Saving Culture

TB-CoR leader, *Mark Brandt* was a student studying in Italy in November of 1966 when the spring rain turned to a torrent in the Arno river that inundated northern Italy, impacting one of the worlds great civilizational foundations, Florence.



Mark was among the many American students then in Italy, who responded to the emergency; "The angels of the mud," who came to Florence to save the books and the works of art from destruction. However, the damage to the artistic and historical heritage was considerable. In fact, in the store rooms of the National Library, thousands of precious volumes were completely destroyed and a great many artistic works were substantially destroyed, in spite of subsequent restoration. But of those precious works that remained, more than a few owe their present existence to Mark and his friends.

This past February, some of those "angels," Mark among them, were called back to accept the gratitude of those whose cultural heritage was rescued. Truly, Humanism at work!

Explore with us, asking and answering some probing questions of these ideas.


Come on in, have a seat!





"NASA dropped a bombshell of a climate report,"

wrote meteorologists Bob Henson and Dr. Jeff Masters, founder of the Weather Underground.

"February 2016 has soared past all rivals as the warmest seasonally adjusted month in more than a century of global recordkeeping."

February's new temperature record beat that set in January 2016 by a full 0.21°C, which Masters and Henson described as "an extraordinary margin."

Scientists are normally wary of highlighting a single month's temperature spike, particularly in an El Niño cycle. However, this record bests even the one set during the "super" El Niño of February 1998 by 0.47°C.

Stefan Rahmstorf, from Germany's Potsdam Institute of Climate Impact Research and a visiting professorial fellow at the University of New South Wales, told the Sydney Morning Herald that the new figures are "quite stunning ... it's completely unprecedented."

And given the increasing concentration of carbon in the global atmosphere, which is driving higher long-term temperature increases as well as other extreme weather events, the string of monthly records is a foreboding sign.

Henson and Masters explain:

The real significance of the February record is in its departure from the seasonal norms that people, plants, animals, and the Earth system are accustomed to dealing with at a given time of year. Drawing from NASA's graph of long-term temperature trends, if we add 0.2°C as a conservative estimate of the amount of human-produced warming that occurred between the late 1800s and 1951-1980, then the February result winds up at 1.55°C above average. If we use 0.4°C as a higher-end estimate, then February sits at 1.75°C above average. Either way, this result is a true shocker, and yet another reminder of the incessant long-term rise in global temperature resulting from human-produced greenhouse gases. They conclude, "we are now hurtling at a frightening pace toward the globally agreed maximum of 2.0°C warming over pre-industrial levels."

And Rahmstorf also notes, "We are in a kind of climate emergency now." Read more online at: www.postcarbon.org 4/16

Peace in Our Time

Since I was a child, I have marveled and despaired at mankind's propensity and capacity for violence. Mostly through movies and television, since I grew up in a quiet, rural town, I was exposed to visions of wars both real and fictional, as the tail end of Vietnam on the nightly news streamed into our home, and visions of nuclear Armageddon dominated my nightmares. I dreamed of stopping this, and read rather obsessively about war and peace, about political history and especially the nuclear arms race because I felt that that was our greatest threat. I majored in political science, at the very end of the Cold War, and as the Soviet Union fell, it seemed briefly that at least that threat would wane. For a fleeting moment, as walls fell and freedom was being celebrated in former dictatorships, as velvet revolutions, and people's revolutions, and student uprisings undermined the vestiges of crumbling, corrupt empires, it seemed that peace and freedom were both attainable.

But the 90s brought us back to the grim reality of conflict. A Europe that had harbored ethnic and religious tensions that were quelled by Cold War fears and authoritarianism, were allowed again to blossom and take their toll. A liberated Russia experienced chaos and a resurgence of a new form of authoritarianism, and proxy fights continued between the two superpowers, who have not, by the way, disposed completely of their nuclear weapons. Then terror seemed to explode into our lives in ways we hadn't foreseen, with New York, now Paris, and Brussels, beacons of modernity, made unimaginably vulnerable. The veneer of civilization suddenly seemed so fragile, and while global conflict and even regional wars were distant and unlikely for at least a generation, our personal security and sense of safety became victim to a seemingly new reality, magnified by our instantaneous communications and media culture. Yet, despite that terror and devastating war that have marred our emergence into a new millennium, the world is somehow and remarkably more peaceful than the last century's turn.

