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# Darwin Day 2017 The Acceleration of Evolutionary Change in Human Society

Jeff Lipkes was born and raised in Los Angeles and educated at U.C. Berkeley and Princeton. He's taught at Northwestern, Penn State, Hollins College, and University of South Florida. Lipkes is the author of Politics, Religion, and Classical Economy in Britain and Rehearsals: The German Army in Belgium, August 1914. He translated Henri Pirenne's Belgium and the First World War and has edited a collection of the letters of British Foreign Secretary Sir Edward Grey, Dear Katharine Courageous. As Josh Michaels, he's published a novel, Outlaws, and edited a selection of the aphorisms of Mignon McLaughlin, Aperçus. Lipkes has also published a number of articles in scholarly and non-scholarly journals, and a dozen short stories. He's the organizer of Humanistic Jews of Tampa Bay, an affiliate of the Society for Humanistic Judaism.

## Human Evolution: Where We've been-Where are we going?

There is no question that after the migration out of Africa around 50,000 years ago, population groups of homo sapiens continued to evolve, as attested to by distinctive DNA changes, as well as obvious physiological differences.

But did cultural practices result in artificial selection for certain phenotypic traits by some groups much more recently? The question is obviously controversial. This lecture will explore the theses of some economists and anthropologists (historians have ignored the subject) concerning the Jews and the English. Why did the Jews become traders and then moneylenders in medieval Europe, the middle class of early modern Poland, and then, after Emancipation, were so successful in certain fields in Europe and America? Why did the English pioneer the industrial revolution and then create an empire that, at its height, ruled over more than quarter of the world's population and a quarter of its land mass?

The answers a few courageous scholars have provided are intriguing, and worth a close look.

Life implies death—one's own mortality above all. Everything has limits. Wisdom resides in the understanding that we are subject to forces we cannot control, and that we must respect and accommodate ourselves to those forces. If we want to have language, farming, cities, and energy, then we must make a deliberate cultural effort to maintain an attitude of individual and collective humility. In practical terms, that means keeping the size of our global population low enough so that it can be supported long-term without eroding natural systems, managing consumption so that resources are not depleted and non-biodegradable wastes do not accumulate, and maintaining checks on wealth inequality.

Obviously, we haven't been doing these things very well, especially in recent decades. The power of fossil fuels fed our collective megalomania. Like people in previous civilizations, we went out on a limb—but modern energy and technology enabled us to go much further than any humans had before. Still, as all civilizations do, ours has reached the point of diminishing returns, of over-reach. Before us lies the senescence and death of a way of living and of seeing the world. Perhaps the new president's qualities of character are emblematic of these final stages of cultural disintegration.

In the days to come, there will be plenty of opportunities for resistance, protest, and, one hopes, celebration. Inauguration Day 2017 is a turning point; for me, it seems a perfect occasion for a walk in the woods.







#### "Florida Student and School Personnel Religious Liberties Act." House Bill 303 and Senate Bill 436

Members of Atheists of Florida support free speech and religious freedom for everyone, students included. However, after having read these bills, we are concerned about the direct conflict this has with U.S. Code 4071, "Denial of equal access prohibited", commonly referred to as the Equal Access Act (EAA), as well as the establishment clause of the U.S. constitution and the Florida Constitution, Article 1 Section 3.

While much of HB 303 and SB 436 agrees with the EAA, the involvement of employees with a student group is in direct conflict. EAA states: "employees or agents of the school or government are present at religious meetings only in a nonparticipatory capacity;". These bills, in Paragraph 4(a)1. (b)1. states "A school district may not prevent school personnel from participating in religious activities on school grounds that are initiated by students at reasonable times before or after the school day if such activities are voluntary and do not conflict with the responsibilities or assignments of such personnel." There is no avoiding the inherently sectarian nature of religious expression. All of it is grounded in differently evolved religious, national, and social traditions. Each religion proclaims its own inerrancy and superiority to all the others. This cannot help but to create disunity, dissension, and strife as it has so often in the past.

Since HB 303 and SB 436 applies to all schools in a district, how do you propose we protect younger students from being unduly influenced by a teacher? When a scientologist, Satanist, or someone from a cult or "unpopular" religion encourages students to start a club, how does your bill address the potential for abuse of the trust students have placed in that authority figure? It seems all too easy for an employee to "take over" a student organization, whether intentionally or not, simply because of the relationship that students have with a teacher or staff person. Adults are often viewed as guides in many aspects of life. Those adults moved by religious feelings may often be disposed to dispense the "superior" values of their religion in a fully beneficent way in their own view. If the adult in question is a teacher, is this not going to pressure students in their class to feel required to participate in that teacher's openly professed religion, lest they fear being "penalized" by the teacher for not being part of his/her group?

The social values and individual virtues promoted by the traditional secular framework of our schools seem wholly adequate to inculcate the necessary attributes to become a valued and worthwhile citizen. The founders of our country seemed to appreciate the fact that religion is mostly a matter of private discretion, and ought not to be the subject of government selection. The current federal law seems quite adequate in giving students the rights addressed by these bills, without complicating the matter with employee involvement.

Please call your representatives to ask them to vote against these bills as they are written.

These bills were introduced by Representative Kimberly Daniels (D) and Senator Dennis Baxley (R).

