a designer but that's because the designer himself, the engineer, is explained by natural selection."

"Religion is capable of driving people to such dangerous folly that faith seems to me to qualify as a kind of mental illness."

#### **Banned Books Week (September 27–October 3)**

Harry Potter, *To Kill a Mockingbird*, *Of Mice and Men*, *The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn*, *The Lord of the Rings*, *The Great Gatsby*, and *Fahrenheit 451*. And each year, coalitions of citizens, teachers, schools, and libraries come together to fight back and celebrate the free exchange of ideas that reading promotes.

What can your group do to celebrate Banned Books Week? Check out some of these ideas:


- Lecture/Presentation: Invite a school librarian or other speaker to give a presentation on censorship, book banning, blasphemy, and/or free speech.
- **Banned Books Readout**: Invite group members and passers-by to read aloud sections from their favorite banned and challenged books in a public area on campus.
- Food for Freethought: The Metro State Atheists at Metropolitan College of Denver came up with this service project idea. During Banned Books Week, they gave away donated books to students who bring in non-perishable food items to be donated to a food bank.

#### **International Blasphemy Rights Day (September 30)**

IBRD was founded to commemorate the Danish Muhammad cartoons that incited riots on September 30, 2005. However, its significance has extended far beyond defending the right to publish blasphemous cartoons; with four Bangladeshi secularist bloggers murdered in 2015 alone, it's more imperative than ever that we stand up for the ability to criticize religion and its effects without fear of retalliation. IBRD is a day to celebrate the right to free expression, and that no idea, even one considered by some to be sacred, is immune from criticism.

CFI is on the front lines of fighting back against anti-blasphemy laws, thanks to our Office of Public Policy and Campaign for Free Expression initiatives. Our Campaign for Free Expression resource page is packed with ways you can get involved, including these ideas:

- Free Speech Demonstrations: Give students an opportunity to exercise their freedom of speech or to speak out on why free expression is important to them by providing a "free speech" board, handing out chalk, or passing around a megaphone (but make sure you check your university's policies before doing something that could potentially disrupt classes).
- Artistic Performances: Many artists and performers strongly support the freedom of expression. Host a musician, slam poet, visual artist, or stand-up comedian whose work pertains to exercising their speech rights, or even has been subject to censorship.
- Educational Efforts: Spread the word about the effects of blasphemy laws in other countries by setting up an informative display or hosting a lecture. Check out CFI's Campaign for Free Expression to learn more about specific cases.

When climate scientists talk about carbon, they usually do so in terms of parts per million. During the last ice age, when much of North America was covered in glaciers a mile thick, carbon-dioxide levels in the atmosphere were around a hundred and eighty parts per million. For the ten thousand years leading up to the industrial revolution, they hovered around two hundred and eighty parts per million. By 1992, when the Framework Convention was drafted. they had reached three hundred and fifty parts per million. As MOP followed COP, carbon-dioxide levels kept rising. This spring, they topped four hundred parts per million.

Owing to the CO<sub>2</sub> that's been pumped into the air so far, average global temperatures have risen by about 0.85 degrees Celsius (1.5 degrees Fahrenheit). This relatively small increase has produced some very large effects: almost half of the permanent Arctic ice cap has melted away, millions of acres' worth of trees in the American West have died from warming-related pest infestations, and some of West Antarctica's major glaciers, containing tens of thousands of cubic miles of ice, have started to disintegrate. But the system has yet to reach a new equilibrium, so even if CO<sub>2</sub> levels were to stop rising tomorrow the world would continue to warm, by about .5 degrees Celsius (.9 degrees Fahrenheit).

To hold warming to less than two degrees Celsius, the best estimates available suggest that total emissions will have to be kept under a trillion tons of carbon. The world has already consumed around two-thirds of this budget. If current trends continue, the last third will be used up within the next few decades. What's fundamentally at issue in Paris—although the matter is never stated this baldly, because, if it were, the conference might as well be called off—is who should be allowed to emit the tons that remain.