Cold War tensions continue in a new form, still primarily between the US and Russia who, while they have allegedly turned off their targeting of each other's cities, maintain many thousands of active nuclear missiles capable of launching in a few minutes our mutual destruction. Reckless talk that inflames tensions between us and this former adversary ignores this grim reality. The nuclear stalemate still exists. We still live under a hair trigger.

It is small comfort for those currently under threat, but true that since the end of World War II, the global death rate due to armed conflict has been <u>steadily falling</u>, meaning that for any random person, the chance of death due to armed conflict is lower now than it has been in at least 70 years. To be sure, some parts of the world are more dangerous than others, and ongoing conflicts in various regions greatly increase the chances of people dying due to ongoing conflicts. A <u>couple dozen ongoing areas of conflict</u> exist now, some of which are interstate, and a number of which are ethnic and denominational. Still, there is reason to be hopeful. The number <u>of interstate conflicts has fallen precipitously</u>, and global warfare totals have fallen since the end of the Cold War. Systems of resolving and cooling tensions continue to be tried and abided by, including treaties and agreements limiting the spread of nuclear weapons and other weapons of mass destruction, and formalizing relations amongst once warring states and their proxies.

Today, President Obama is in Cuba, a nation that once <u>nearly led to our first (and maybe last) nuclear war as a</u> <u>pawn</u>, a proxy for the dangerous showdown between capitalism and communism. Normalizing relations with our

former enemies, encouraging travel and dialogue, as well as the inevitable spread of ideas of secularism, freedom, and democratic values that follows freedom of travel and speech. While we may not have peace in our time, we will continue to follow that slope if we can avoid the trap of fear and authoritarianism, isolationism, and militarism that feeds off of it, and that closes off the means by which peace can perhaps finally be achieved.

March/2016 The Florida legislative session is mercifully over and the instructional materials bills we've been tracking are history. These ill -conceived bills would have changed the way textbooks and other educational tools are reviewed and selected, handing entirely too much power to well meaning but non-expert parents and not so well meaning, ideologically driven special interest groups. You can learn more about the bills and why there were bad for science education in our <u>news release</u> and <u>series of blog posts</u>.

According to the <u>National Center for Science Education</u> this weekend: "We're fortunate and happy that these bad bills didn't get out of the starting gate," Florida Citizens for Science's Brandon Haught told NCSE. "The good thing to come out of this brief fight is that a clear anti-science motivation behind these bills is now documented. The bills' sponsors and supporters aren't likely to give up, though. But we'll be ready, just as we have been for a full ten years now."

I predict that the main cheerleaders for these bills, <u>Florida Citizens</u> <u>Alliance</u>, will be back. They have a sizable network and they visited Tallahassee in person to help round up four co-sponsors on the senate bill and 19 co-sponsors on the house bill. They're worth keeping an eye on.

On the other hand, as I told NCSE, the good thing is that Florida Citizens Alliance handed us all sorts of evidence of their anti-science views, which can be very useful in the future. And we also made some very good friends with other groups opposed to the Alliance's antics.



ISIS Crimes Labeled Genocide by State Department



In its global diplomacy and advocacy efforts, the Center for Inquiry fights for the freedom of expression and belief for not just the nonreligious but for all people. Just as the murder and persecution of secularists in Bangladesh has become a prime focus of CFI's efforts, the rights of religious communities to live without fear are no less important. That's why <u>CFI joined with thirty-seven organizations</u> urging the U.S. State Department to shine a powerful light on the atrocities of the Islamic State against Yazidis, Christians, and Shiites in Iraq and Syria and to name those crimes for what they are: a genocide. CFI was the sole secularist organization to make this plea

On March 17, meeting a deadline set by Congress in December, Secretary of State **John Kerry** unexpectedly <u>made the</u> <u>declaration</u> that these mass atrocities are indeed genocide. Referring to ISIS by the more derogatory name "Daesh," Sec. Kerry said, "Daesh is genocidal by self-proclamation, by ideology, and by actions – in what it says, what it believes, and what it does. Daesh is also responsible for crimes against humanity and ethnic cleansing directed at these same groups and in some cases also against Sunni Muslims, Kurds, and other minorities."

