

#### What if the "Shale Revolution" is really just a "Shale Bubble?"

In the seven years since hydraulic fracturing ("fracking") has brought a surge of new oil and natural gas production to the United States, our nation's public conversation about energy has stalled. Politicians, business leaders, pundits, and even some environmental groups now repeat the same conventional wisdom: The risks of fracking for tight oil and shale gas are far outweighed by the decades of abundant, affordable domestic energy we're getting in return.

Based on optimistic U.S. Department of Energy forecasts and industry rhetoric, this conventional wisdom has had major implications on federal, state, and local energy and climate policy — including the push to fasttrack Liquified Natural Gas (LNG) and lift the oil export ban, shut down coal-fired power plants, transition vehicle fleets, and more. These may sound great in theory, but what if they are based on a false premise?

Since 2011, Post Carbon Institute has been the primary national voice questioning the prevailing view of the "shale revolution." We've released groundbreaking reports, held public and policymaker briefings, interviewed with media, produced creative messaging campaigns, and partnered with other organizations concerned about the rush to develop unconventional oil and gas resources.





This is the first study in half a century to focus on the election of 1796. The Electoral College was perhaps the least successful element of the U.S. Constitution. (And not unexpectedly, modifications to the Electoral College process came quickly). The Founders did not want the public to directly elect the President, since previous experiments in direct elections at the state level had reinforced the conclusion that pure democracy was too dangerous.

These are the issues that have taken up the bulk of my writing in the years since I began covering atheism-related news. If you want to get a fuller picture of what atheists are talking about, what our activism involves, and what our future looks like, no single writer can do that for you, just as no single study guide will prepare you for a final exam.



## **Humanist Families of Greater Tampa**



## RECALL NOTICE!

## Eupraxsophy

**Paul Kurtz**, the philosopher who created Center For Inquiry (US) in 1991, also coined the term "Eupraxsophy" and presented it in his book *Living Without Religion: Eupraxsophy* in 1994. According to Kurtz, there was at the time no word to adequately describe what humanism "is". Kurtz argued that humanism involved "a method of inquiry, a cosmic world view, a life stance and a set of social values"

a life stance and a set of social values". Kurtz felt the best approach is to combine Greek roots. I have come up with the term eupraxsophy, which means "good practical wisdom". Eupraxsophy is derived from the following roots: eu-, praxis, and Sophia. Eu - is a prefix which means "good", "well", advantageous. It is combined in words such as eudeaeomonia, which means "well-being" or "happiness"; it is also used in euthanasia, eulogy, euphoria, etc. Praxis (or prasstein) refers to "action, doing or practice" Eupraxia means "right action" or "good conduct". The suffix sophia is derived from Sophos ("wise") and means "wisdom". This suffix appears in the term philosophy, combining "philos" ("loving") and sophia ("wisdom") to mean "love of wisdom".

According to Kurtz:

- · unlike philosophy or science, Eupraxsophy does not focus on one specialized field or knowledge.
- · It is keenly aware of the need for fallibalism, and agnosticism about what we do and do not know
- the primary task of eupraxsophy is to understand nature and life and to draw concrete normative prescriptions from this knowledge
- · In the Greek and Roman world, Epicureanism, Stoicism and skepticism were eupraxsophies
- · utilitarianism, Marxism, existencialism, pragmatism were eupraxsophies

Eupraxsophy is Kurtz' proposal for a non-theistic term to define methods and tools to be used to pursue "good practical wisdom".

## ampa Bay Do cars really roll *up* Skeptics "Spook Hill"? by Dr. Gary P. Posner


Spook Hill, where cars seem to drift uphill, received national press in a front-page Wall Street Journal article on October 25, 1990, and in a November 5 segment on the CBS Morning News with Charles Osgood. This "piney pitstop of the paranormal," as it is referred to in the WSJ piece, lies 50 miles to the south of Orlando, in the town of Lake Wales.

The WSJ reported that the Spook Hill Beautification Committee has convinced state and local legislators to provide \$32,000 for "new signs, a tourist information center and a parking lot." Arch Abernathy, City Editor of the Lake Wales Daily Highlander and a member of the Committee, tells TBS Report that, in his opinion, the hill is simply "an optical illusion." Says Abernathy, "It's a free attraction. We have a lot of fun with the [ghost] legends, and just enjoy people coming over."

Addressing the concern that Spook Hill might become a profit-making venture, Abernathy assured TBS Report that, "There will be nothing of that sort in our lifetime." The money, he says, is for necessary improvements so that hundreds of cars per weekend will not continue to clog the narrow roadway.

TBS member Guss Wilder reports that the contours of the approach road and surrounding land create the *illusion* of a small dip that should cause cars to drift forward from the designated "stop point," but from which cars instead drift backward, seemingly uphill (see Fig. 1). From other vantage points, however, it was apparent that the true low point is actually *behind* the "stop point," adjacent to an appropriately placed storm drain, and that the cars do indeed drift downhill. (see Fig. 2).

A version of this article appeared in the Winter 1990-91 Tampa Bay Skeptics Report. Guss Wilder wrote an article on Spook Hill for the Fall 1991 Skeptical Inquirer, and highlights from that article can be found in the Jan/Feb 1992 issue of Science Frontiers.

## GOD ON TRIAL The Fable of the Christ

#### [As a "Christmas" treat, this tidbit is offered.]

I have always been a staunch Bible skeptic but not a Christ-mythicist. I maintained that Jesus probably existed but had fantastic stories foisted upon the memory of his earthly yet iconoclastic life.

After exhaustive research for my first book, I began to perceive both the light and darkness from history. I discovered that many prominent Christian fathers believed with all pious sincerity that their savior *never came to Earth* or that if he did, he was a Star-Trekian character who beamed down pre-haloed and full-grown, sans transvaginal egress. And I discovered other startling bombshells.

An exercise that struck me as meritorious, even today singular, involved reviving research into Jesus-era writers who *should have* recorded Christ tales but did not. John Remsburg enumerated forty-one "silent" historians in *The Christ* (1909). To this end, I spent many hours bivouacked in university libraries, the Library of Congress, and on the Internet. I terminated that foray upon tripling Remsburg's count: in my book, I offer 126 writers who should have but did not write about Jesus (see the box on p. 57). Perhaps the most bewildering "silent one" is the super-Savior himself. Jesus is a phantom of a wisp of a personage who *never wrote anything*. So, add one more: 127.

Our brains have a hugely complex new layer, or set of layers, that have evolved to the point where we now have the ability to use language and to think more broadly about behavior.
