The Humanist Obligation in a time of political chaos.

Politics is the answer to the question, "How shall we live." It is predicated on the answer to the question, "What is the world like?"

It is too often thought that humanists play a role in public affairs that is mostly confined to issues involving the place of religion. But nothing is further from the truth.

With the accumulated experience of over 2500 years of philosophical and ethical challenges to prevailing ways of thinking, Humanists bring a sophisticated and optimistic counter to the endemic cynicism and the empty platitudes of sterile rote agendas of the clinging past.

When the course of public conversation turns on irrational fears, unexamined myths, and popular prejudices, a crises emerges that stirs deep trouble in civil life. We can and must offer the solace of humanist philosophy and the instruments of critical reason, and scientific precision into the discourse. This is our purpose, our obligation. JP




Transportation accounts for over 40% of U.S. energy end use, and over 95% of that transportation runs on oil. Lighting, heating and cooling buildings also consumes an enormous amount of energy, much (but not all) of it powered by electricity. But we can't simply replace all our cars with electric models, convert all our furnaces and air conditioners to electric heat pumps, and power it all with massive amounts of new renewable energy. Instead, the renewable future will require deep rethinking of how we design our communities and build the infrastructure that serves them.

The transition to 100% renewable energy raises profound questions for the future of our communities and infrastructure. For instance:

- Can we produce enough renewable energy to power all the cars and trucks we have today? If not, how should our transportation system change? And what does that mean for land use patterns?
- What infrastructure—from highways to power lines—do we need for a 100% renewable future? What infrastructure can be retrofitted, and what needs to be built new?
- We know how to build net-positive-energy buildings; but what will it take make the *entire* building stock net-positive? Is it possible to construct building using only renewable energy?
- Are the architecture, construction, engineering, and planning industries getting ready for a 100% renewable future? Is local government?

Here in the Bay area, movements to bring more resources to bear on creating a rational transportation plan have foundered on narrow concerns about increased taxation during a time of economic distress. The problem will not recede on its own, but will become even more pressing. As fuel prices continue to plummet, an opportunity arises to again press for needed changes.

The true meaning of the word *skepticism* has nothing to do with doubt, disbelief, or negativity. Skepticism is the process of applying reason and critical thinking to determine validity. It's the process of finding a supported conclusion, not the justification of a preconceived conclusion.

Skepticism is, or should be, an extraordinarily powerful and positive influence on the world. Skepticism is *not* simply about "debunking" as is commonly charged. Skepticism is about redirecting attention, influence, and funding away from worthless superstitions and popular misinformation, and toward projects and ideas that are evidenced to be beneficial to humanity and to the world.

JANUARY 20, 1953: WHEN SECULAR GOVERNMENT IN AMERICA DIED

The inauguration of President Dwight D. Eisenhower was much more than a political ceremony. It was, in many ways, a religious consecration.

Indeed, the Republican nominee talked so much about spirituality on the stump that legendary New York Times reporter Scotty Reston likened his campaign to "William Jennings Bryan's old invasion of the Bible Belt during the Chautauqua circuit days". On election day, Americans answered his call. Eisenhower won 55 percent of the popular vote and a staggering 442-to-89 margin in the Electoral College. Reflecting on the returns, Eisenhower saw nothing less than a mandate for a national religious revival.

In the past, incoming presidents had attended religious services on the morning of their inauguration, but usually discreetly.

Eisenhower, in contrast, turned spirituality into spectacle. At a transition meeting with his cabinet nominees, he announced that they and their families were invited to a special religious service at National Presbyterian Church the morning of the inauguration. "He added hastily as an afterthought that, of course, no Cabinet member should feel under pressure to go to the Presbyterian services," remembered Sherman Adams, his chief of staff; "anybody could go instead to a church of his own choice." But given a choice between worshiping with the president or worshiping without him, almost all chose the former. More than 150 supporters joined the extended Eisenhower clan for the services.

Immediately after [Eisenhower took] his oath [of office], in his first official words as president, Eisenhower asked the 125,000 Americans in attendance—and the estimated seventy million more watching live on television—to bow their heads so that he might lead them in "a little private prayer of my own" he had composed that morning.