One approach would be to assign these tons on the basis of aggregate emissions. Under this approach, very large emitters, like the United States, might not get any of the dwindling slice, on the ground that they've already gobbled up so much. Another way to allocate emissions would be to grant everyone on the planet an equal share of what's left; in that case, the U.S. would still have to radically reduce its emissions, but not all the way down to zero. A third approach would be to focus on efficiency. It's expensive to shutter power plants and factories that have already been built. But, as the cost of renewable energy declines, it may be cheaper to, say, put up solar panels than to construct a new coal plant. If growth can truly be decoupled from emissions, then poor countries shouldn't need to burn through lots of carbon in order to become wealthy.

The US Navy is investing in the largest solar farm in the world in order to provide power for 14 of its bases.

The climate of Arizona, where the two earlier phases of the Mesquite solar farm are already up and running, provides 300 days of sunshine a year. And the Navy's deal to extend the farm is the largest purchase of renewable energy ever made by a US federal government agency.

The solar farm project is one of a growing number being installed across what is known as the American Sun Belt - the southern states of America, which have expanding populations, plenty of sunshine, but also large areas of arid and unproductive land.

The price of solar panels has now fallen so far worldwide that, in sunny climes, they can compete on cost with any other form of energy generation. This new generation of huge solar farms produces as much power as a large coal-fired plant.

China and India are also building similarly massive installations, taking advantage of their own sun belts and desert regions. It is doubtful that Mesquite 3, huge as it is, will manage to remain the world's largest for long.




# Clearwater UU Humanists





The Importance of Science Literacy in Health Care

There is no area of life where critical thinking is more important than in your health care choices.

Unfortunately, cutting through the clutter to the science is not easy. I am a member of a woo free mom's group online. A group of moms who are dedicated to ensuring we make science based choices for our families and ourselves when it comes to health decisions. And we struggle with it.

The most often asked question is – is this woo or not. (Woo is information that looks like science – but isn't). If we have trouble figuring it out, it's not easy.

So why make the effort? Because your life may depend on it. Is salt good or bad for you? How much fat can or should you eat? Who can we trust when the science seems to change all the time! First fat is bad, then it's good then it's only sort of good but only if it's certain types of fat – but wait – isn't coconut oil good, maybe not – depends on what you are using it for and whether you have heart health problems. (sigh)

My husband recently had to have some heart stents put in. Ok – so I researched them. Found out well yes, the new stents that prevent reclosing of the artery also increase risks of blood clots slightly – which is why you have to take blood thinners for at least a year afterwards.

Why risk this? Because with no stent, the arteries reclose 30% of the time and with non -medicated stents 25% of the time, but with the new medicated stents they reclose only 10% of the time. So in the risk reward analysis – the slight increase risk of blood clots is outweighed by the benefit of reduced likelihood of needing the procedure again.

Of course, if you really want to improve your chances, you have to eat right too otherwise your heart disease will continue to be a problem.

So – what have I learned from our recent medical journey? That I need to trust the doctors! I can do all the research I want and totally freak myself out with fear and confusion, or ... I could just ask the doctor who is actually trained on these things and understands the science because - that's his rather specialized job (I am saying he because my husband's cardiologist is a he). Asking this doctor questions taught me more than all of my own research.

I'm not saying don't educate yourself. I'm saying Doctor Googles isn't always reliable. (see http://io9.com/i-fooled-millions-into-thinking-chocolate-helps-weight-1707251800) If you are confused after consulting Doctor Googles, which you probably will be, consult an actual professional. They really do know more than you Thank you! Jennifer Hancock do.

# Online Tools for Skeptical Fact Checking

Changes to the media over the past few decades have brought many distressing trends. Social media tend to reward emotional manipulation over truth-telling. News outlets, even well respected ones, rush to publish rumors and poorly substantiated claims. The fragmentation of news into ideological islands and search engines' tendency to cater to our preferences have helped to polarize viewpoints.

But while we're arguably awash in more misinformation than ever before, online media have also enabled tools and sources that help us evaluate dubious claims. I recently spoke at the Skeptic's Toolbox, the annual skeptical workshop in Eugene, OR, about the variety of fact-checking tools available. It was less a lecture than a conversation, as the participants provided many of their own suggestions. While we can't pretend to be comprehensive, our combined lists should provide a good starting point for your fact-checking needs.