In our official statement praising this decision, CFI's UN representative, Michael De Dora, said, "The international community must put aside theological differences and come together to strongly engage in efforts to defeat the Islamic State, and aid their victims. We applaud Secretary Kerry for doing the right thing, and hope his decision prompts greater collaboration and sincere endeavors to end the Islamic State's genocide against religious minorities."

CFI has also urged President Obama and UN Secretary General Ban Ki-moon to make similar pronouncements. Sent by R. O'Keefe

Historic "Gold Cure" for Addiction

In the latter nineteenth century, as temperance and prohibitionist sentiment flourished, quack cures for alcoholism began to be offered, beginning with the Keeley Double Gold Cure in 1890.

Dr. Leslie Keeley (1836–1900) was a graduate of Chicago's Rush Medical College who served as a surgeon in the Union Army during the Civil War. With a chemist and town mayor as partners, he opened a sanitarium at Dwight, Illinois, in 1880 for the treatment of those addicted to alcohol or opium. He offered a proprietary tonic whose secret formula supposedly included bichloride of gold. He also gave hypodermic injections. Ten years later he began to sell franchises that eventually numbered over 200 in North America and also expanded into Europe ("Leslie Keeley" 2016; Fike 2006, 100–101, 208).

As it happened, however, early analysis showed Dr. Keeley's products contained no gold (Boles 2013, 3–7). Instead, the tonic was nearly 28% alcohol, and contained ammonium chloride, tincture of cinchona (the bark from which quinine is derived), and aloin (a compound obtained from the aloe plant). The injections contained strychnine and boric acid (both otherwise used as insecticides) and atropine (another poison) ("Leslie Keeley" 2016; Boles 2013, 1–11).

Not surprisingly, the result of Dr. Keeley's medicines was to make patients experience fear, confusion, vomiting, and dizziness, among other ill effects. Since treatments were provided as the patient continued to imbibe—albeit in successively diminished amounts—the result may have been to provide the alcoholic with added incentive to cease his bad habits (Boles 2013, 3). Keeley claimed a ninety-five percent cure rate, and he rationalized that those who returned to drinking did so by choice ("Leslie Keeley" 2016).

Whether Dr. Keeley was an outright quack or simply misguided has been debated—though I would remind readers that the false claim that his medicines contained gold does not enhance his reputation. Nevertheless, his focus on alcohol and other addictions as diseases rather than moral failings, and the use of both group therapy and support groups, made his approach a forerunner to such associations as Alcoholics Anonymous and Secular Organizations for Sobriety (founded in 1985 by CFI's James Christopher).

An early imitator of Dr. Keeley's was the McMichael Institute of Niagara Falls, NY, which opened in 1892. Dr. George H. McMichael offered "Double Chloride of Gold Remedies for the Liquor, Morphine & Tobacco Habits" and "Sanitarium Treatment," the institute was located in the former Dexter Jerauld Mansion near the world-famous falls. (Now attached to the rear of the Niagara Club at 24 Buffalo Avenue at the intersection of First Street, it is largely hidden from view. However, my wife Diana and I visited the site to take the accompanying photograph.) The McMichael Institute vacated the mansion in 1894, consolidating with its headquarters in Buffalo (Boles 2013, 1 -3, 13–22; "McMichael Institute" 1893).


There were two other such enterprises in the Falls. One was The Niagara Gold Cure Institute which opened in 1895 in the former luxury hotel, the Prospect Park House. Its physician was Dr. Bill English from Marion, Iowa. The sixty-bed facility accepted women as well as men. The other was the Reliable Gold Cure Institute, located in the Falls Hotel at 312 Main Street). It was a low-budget operation whose ad promised, in Keeley fashion, "Ninety-five percent cured" (Boles 2013, 13–14).

The Niagara Falls gold-cure businesses were relatively short-lived. The Keeley enterprise evolved over the years. The "medicine" drew criticism from some medical practitioners, and the formulas apparently changed over time. So did the "cure" which eventually turned into more of a supportive program. Nevertheless, Keeley died a wealthy man in 1900, and his business survived in a restructured and smaller form until the 1960s (Boles 2013, 47).