The president's prayer caused a minor sensation — not because of anything said in it but simply because it had been said.

The inauguration and its immediate aftermath established the tenor for Eisenhower's entire presidency. On the first Sunday in February, he became the first president ever to be baptized while in office, taking the rite before the congregation of National Presbyterian Church. That same night, Eisenhower broadcast an Oval Office address for the American Legion's "Back to God" ceremonies, urging the millions watching at home to recognize and rejoice in what the president said were the spiritual foundations of the nation. Four days later, he was the guest of honor at the first-ever National Prayer Breakfast, which soon became an annual tradition.

The convening pastor led a "prayer of consecration" for Eisenhower, who then offered brief remarks of his own. "The very basis of our government is: 'We hold that all men are endowed by their Creator' with certain rights", the president asserted. "In one sentence, we established that every free government is embedded soundly in a deeply-felt religious faith or it makes no sense." Eisenhower made clear that he would personally turn those words into deeds. The next day, he instituted the firstever opening prayers at a cabinet meeting. It took some time before this innovation became a natural habit. His secretary recalled Eisenhower emerging from a cabinet session only to exclaim: "Jesus Christ, we forgot the prayer!"



Politics out of the Pulpit!

The far right just threatened religion in America – but not in a way that you might expect.

Yesterday, the Republican Party released its official platform. And in a move that is an obvious attempt to please the Religious Right and prod churches to intervene in elections, that platform includes a call to repeal the federal law requiring houses of worship and non-profits to steer clear of endorsing or opposing political candidates. This is outrageous! In 1954, then-U.S. Sen. Lyndon Johnson championed a law



that stops churches and other houses of worship from acting like miniature political action committees. The idea behind it is to ensure that the desirable benefit of tax exemption is awarded only to organizations that operate in the public interest, not partisan entities. Houses of worship are free to speak out on issues, but may not focus on partisan politics, and their congregations don't want to be handed a list of endorsements from the pulpit.

But far-right fundamentalists have long dreamed of getting rid of the Johnson Amendment. Thanks to the backing of our members, Americans United has blocked numerous legislative attempts to remove the ban – but the Religious Right could finally get their wish after all these years. In addition to the platform calling for the repeal of the no-politicking rule, the U.S. House of Representatives recently passed a critical spending bill that includes a provision that would drastically weaken the Johnson Amendment.

Thanks to the partnership of our supporters, since 1996 Americans United has reported more than 100 churches to the Internal Revenue Service for unlawfully endorsing or opposing candidates for office, through a program called *Project Fair Play*.


Your Best Letters: Holy books Moral codes obsolete

THE AFFIRMATIONS OF HUMANISM: A Statement of Principles by Paul Kurtz

- 1. 1. We are committed to the application of reason and science to the understanding of the universe and to the solving of human problems. We
- 2. 2. deplore efforts to denigrate human intelligence, to seek to explain the world in supernatural terms, and to look outside nature for salvation.
- 3. We believe that scientific discovery and technology can attribute to the betterment of human life.
- 4. We believe in an open and pluralistic society and that democracy is the best guarantee of protecting human rights from authoritarian elites and repressive majorities.
- 5. 5. We are committed to the principle of the separation of church and state.
- 6. We cultivate the arts of negotiation and compromise as a means of resolving differences and achieve mutual understanding.
- 7. We are concerned with securing justice and fairness in society and with eliminating discrimination and intolerance.
- 8. We believe in supporting the disadvantaged and the handicapped so that they will be able to help themselves.
- 9. We attempt to transcend divisive parochial loyalties based on race, religion, gender, nationality, creed, class, sexual orientation, or ethnicity, and strive to work together for the common good of humanity.
- 10. 10. We want to protect and enhance the earth to preserve it for future generations, and to avoid inflicting needless suffering on other species.
- 11. 11. We believe in enjoying life here and now and in developing our creative talents to their fullest.
- 12. 12. We believe in the cultivation of moral excellence.
- 13. 13. We respect the right to privacy. Mature adults should be allowed to fulfill their aspiration, to express their sexual preferences, to exercise reproductive freedom, to have access to comprehensive and informed health-care, and to die with dignity.
- 14. 14. We believe in the common moral decencies: altruism, integrity, honesty, truthfulness, responsibility. Humanist ethics is amenable to critical, rational guidance. There are normative standards that we discover together. Moral principals are tested by their consequences.
- 15. 15. We are deeply concerned with the moral education of our children. We want to nourish reason and compassion. We are engaged by the arts no less than by sciences.
- 16. 16. We are citizens of the universe and are excited by discoveries still to be made in the cosmos.
- 17. 17. We are skeptical of untested claims to knowledge, and are open to novel ideas and seek new departures in our thinking.
- 18. We affirm humanism as a realistic alternative to theologies of despair and ideologies of violence and a source of rich personal significance and genuine satisfaction in the service to others.
- 19. 19. We believe in optimism rather than pessimism, hope rather than despair, learning in the place of dogma, truth instead of ignorance, joy rather than guilt or sin, tolerance in the place of fear, love instead of hatred, compassion over selfishness, beauty instead of ugliness, and reason rather than blind faith or irrationality.
- 20. 20. We believe in the fullest realization of the best and noblest that we are capable of as human beings.