# What is "Fact Checking"?

There are a variety of ways to answer this question. One way to think of fact checking is in light of its role in forming and evaluating arguments. As skeptics, we spend a lot of time looking for logical fallacies. But it takes more than sound logic for a conclusion to be true: the premises of the argument must be true as well or the entire argument falls apart.

We can investigate the soundness of our premises by examining internal consistency, external plausibility, and source validity.

- ♦ Internal consistency: If you read a claim and there are points of disagreement within the claim, that's a sign of something wrong.
- ♦ External plausibility: We should check the story against what we already know, and we may also do more research to check it out further.
- Source validity: We must identify the source of the claim, verify the source's identity, and consider the source's motives.

# The Inevitable Growth of Atheism: Six Predictions

The question is not if religion is declining but what shape the decline is taking and how it will play out. By Daniel C. Dennett and Linda LaScola, From Patheos\*, August 19, 2015

Given the obvious and continued decline of religion in the U.S., as reported in the recent <u>Pew Study</u>, the question is not *if* religion is declining but *what shape* the decline is taking and how it will play out. We offer six trends to watch — and a final proviso.

- 1) The internet will continue to influence falling way from religion, and it will snowball, since the <u>new transparency</u> penetrates almost all firewalls. For instance, the Mormons are confronted by DNA evidence challenging their 19<sup>th</sup>-century claims of the lost tribes of Israel being American Indians and the Roman Catholic Church can no longer bury its secrets. The internet also enables new institutions, such as <u>The Clergy Project</u>, offering a private meeting place for non-believing clergy no matter where they live. (In 2007 we couldn't find anything on the internet about non-believing clergy, now Google shows 844,000 results.)
- 2) Humanist communities will continue to grow. There is plenty of pressing work for local communities to do, especially as "lifeboats" to turn to if the internet (and the power grid) ever collapse, as many experts predict. Avoiding panic for, say, forty-eight hours, while the technicians scramble to get it running again would avoid the sort of chaos envisaged in all the end-of-civilization movies, and well-prepared humanist groups could lead the way, keeping their neighbors informed and calm and sheltered. Sunday Assembly and the new groups set up by former clergy, Jerry Dewitt and Mike Aus, may thrive or may not. It depends on how many people feel the need for a regular dose of communal ceremony and moral reaffirmation, and as family ties to these traditions are loosened, generation by generation, this practice may become ever rarer.
- **3)** Christian denominations will continue to decline as more people become "cafeteria believers" who no longer associate belonging to a church or receiving the sacraments with being a Christian in good standing.
- **4)** The "nones" and other stepping stones to frank atheism will grow as the stigma of not belonging to religious institutions declines. More people will identify as spiritual-but-not-religious (SBNR) and more SBNR will move to the agnostic category as openly questioning religion becomes more commonplace. Others will roll over into atheism with the same ease and none of these nones will raise their children in a religion. Religious customs and holidays will persevere, though, and perhaps the term "secular Christian" will catch on, with the same acceptable non-religious connotation as "secular Jew."
- 5) Liberal clergy will continue to lead the move away from biblical religion. They are humanists' natural allies in the forefront of all progressive causes anti-slavery, women in the clergy, LGBTQ. They do this not to tailor their image, but because it's the right thing to do. They are losing members while preserving their integrity. We predict they will keep discarding bits of Christian doctrine until it's gone. This is already happening via the "human Jesus" studies of the Westar Institute that focus on Jesus as a first-century "Jewish wisdom teacher," not as a God. But why would people choose to devote themselves to one ancient human when there are so many wise humans throughout history to admire?
- We agree with the liberal clergy in our study: the human Jesus is a transitional figure. Once Christians shed their obsolete attachment to supernatural beliefs and belief in the Bible as anything other than stories, their next stop is humanism. Many already don't hold such beliefs or don't hold them very firmly. It might even be true that liberal churches, by straightforwardly disavowing all supernaturalism as nonsense, will reverse their membership decline, bringing in people who would be embarrassed to be associated with supernaturalism, however traditional, but who yearn for participation in a socially valuable community.
- 6) Some people will remain religious just because it's their nature. They have an innate sense of a benign "presence," just as some people have an innate love, amounting almost to addiction, of music. Religion, that "binding together" element that has been present since our human beginnings, will finally be unbound from attempts to explain science and form governments. It will probably survive as an irresistible attraction for some people, and as long as religions don't abuse their members, or enforce ignorance on their children, we should tolerate them and even protect them as minority groups.