## **Humanist Families of Greater Tampa**



#### A Global March for Equality, Reason, and Freedom



It's impossible to say just how many people took part in the Women's Marches in Washington and around the world, but many estimates by academics and experts easily place the number in the millions, such that over 1% of the U.S. population took to the streets on January 21.

The Center for Inquiry was proud to be one of the <u>dozens of partner organizations</u> supporting the march. In Washington, CFI–DC coordinated with the Secular Coalition for America to join

the hundreds of thousands who gathered there, and members of other CFI branches took part in their cities as well. Even in places where there was no "official" CFI presence, our friends and volunteers were there.



And rightly so, for among the issues raised by demonstrators were those that CFI has always championed: women's rights, LGBTQ equality, defending and supporting science and its findings, the advancement of reason and evidence-based thinking, the rejection of conspiracy theories and "alternative facts," opposition to religious imposition into government and people's lives, and of course the freedom of expression.

CFI–Indiana Executive Director **Reba Boyd** Wooden addressed the crowd at the march in Indianapolis, and she spoke out strongly for the values we fight for: Our tax money should go

to support public schools which serve everyone not to private for-profit schools or to religious schools that promote a particular religion. Public schools should be neutral on the subject of religion so that students of all religions and no religion feel welcome. ... We will stand up for equality for all, freedom for individuals to practice the religion of their choice including the freedom to not practice any religion, freedom of expression in speech, press, peaceful assembly, and public policy based on the best science available.

# What would Count as Evidence against Theism or Biblical Inerrancy?

This year (2017), for the first time, Bob Jones University closed in honor of the birthday of Martin Luther King Jr. The University's long history of anti -Black racism is well-known, so this must be considered as at least a small step forward. (They did not even accept Blacks to the school until the 1970s and banned interracial dating until at least the year 2000.) However, when religionists change their views, it never occurs to most of them that the changes they embrace mean that they – and their God –were wrong. Yet they profess to embrace a perfect, omniscient God that never makes mistakes. What's up with that?

The usual rationalization is that they misinterpreted Scripture, but finally got it right. Others maintain that God finally touched their hearts and changed them for the better. They never seem to notice that God does not change their hearts and minds until after the rest of society has moved ahead. This, of course, means that they are simply coming late to the party. It makes their God look like a slacker.



# The Netherlands picks up the fallen banner of Women's health rights as the U. S. retreats into a Swamp of Religious Tribalism

The world has responded with fear and outrage to many of President Donald Trump's repressive actions since taking office, and the Dutch government immediately announced plans to counter one: the <u>reinstatement</u> of the "global gag rule" which cuts off U.S. funding to any NGO around the world that mentions abortions.

Minister for Foreign Trade and Development Cooperation Lilianne Ploumen announced the government's plan for a new international abortion fund on Tuesday.

"Banning abortions does not result in fewer abortions," said Ploumen, <u>according to</u> *teleSUR*. "It leads to more irresponsible practices in back rooms and more maternal deaths. We must not let this happen."

#### The Independent adds:

[Ploumen] told colleagues: "This has far-reaching consequences. First of all, for all those women who have to make, if they want to have a child, a choice, but also for their husbands and children and society as a whole."

[...]She also quoted figures from Marie Stopes International, one group which would lose funding under the initiative, suggesting up to 14 women a day could die as a result of the gag.

The gag rule, also known as the "<u>Mexico City Policy</u>," was instituted by President Ronald Reagan and kept in place by subsequent Republican presidents, while it was repealed by both Democrats, as *Common Dreams* noted.

Planned Parenthood also <u>explained</u> the dire results to come from Trump's executive order. "When in place, the global gag rule (also known as the Mexico City Policy) has had enormous and harmful impacts on women's lives," the group wrote:

- In many communities, the most experienced providers of women's healthcare were cut off—sometimes, the only provider of any essential healthcare in their community and clinics were shut down.
- It also stifled the free speech of doctors and of advocates in the country and weakened civil society.
- Multiple studies have come out looking at the impact of the global gag rule and they have found that the primary impact is lost access to contraceptives, and in turn, increased rates of abortion—which are primarily unsafe.

"Ploumen wants to launch a new fund that could be supported by governments, businesses, and social organizations to 'compensate this financial setback as much as possible,'" reports the Associated Press.

Trump's reinstatement of the gag rule has been met with strong resistance stateside as well, and Sen. Jeanne Shaheen (D-NH) introduced legislation Tuesday that would repeal the rule for good, as *Common Dreams* reported.





#### A big part of the American Dream is dying \* By Andy Kiersz

One of the most important parts of the American Dream is the hope that your children will be better off than you are. Unfortunately, that is becoming less common.

The likelihood that children at age 30 had a higher inflationadjusted income than their parents did when they were the same age has been dropping over the last several decades, according to a recent study by Stanford economist Raj Chetty and his team at the Equality of Opportunity Project cited by Jeff Gundlach in his presentation released earlier this month.

By combining data from the Census Bureau with anonymized tax record information, Chetty and his team were able to approximate the likelihood that children would earn more than their parents for different levels of parental income, and show how that likelihood changed over the decades.

As the chart shows, around 90% of children born in 1940 across the entire income distribution earned more than their parents did at age 30. That percentage dropped each decade, with only about 50% of children born in 1980 earning more than their parents. See the chart here: <u>http://</u>read.bi/2k5NFc3.