An Open Letter to the President of the United States

REQUEST FOR REVIEW AND RECONSIDERATION OF JUNE 29, 2007 OFFICE OF LEGAL COUNSEL MEMORANDUM RE: RFRA

Some of us were members of the Coalition for the Free Exercise of Religion, which led the effort to persuade Congress to enact legislation after the United States Supreme Court sharply curtailed Free Exercise Clause protections in *Employment Division v. Smith*, 494 U.S. 872 (1990). This effort culminated in 1993, when then-President William J. Clinton signed RFRA into law.

RFRA was intended to provide protection for free exercise rights, applying strict scrutiny, on a case-by-case basis, to federal laws that substantially burden religious exercise. RFRA was not intended to create blanket exemptions to laws that protect against discrimination.

Yet, in contrast to this, the OLC Memo relies on flawed legal analysis and wrongly asserts that RFRA is "reasonably construed to require" a federal agency to categorically exempt a religiously affiliated organization from a grant program's explicit statutory non- discrimination provision, thus permitting the grantee to discriminate in hiring with taxpayer funds without regard to the government's compelling interest in prohibiting such discrimination.

The OLC Memo's broad and erroneous interpretation of RFRA has far-reaching consequences. For example, although the OLC Memo's conclusion is focused on one grantee in one Justice Department program, the Department has implemented it as a categorical exemption—that does not even require an individualized inquiry—to all religious hiring discrimination bans, most recently in the reauthorization of the Violence Against Women

Act (VAWA). The Department of Labor has also cited the OLC Memo to adopt a categorical prohibition. Moreover, some have cited the OLC Memo in arguing that RFRA should broadly exempt religiously affiliated contractors from the nondiscrimination requirements in Executive Order 11246, including those you added just last year that bar government contractors from discriminating against LGBT workers. And, some are trying to extend its reach beyond the context of hiring: Several grantees and contractors have cited the OLC Memo to support their arguments that the government should create a blanket exemption that would allow them to refuse to provide services or referrals required under those funding agreements, specifically in the context of medical care for unaccompanied immigrant children who have suffered sexual abuse.

Throughout your presidency, you have committed to uphold this Nation's laws and values. Indeed, in March, when discussing the Indiana RFRA, your Press Secretary said discrimination is "not consistent with our values as a country that we hold dear." Even before you were elected President in 2008, you promised to end federally funded hiring discrimination, because of the government's profound and enduring commitment to upholding the civil rights principle that it must not fund discrimination. The deeply harmful OLC Memo severely undermines this commitment.

Contrary to the conclusion in the OLC Memo, RFRA is not a tool to categorically override statutory protections against religious hiring discrimination. Nor does it create an absolute free exercise right—without regard to countervailing compelling interests, as required by RFRA—to receive government grants without complying with applicable regulations that protect taxpayers and participants in federally funded programs.

We accordingly request that the OLC Memo be reviewed and its erroneous and dangerous interpretation of RFRA be reconsidered as soon as possible.