**Proviso:** Could anything turn the declining curve of religion around? Yes, unfortunately. A global plague, a world war fought over water or oil, the collapse of the internet and power grid, or some as yet unimagined catastrophe could throw the remaining population into ignorance, misery, and fear, which is the soil in which religion flourishes best. And then we'd have to start rebuilding civilization all over again.

#### The Institute for Science and Human Values Stands With Planned Parenthood

Planned Parenthood health centers play an important role in helping women meet their sexual and reproductive health needs. According to the *Guttmacher Institute* although Planned Parenthood health centers comprise 10% of all publicly funded family planning centers, they serve 36% of all clients who obtain care from the clinic network. Similarly, Planned Parenthood health centers serve a disproportionate share of clients in the Title X system, comprising 13% of Title X clinics but serving 37% of clients. Each Planned Parenthood health center on average serves nearly 3,000 contraceptive clients per year—far more than other clinic types.

"In other words, women vote with their feet, and about one-third of women who rely on safetynet health centers for their family planning care get that care from Planned Parenthood." 1

If Planned Parenthood health centers were defunded, it is impossible to know what would happen to the several million clients currently relying on these centers for their family planning services. There is no way to predict whether other health care providers throughout the country could step up—how quickly they could fill the gap or for how many clients.2

Led by rabid pro-birth militants and radical religious fanatics, politicians are pass- ing state and federal laws restricting or simply denying access to abortion, birth control and maternal health care at the expense of women and their families. Preg- nancy is dangerous for women. Defunding Planned Parenthood will make matters much worse. The callous disregard for women, their healthcare, their happiness and their very lives is both immoral and disgraceful.

Planned Parenthood is currently under false attack for violating the 1993 law on fetal tissue research, when in fact they are not. Planned Parenthood affiliates operate in all 50 states, but at this time affiliates in fewer than five states help women donate tissue for crucial research.

Fetal stem cells are vital for scientific research necessary to find much needed cures for fatal diseases. The women who make the decision to donate tissues do so to find meaning and purpose in their experience. It is wrong to interfere in their personal decisions, and is further evidence of the complete indifference to women's self autonomy.

Yes, the Institute for Science and Human Values stands with Planned Parenthood and we call on all elected officials to fund them fully and protect them, and the women and families they serve.

The **United Coalition of Reason**, or **UnitedCoR** for short, is a national organization in the United States that works to raise the visibility of local groups in the community of reason. Nationally this is done by conducting campaigns which highlight the fact that nontheists live in every community across America. Locally this is done by organizing local groups to communicate with each other and hold events. The organization also works to support the separation of church and state in the United States through the court system.

Although not a full member, the national coalition has endorsed the mission of the Secular Coalition for America. UnitedCoR has itself been endorsed by or has cooperative relations with American Atheists, the American Ethical Union, the American Humanist Association, the Center for Inquiry, the Freedom From Religion Foundation, FreeThought Action, the Richard Dawkins Foundation and the Secular Student Alliance.

#### History

The organization was founded in early 2009. Its first year created a network of twenty local coalitions, [5][6] drawing worldwide notice. [7]

This effort included the sponsoring of several ad/media campaigns around the country such as atheist billboard and bus ads in Seattle, Washington, and Portland, Oregon.

In 2010 the organization launched ten more local coalitions and paved the way for numerous others to launch in 2011. The most significant developments during 2010 were acts of vandalism against billboards or bus ads in Sacramento, California; Detroit, Michigan; and St. Augustine, Florida. Also significant was a call by local clergy in Fort Worth, Texas, for a boycott of the bus system because of ads by the Dallas-Fort Worth Coalition of Reason.
